Real Healthy Breakfast: Donuts, muffins and pancakes? How can I call these recipes healthy? It's all in the ingredient substitutions. Rather than wheat flour you'll use coconut or almond flour. These real food flours bring the carb count of the recipe much lower than traditionally made donuts, muffins and pancakes. There is also more protein and fat in these real food flours, which will fuel your day and keep you going without the mid morning energy crash.

Real Healthy Snacks: Most popular snack foods come from shiny plastic packages out of vending machines. These so-called foods are filled with artificial ingredients and simple carbs that encourage your body to store fat. The snack recipes you'll find in this book are made of only wholesome ingredients that taste great and provide you with real fuel for your day.

Real Healthy Entrees: Dinner is when many people go a little crazy and make some bad decisions. Let's face it, after a long day it's comforting to have a nice dinner that tastes great. Unfortunately the most popular entrées that restaurants serve are filled with more calories than you need, leaving your body primed and ready to store fat. The entrees you'll find in this book are filled with healthy sources of protein and lots of fiber-filled veggies. This is a winning combination for healthy weight loss.

Take the time to read through all of the recipes and then roll up your sleeves and make a delicious fat burning meal for your family. You'll be surprised how delicious healthy food can be.

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Real Healthy Donuts



These gorgeous breakfast treats are gluten-free, cane sugar-free and baked!

There's something *so* fun and satisfying about taking something that's *supposed* to be unhealthy and turning it into a wholesome snack.

Real Healthy Basic Donut recipe:

Dry ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cup blanched almond flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda

Wet ingredients:

- 3 Tablespoons pure maple syrup, grade B
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 Tablespoons coconut oil, melted
- 1 teaspoon apple cider vinegar
- 2 eggs, at room temperature, whites and yolks separated

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Generously grease your 6-mold donut pan with coconut oil.
2. Combine the dry ingredients in a medium bowl. In another medium bowl combine all of the wet ingredients except egg whites.
3. Mix the wet with dry and set aside.
4. Beat the egg whites until firm peaks form. Gently fold the egg whites into the batter.
5. Equally distribute the batter between the 6 donut molds. Smooth out the tops of each donut. Bake for 12-15 minutes until lightly golden.
6. Allow the donuts to cool, remove from pan and then chill in the fridge for half an hour.

Real Healthy Chocolate Glazed Donut:

For the glaze:

- 1/2 cup very dark chocolate (73% cocoa)
- 1/4 cup unsweetened chocolate
- 2 Tablespoons coconut oil

1. Make the **Real Healthy Basic Donut Recipe** above.
2. For the Glaze: Fill a medium skillet with a few inches of water and place over medium-low heat. Place the glaze ingredients in a small saucepan and put the saucepan inside the skillet. Gently mix the ingredients until fully melted.
3. Pour the melted chocolate into a shallow bowl. Dip each chilled donut in the chocolate, then immediately chill for 30 minutes until the glaze hardens.

Real Healthy Apple Fritter Donut

Add to the dry ingredients:

- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Add to the wet ingredients:

- 1/4 teaspoon maple extract

Apple Fritter ingredients:

- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil
- 1 small, organic apple, finely chopped
- 1 Tablespoon maple syrup, grade B
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 Tablespoons pecans, finely chopped
- 2 Tablespoons golden raisins

1. In a small skillet, heat the coconut oil over medium. Add the finely chopped apple and cook, stirring often until very soft, about 5 minutes. Add the syrup, cinnamon, pecans and raisins. Continue to cook for another 2 minutes. Remove from heat and allow to cool.
2. Make the **Real Healthy Basic Donut Recipe** above, mixing the cooled apple fritter ingredients to the dough in step Three.

Apple Fritter Muffins



When I was little I loved apple fritters. The gooey, sticky, apple-y doughnut was my favorite thing to eat on Saturday mornings. Well, since traditional apple fritters are filled with sugar, unhealthy fats, carbs, and gluten, eating one just isn't an option anymore.

This recipe for Apple Fritter Muffins captures the flavor and experience of an apple fritter doughnut without any of the repercussions! In fact you'll be getting protein and even some fiber from these tasty treats.

