ach year nineteen different Veterans World Team Championships are conducted by the International Tennis Federation at various sites around the world. Due to their popularity and high entry numbers, the Cup competitions are divided into two groups. This year's Super Senior events were held at five different clubs in the Philadelphia area, mostly on grass courts, immediately following the US Open in September 2004.

Almost 750 players, from 33 different nations, participated, making it the largest competition ever held. Size alone created significant operational challenges for the World Championships Organizing Committee (WCOC). At the end of the two weeks of play, US seniors claimed five of the eleven Cup titles and nine out of twelve individual World singles championships. Californians figured prominently in the results.

n the final round of the Men's 65 Britannia Cup, the US faced Australia on the grass courts at the Merion Cricket Club. I captained the team that included Bob Helton, Rudy Hernando and Gene Scott. Peter Froelich, Bob Howes, Doug Napier and Bruce Rehn represented the Aussies.

In Cup competition, the No. 2 singles match is played first, and Hernando defeated Froelich 6-4, 6-2. He broke early and held serve throughout the first set. In the second, his blistering serve returns and solid groundstrokes overwhelmed Froelich, who was formerly No. I in the world.

Scott and Howes faced off in the No. I singles. In the first set, all Scott's strokes, particularly his serve and volley, put Howes under continual pressure, leading to a 6-4 win. Howes broke at 2-I and won the remaining games in the second set. Scott dominated early in the third set and won it 6-2 to give the US the Cup.

The doubles wasn't played because of rain.

In the semifinals against Germany, Hernando lost the first set to Klaus Haas, then won eleven games in a row to score a 4-6, 6-0, 6-2 victory. Scott showed his competitive ability and understanding of grass court play, defeating Bodo Nitsche 6-3, 6-0.

I can't say enough about the play of the entire team. Hernando was outstanding, and Scott, the editor and publisher of Tennis Week Magazine, who has had both hips replaced, was even better. For me it was a thrill to captain the team. I have played on the last five, and the US has now won three in a row.

Challenge Cup

he I9th North-South Super Senior Challenge Cup competition, involving the top Southern and Northern California players in the Men's 65-85 divisions, was played at the Bakersfield Racquet Club. The South scored a 31-23 victory.

Each team in the 65-80 age groups consists of eight participants who played four singles and two doubles matches. Both of the 85 teams had three players.

At the end of the first day, the South led I7-I0. There were seven three-set matches contested, and the South won all seven, which provided the lead. The second day's matches were even closer. Six three-set matches were played and each side earned three victories. The South escaped with a I4-I3 victory for the day.

The Challenge Cup is a yearly highlight for Super Senior players from both sections. All the participants look forward to the competition and the opportunity to spend time with their friends and fellow competitors. Since the event alternates between Southern and Northern California, the 2005 will be held in NorCal at a location to be determined.

The second week of September, the Individual World Championships were held on the same courts. The Philadelphia Cricket Club, the Merion Cricket Club and the Germantown Cricket Club were the main venues. Unlike other facilities in the US, the three clubs have

a large number of grass courts. (See William J. Kellogg's story on pages 4.)

There were I36 teams from all over the world competing in men's and women's 55 to 85 divisions. The US teams, comprised of the top players in an age group, played very well. The same can be said for those competing in the Individual World Championships. It was inspiring to watch legendary players such as Gardnar Mulloy, who is 91; Dodo Cheney, the 87-year-old who was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame this summer; and King Van Nostrand, 70, who just had a knee replaced. They were amazing. These super seniors, as well as scores of others, sporting all manner of braces and supports, came from all over the world to play the game that they love.

Can't Say Good-Bye

uring last year's Senior Women's Classic, Linda Stude, the event's co-founder with Rhea Savin, who, in truth, is its heart and soul, called it a

day. "Burn-out", was the reason she no longer wanted to be the event's organizer

and tournament director. Having started the Women's Classic in 1994, for the purpose of providing women with a first class competitive opportunity, she watched it become a USTA Category II Championships in 2000. Each year the tournament became larger, while the volunteer support staff dwindled. It became clear to Stude that one person could no longer be responsible for its operation.

Having a full-time job, as Administrator of the Los Angeles County Bar Foundation added to her "it's time to go" mindset. So did the seemingly never ending telephone calls attempting to coax senior women to participate in the tournament. Simply stated, the process was getting her down.

When word got out about the Senior Women's Classic/Stude predicament, tournament supporters pleaded with her to keep it alive. Fortunately, The Paseo Club, a new facility in Valencia, understood the dire circumstances and stepped up. Brad Sceney, the head tennis pro, became the tournament director, allowing Stude to focus on what she does best—organize the event's fund-raiser

which benefits the YWCA of Glendale's EncorePlus. The program provides free breast and cervical cancer screening for women 40 or over who cannot afford the tests. In the past six years, the Senior Women's Classic has raised a total of \$60,000 for those purposes.

Winter Workouts

spring away, many players are now forced to practice after work. It gets dark at 4:30 p.m., if not earlier, which makes it difficult to maintain a good routine. For those unable to get out on their lunch hour, twice a week as I try to do, there are ways to maximize your winter workouts.

Here are suggestions.

- To optimize drill time, fill a large bucket with balls so that you can hit a lot of them in a short period. It is much more practical to reproduce strokes rather than make a few shots then have to pick up balls because you are only using three.
- Set up drills to simulate match play. Working on the volley, always hit the ball to the open court. (How many times in a match have you hit right back to your opponent and gotten passed?) With approach shots, practice hitting down the line. Also, try to approach whenever a short ball is hit. Practice serving at targets. With my women's team at California State University Los Angeles, I put candy inside hoola hoops as a bonus incentive. You would not believe how serves improved when candy was on the line. Run for every ball. This can be difficult, particularly if you've had a hard day at work.

I remember Billie Jean King telling me that when she coached the Fed Cup team, she never let players stand and rally with each other. That's not what happens in a match, but that's what many tend to do – rally and not move. It doesn't serve a purpose to work out this way.

- Make drills competitive, but fun. A drill I do with my team involves having two players at the net trying to keep two players at the baseline from scoring three consecutive points. A point can be won by getting the ball past or over those at the net. Players hitting volleys have to get their shots past the service line.
- Stay focused. There is nothing more aggravating when training than to have a cell phone ring. To keep a partner from going ballistic (and destroying his/her karma) turn the phone off when you're on the court.
- Plan workouts. Talk with friends about things to work on. Set up a schedule as you would business appointments. Write it down so there is no double booking. Have a goal every time you go on the court.

These tips should help during the winter months. I can't guarantee a win at every tournament, but you will be a winner when it comes to enjoying time on the court.