Here's what you need for 12:

- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil
- 2 organic apples, chopped
- 1/4 cup organic golden raisins
- 1/4 cup pecans, chopped
- 4 Tablespoons water
- 1 Tablespoon ground cinnamon plus a dash
- 1 Tablespoon pure grade B maple syrup
- 9 organic cage-free eggs
- 3 Tablespoons unsweetened coconut milk
- 1 1/2 Tablespoons coconut flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- dash of salt

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a 12-muffin pan with coconut oil.
2. In a skillet heat the coconut oil over medium. Add the apples, raisins, pecans, water, cinnamon and maple syrup. Cook, mixing often until the apples become tender. Remove from heat and allow to cool.
3. In a bowl combine the eggs, coconut milk, coconut flour, baking soda, dash of cinnamon and salt. Add two thirds of the apple mixture to the eggs. Mix until well combined.
4. Using a 1/4 cup, fill each prepared muffin tin with the egg mixture. Place a spoonful of the reserved apple mixture on top of each muffin.
5. Bake for 35 minutes, or until fully set.

Blueberry & Lemon Mini Muffins



When you make the decision to be healthier, by cutting gluten, sugar and dairy from your diet, your body responds immediately.

You feel lighter, tighter, and energetic.

You grow accustomed to breakfasts of eggs, meat, nuts and berries...until one day you have an intense craving for blueberry muffins.

That's when this recipe saves the day 😊

Here's what you need for 24 mini muffins:

- 6 eggs
- 1/2 cup coconut oil, melted over low heat
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/4 cup grade B maple syrup
- 1 lemon, zest and juice
- 1/2 cup coconut flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup organic, fresh blueberries
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a mini muffin pan with coconut oil
2. In a medium bowl combine the eggs, melted (and cooled) coconut oil, vanilla and almond extract, maple syrup, lemon juice and zest.
3. In a small bowl, whisk the coconut flour to remove lumps, add salt and baking soda.
4. Mix the dry ingredients into the wet ones, then gently fold in the blueberries.
5. Fill each mini muffin tin to the top, then sprinkle with sliced almonds.
6. Bake for 30 minutes, then turn on the broil for 1-2 minutes (watch close!) to lightly brown the tops.
7. Allow to cool before removing from muffin tin. Store in an airtight container in the fridge for up to a week.

Baked Pumpkin French Toast Coffee Cake



This yummy, wholesome-cheat, recipe is my rebuttal to the pumpkin spice latte. It's part French Toast, part coffee cake streusel, and part pumpkin custard.

While this may initially sound like a weird combination — it works deliciously!

Enjoy a gourmet slice of fall...this may even taste better than pumpkin pie!

Here's what you need for 10 servings:

- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil
- 5 slices sprouted grain bread
- 4 omega 3 eggs
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 cup organic pumpkin puree
- 1/3 cup coconut crystals
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

For the Streusel Topping:

- 1/2 cup almond meal
- 1/4 cup coconut crystals
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 Tablespoons coconut oil

1. Melt the coconut oil in an 8-inch oven-friendly skillet. Coat the entire pan, including the sides. Remove from heat.
2. Slice the sprouted grain bread diagonally. Place the bread slices, cut side down, and point side up across the pan.
3. In a medium sized bowl, combine the eggs, egg whites, pumpkin puree, coconut crystals and vanilla extract. Mix well. Pour the mixture over the bread slices, coating each side of each slice. The skillet will be nearly filled with the pumpkin mixture.
4. Cover the skillet with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 30 minutes to overnight.
5. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees F.
6. Combine the Streusel topping ingredients in a small bowl. Remove the skillet from refrigerator and crumble the streusel topping over the soaked bread slices.
7. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes, until the custard has set and the tops of the bread slices are toasted. Allow to cool for 15 minutes. Slice and enjoy!

Greens, Eggs and Ham



Who doesn't love breakfast that comes in a cute package? I certainly do.

These Greens, Eggs and Ham cups are perfect for your healthy on-the-go breakfast!

First fill your ham cups with veggies.

Here's what you need for 12 servings:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 yellow onion, chopped
- 12 slices of nitrate free ham
- 1 cup broccoli, steamed and chopped
- 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- dash of salt and pepper
- 12 eggs

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly spray a muffin pan with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside
2. In a medium sized skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the garlic and onions. Cook until tender.
3. Add the steamed broccoli, cheese, salt and pepper. Mix until fully combined. Remove from heat.
4. Using kitchen scissors, make a slice to the center of each piece of ham, then fold into a cone shape in each muffin cup. Fill halfway with the broccoli mixture.
5. Crack an egg into each ham cup. Bake for 16-20 minutes, or until the edges of the ham are crispy.

Low Carb Green Smoothie



There are days that call for the cleansing power of greens –you know what I’m talking about.

Here’s what you need for 2 servings:

- 1 cup coconut water
- 1 Tablespoon almond butter
- 1/4 cup wheat grass
- 2 cups spinach
- 1 scoop high quality, low carb chocolate protein
- 1 inch slice of banana
- Optional pinch of Stevia
- 1/2 cup ice

1. Combine all the ingredients in your high speed blender then blend on high for a full minute, or until the tiny pieces of spinach have disappeared and the smoothie turns a brilliant shade of green.

Real Healthy Cinnamon Swirl Bread



This version of the classic almond bread loaf has a fun swirl of cinnamon and raisins. Just like you're having a cinnamon roll!

Here's what you need for 30 half-slices:

- 5 cups blanched almond flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 6 omega-3, free range eggs
- 2 Tablespoons agave nectar
- 2 teaspoons apple cider vinegar
- 1/3 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 cup ground walnuts
- 1 Tablespoon cinnamon

1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Grease a loaf pan with coconut oil.
2. In a medium sized bowl combine the almond flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon.
3. In another bowl combine the eggs, agave nectar and vinegar. Mix well.
4. Pour the wet ingredients over the dry and mix until just combined. Mix in the raisins.
5. In a small bowl combine the ground walnuts and cinnamon.
6. Generously cover a cutting board with almond flour. Place the dough on the floured surface and carefully pat out into a large rectangle, about an inch thick, with a length that matches the length of your loaf pan. Evenly cover the dough with the walnut and cinnamon mixture.
7. Carefully, using extra almond flour as needed, roll the dough up (keeping the same length as your loaf pan), then use a spatula to lift the rolled dough and drop into the loaf pan.
8. Bake for 45-60 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean. Allow to cool in the pan for 30 minutes.

Real Healthy Chocolate Chip Pancakes (Gluten Free)



If someone held a gun to my head and told me to choose only one thing to eat for the rest of my life, this would be the thought bubble above my head...

“Cookies.....Pancakes....Cookies....Pancakes....Cookies....Pancakes....Cookies....Pancakes....”

And in the end I'd choose this Chocolate Chip Pancake recipe!

Wholesome ingredients with a sprinkle of mini chocolate chips make this pancake recipe the most fun you'll ever try.

Here's what you need for 15 pancakes:

- 3 omega-3, free range eggs
- 1 Tablespoon agave nectar
- 1 Tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup coconut milk (full fat, from a can)
- 2 Tablespoon flax meal
- 1 1/2 cup blanched almond meal
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/3 cup mini chocolate chips
- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil

1. In a blender combine the eggs, agave nectar, vanilla and coconut milk. Blend until smooth. Add the flax, almond flour, salt and baking soda. Blend until smooth. Fold the chocolate chips into the batter.
2. Grease a large skillet or pancaked griddle with coconut oil and place over medium heat. Place heaping tablespoons of batter onto the skillet and cook until bubbles form. Flip each pancake and cook for another minute, until golden on both sides.

Orange Blueberry Paleo Muffins



Whenever I bite into a big, juicy blueberry it brings me back to late-summer trips down to the blueberry farm.

The sweet-tart flavor of blueberry pairs perfectly with refreshing orange. These muffins are low carb, protein-filled and delicately flavored. Enjoy one for an energizing power breakfast.

Here's what you need for 12 muffins:

- 3 cups blanched almond flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 Tablespoon flax meal
- 3 omega-3, free range eggs
- 1/4 cup fresh squeezed orange juice
- 1/4 cup coconut oil, melted over low heat
- 1/4 cup agave nectar
- 1 Tablespoon orange zest
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cup fresh blueberries

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Generously grease 12 muffin tin pan with coconut oil.
2. In a medium bowl combine the almond flour, salt, baking soda, flax meal, and cinnamon. Mix until well combined.
3. In a large bowl combine the eggs, orange juice, agave nectar, coconut oil, orange zest and vanilla. Mix until well combined.
4. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ones in small batches, mix until fully incorporated. Fold in the blueberries.
5. Fill the prepared muffin tin and bake for 30-35 minutes, until golden.

Low-Carb Lemon Poppyseed Sunshine Bread



This low carb Lemon Poppyseed Sunshine Bread lets its true self shine with every bite. Unadulterated lemon flavor, nutritious poppy seeds and buttery almond flour create a pure and honest treat.

Here's what you need for 24 servings:

- 1 teaspoon chia seeds plus 3 Tablespoons filtered water
- 5 cups blanched almond flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 5 omega-3, free range eggs
- 1/3 cup coconut oil, melted over low heat
- 2 Tablespoons lemon rind
- 1/3 cup agave nectar
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 Tablespoon poppy seeds

1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Generously grease a loaf pan with coconut oil. Set aside.
2. In a small cup combine the chia seeds and filtered water. Mix well and set aside (after 15 minutes it will become jelly-like).
3. In a medium bowl combine the blanched almond flour, baking soda and salt.
4. In a large bowl combine the eggs, coconut oil, lemon rind, agave nectar and extracts. Gently mix in the chia seed mixture.
5. Mix the wet and dry ingredients together. Fold in the poppy seeds, then transfer the batter to prepared loaf pan. Smooth the top of the loaf.
6. Bake for 45-60 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.
7. Allow to cool in the pan for 1 hour before slicing.

Real Healthy Pancakes



There's nothing quite as nice as a lazy Saturday.

The only way to make a lazy Saturday even more perfect is to start it with pancakes. This recipe for Real Healthy Pancakes is filled with protein and is low in carbs and sugar.

Don't even think about using a corn syrup or refined sugar filled topping. Stick with pure maple syrup and sliced fresh fruit.

Here's what you need for 10 servings:

- 3 large omega-3, free range eggs
- 1 Tablespoon agave nectar
- 1 Tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup filtered water
- 2 Tablespoons flax meal
- 1 1/2 cups blanched almond flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- coconut oil

1. In a blender combine the eggs, agave nectar, vanilla and water. Mix until smooth. Add the flax, almond flour, salt and baking soda. Mix until well combined.
2. Grease a large skillet or pancake griddle with coconut oil and place over medium heat. Place heaping tablespoons of batter onto the skillet and cook until bubbles form. Flip each pancake and cook for another minute, until golden on both sides.

Real Healthy Puff Pancake



Puff pancakes are probably the easiest pancakes to make since you just pour all the batter into a pie pan and bake it for 20 minutes — no flipping necessary.

Here's what you need:

- 2 Tablespoons organic butter
- 1/2 cup non-fat Greek yogurt
- 1/2 cup water
- 6 organic, omega 3, free range eggs
- 2 Tablespoons raw honey
- 1/2 cup low fat cottage cheese
- 1 cup almond meal
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Place butter in a pie plate and melt in the oven.
2. Place all the remaining ingredients in blender and blend for 1 minute. Pour batter into pie plate.
3. Bake until puffy and golden, about 20 minutes. Cut into wedges and serve with fresh strawberries and pure maple syrup.

Real Healthy Plantain Chips



Before I started eating only real, wholesome and unprocessed foods I used to occasionally snack on a salty bag of fried plantain chips. You know the ones — fried in vegetable oil and doused in salt and preservatives. Not what you'd call very healthy, although quite tasty.

These days I do not eat packaged snack, as a part of my commitment to eat only real food in 2013. So when I walked past a pile of plantains at the market I had the bright idea to create my own crunchy snack, baked and not fried.

This recipe is sooooo simple, and the result is a delicious, sinfully crunchy snack.

Here's what you need:

- 2 large unripe plantains
- olive oil
- juice from 1/2 a lemon
- freshly ground sea salt

1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease 2 large baking sheets with olive oil.
2. Peel the plantains and slice thinly on a diagonal. In a medium bowl toss the plantains with some olive oil, the juice from 1/2 a lemon and a generous sprinkle of salt.
3. Arrange in a single layer on the prepared baking sheets. Bake for 30 minutes, or until golden and crisp.

Real Healthy Crackers



Here's a fun snack that tastes like a cheat food, but is actually in line with my [Real Healthy Recipes Eating Guidelines](#).

Even though these are dairy-free, the taste reminds me of Cheez-It crackers.

These crackers are crunchiest when right out of the oven — once you store them in the fridge they soften.

Here's what you need:

- 1/2 cup blanched almond flour
- 1/4 cup coconut flour
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 packet stevia
- 1 omega-3, free range egg
- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil, melted
- 1 Tablespoon tomato paste
- olive oil and sea salt for garnish

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with wax paper.
2. In a medium bowl combine the almond flour, coconut flour, salt, basil and stevia.
3. Add the egg and mix well. Add the coconut oil and tomato paste, mix with your hands.
4. Place the dough on the prepared pan. Top with another piece of wax paper, and press into a rectangle that is about 1/8 inch thick. Be careful not to let the edges get too thin.
5. Use a knife to carefully cut the dough into 30 crackers — 6 lengthwise slices and 5 crosswise sections. Sprinkle with olive oil and sea salt.
6. Bake for 15 minutes, or until the crackers are golden.
7. Cool on the tray and then enjoy. Store leftovers in an airtight container in the fridge.

30 Crackers

Andrew's Fun Dip



My 7 year old son, Andrew, loves a challenge.

The other day he casually posed the question, “Mom, could you make any food into a healthy recipe?”

Well, mommy likes a challenge too, so I puffed out my chest and said, “Of course I can!”

He smiled and came back with, “Ok, how about Fun Dip?”

For those of you who don't have school aged children, Fun Dip is a packaged candy that's basically pure sugar with artificial colors and flavors. It has a candy stick that is dipped into colorful sugar, licked off and then dipped again. You know, the atrocious kind of thing that kids end up with after a birthday party or Halloween.

Well, I took Andrew's challenge and ended up with a fun, wholesome snack that's quick to make and entertaining to eat!

Here's what you need:

- 1 oz bag freeze dried strawberries
- 1/2 a jicama, peeled and sliced

1. Throw the freeze dried fruit into a food processor and blend until it becomes a fine powder. (Make sure you remove that little stay-fresh packet before blending!)
2. Serve the powdered fruit in a small bowl or ziplock bag with a handful of jicama sticks.

2 Servings

These sweet bars combine two of my favorite Maui indulgences — tender, sweet mango and buttery, salted macadamia nuts.

One bite of this treat and you'll hear the ocean waves in your ear.

Here's what you need:

- 1 cup dried, unsweetened mango
- 2 cups roasted, salted macadamia nuts
- 2 Tablespoons sesame seeds
- 1/4 cup roasted, salted sunflower seeds
- 1/4 cup shredded, unsweetened coconut, plus 2 Tablespoons
- 2 Tablespoons flax meal
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup coconut oil
- 1 Tablespoon raw honey

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Place parchment paper in the bottom of a 8x8 inch pan, and rub with melted coconut oil.
2. Place the dried mango in a bowl of hot water, and allow to sit for 15 minutes. Drain the water and chop the mango into small pieces.
3. Combine the macnuts, sesame seeds, sunflower seeds, 1/4 cup of the shredded coconut, flax meal, ginger, and cinnamon in a food processor. Pulse until fine and well combined.
4. In a saucepan over very low heat, melt the coconut oil and raw honey. Turn the food processor back on and drizzle the coconut oil mixture in. Allow to mix until fully incorporated.
5. Transfer the dough to a medium bowl. Carefully mix in the mango pieces.
6. Press the dough evenly into prepared pan then sprinkle with the remaining 2 Tablespoons of coconut.
7. Bake for 25-30 minutes until the top is golden. Allow to cool for 20 minutes in the pan, then transfer the entire pan to the fridge to chill before cutting into bars.
8. Serve and enjoy.

Here's what you need:

- 2 Tablespoons ground flax meal
- 3 Tablespoons filtered water
- 1/3 cup coconut oil, melted
- 1/4 cup pure maple syrup, grade b
- 1/2 cup almond butter (no sugar added)
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 cup raw pumpkin seeds
- 1/2 cup roasted, salted sunflower seeds
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds
- 1/2 cup mini dairy-free, soy-free chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup unsweetened, shredded coconut

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Line the bottom of a 8x8 inch pan with parchment paper, and coat with coconut oil. Set aside.
2. In a small cup combine the flax meal and water. Whisk with a fork and set aside to thicken.
3. In a small saucepan, over low heat, combine the coconut oil, maple syrup, almond butter and almond extract. Stir occasionally and remove from heat when melted. Allow to cool, about 10 minutes.
4. Add the thickened flax meal to the saucepan and mix to combine.
5. In a medium bowl, combine the seeds, nuts, coconut and chocolate chips. Pour the almond butter mixture in and mix well. Press the mixture into the prepared pan.
6. Bake for 25-35 minutes, until golden and bubbly. Remove from oven and allow to cool in the pan for 15 minutes.
7. Once cooled, loosen the sides with a knife, then invert onto a cutting board. Remove the parchment paper by peeling off carefully. Place the entire cutting board into the fridge for 15 minutes — this is an important step that will ensure that your bars harden completely and do not crumble. After 15 minutes, remove from fridge and cut into 20 bars. Store in an airtight container in the fridge.

The Cheesy

- 1 bunch kale, washed and torn, stems discarded
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- dash of salt and pepper
- 3/4 cup nutritional yeast
- 1/4 cup blanched almond flour

1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees F.
2. In a large bowl mix the kale pieces with all of the ingredients.
3. Spread evenly on foil-lined baking sheets.
4. Bake for 12 minutes, watching closely that they do not burn. Remove from oven when crispy.

 - 1/4 teaspoon ground sage
 - 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
 - dash of pepper
 - 2 teaspoons coconut oil
 - 2 cloves garlic, minced
 - 1 small onion, finely chopped
 - 2 celery stalks, finely chopped
 - 2 carrots, finely chopped
 - 1/4 cup pecans, finely chopped
 - 1/4 cup fresh parsley, finely chopped
1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
 2. In a medium bowl combine the ground pork with all of the spices. Don't be afraid to get your hands dirty!
 3. Place a skillet over medium heat and warm the coconut oil. Add the garlic, onion, celery, carrots, pecans and parsley. Cook for about 3 minutes, until soft. Set the mixture aside to cool.
 4. Add the vegetable mixture into the ground pork and combine well. Use your hands to form golf ball sized meatballs.
 5. Place the meatballs in an oven-safe baking dish. Bake for 30 minutes, or until cooked all the way through.

Apricot Loaf with Orange Glaze



I am a total believer in the health benefits of a diet with no grains or refined sugars. In fact I eat this way, and have for quite some time now. But on the other hand I LOVE to bake...there was no chance that I'd give up baking. The good news is that with a few ingredient substitutions it is more than possible to create delicious, moist and sweet baked goods all while sticking to a grain-free and refined-sugar-free diet.

This Apricot Loaf with Orange Glaze is delicately sweet and perfect to enjoy with a cup of tea.

Here's what you need:

For the Bread:

- 5 cups almond meal (buy at Trader Joe's- 4 cups in each bag, or grind raw almonds in food processor)
 - 1 heaping teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
 - 6 omega-3, free range eggs
 - 4 Tablespoons raw honey
 - 2 teaspoons apple cider vinegar
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1/2 cup dried apricots, finely chopped
 - 1/3 cup pecans, finely chopped
1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Generously grease a loaf pan with coconut oil.
 2. In a large bowl combine the almond meal, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and cloves.
 3. In a separate bowl, whisk eggs then add honey, vinegar, vanilla. Add the wet ingredients to dry ones and mix until combined.
 4. Gently fold in the apricots and pecans.
 5. Fill prepared loaf pan, smooth the top of the dough. Bake for 45 mins or until golden brown.
 6. Loosen side of bread immediately after removing from oven, then allow to cool completely before removing from pan.
 7. Place the loaf in the freezer for 20 minutes before applying the glaze.

For the Glaze:

- 3 Tablespoons coconut oil, melted
 - 3 Tablespoons coconut butter, softened
 - 1 Tablespoon raw honey, melted
 - 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - zest from an orange
1. In a small bowl whisk the glaze ingredients together. When the loaf has been frozen for 20 minutes, pour the glaze over the top and smooth it out, allowing glaze to drip down the sides.

**Making the glaze work: The coconut ingredients in the glaze are hard when cold, so to make your glaze work it's important to keep your loaf cold, and to store your loaf in the fridge once glazed.*

Of course the kids need plenty of carbohydrates to support their active, growing bodies!

Most quinoa recipes are savory, so this minty, fruity salad is a refreshing twist on the nutritious-packed superfood.

Here's what you need for 6 servings:

- 3/4 cup plain greek yogurt
- 2 Tablespoons lime juice, divided
- 1-15 fresh mint leaves, minced
- 2 cups cooked quinoa
- dash of salt and pepper
- 1 cup blueberries
- 1 cup green grapes, halved
- 1/2 cup raspberries
- 1 Tablespoon agave nectar

1. In a small bowl combine the yogurt, 1 tablespoon lime juice and the mint. Pour over the cooked quinoa and mix well. Season with salt and pepper.
2. In another bowl combine the fruit, agave nectar and remaining lime juice.
3. Cover and refrigerate each bowl for 2 hours, to allow the flavors to emerge, then combine the fruit with the quinoa and serve.

Here's what you need:

- 1 teaspoon Chia seeds plus 3 Tablespoons filtered water
- 2 Tablespoons raw honey, melted
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 2 Tablespoon coconut oil, melted
- 1 cup sliced almonds, raw and unsalted
- 1 cup pecans, raw and unsalted
- 1 cup pistachio nutmeats, unsalted
- 1 cup dried blueberries, unsweetened
- 1/2 cup sesame seeds
- 1 cup large, unsweetened coconut flakes

1. Mix the chia seeds and water in a small cup and set aside for 15 minutes, until it becomes gel-like.
2. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Generously grease a baking pan with coconut oil.
3. In a small bowl combine the honey, extracts, coconut oil and chia seed mixture.
4. In a large bowl combine the nuts, berries, seeds and coconut flakes. Mix in the wet ingredients until well combined.
5. Spread over the prepared baking sheet. Bake for 10 minutes, stir, and then bake for another 10 minutes until evenly golden.

Lamb and Apricot Slow Cooker Stew



Cooking lamb was completely new to me, and I'll admit that I was a little nervous going into this recipe. With the majority of the cooking down in the slow cooker, my lamb turned out perfect — tenderly falling off the bone.

If you've never cooked lamb, give it a shot! You might find that it's your new favorite.

Here's what you need:

- 2 Tablespoons coconut oil, divided
- 2 yellow onions, thinly sliced
- 5 carrots, sliced into rounds
- 1 sweet potato, peeled and cubed
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 Tablespoon fresh ginger, minced
- 2 Anaheim chili peppers, seeded and diced
- 6oz dried apricots, chopped
- 2 pounds lamb meat, bone-in
- 32 oz organic beef broth
- 1 Tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 Tablespoons fresh dill, minced
- 1/4 cup fresh parsley, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- salt and pepper

1. In a large skillet melt one Tablespoon of the coconut oil over medium high heat. Add the onions, carrots, sweet potato, garlic, ginger, chili pepper and apricots. Sauté for 10 minutes and then transfer everything to the slow cooker.
2. Salt and pepper the lamb. Add a Tablespoon of coconut oil to the skillet and brown the lamb, about 6 minutes. Transfer the lamb to the slow cooker.
3. In a medium bowl combine the broth, lemon juice, and remaining fresh and dried herbs. Mix well then pour into the slow cooker.
4. Cook on low for 6 to 8 hours. Salt and pepper to taste and then serve.

- 1/2 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/2 teaspoon dried rosemary
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 Tablespoons coconut flour
- 2 Tablespoons almond meal
- Olive oil for cooking

For the Sauce:

- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup yellow onion, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 Tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 jar organic, marinara sauce

1. Bake a loaf of [Almond Bread](#) using blanched almond flour. Once cooled, cut into thick slices.
2. For the Meatballs: Combine all of the meatball ingredients in a bowl, mix it all up with your hands until fully combined. Form 1.5 inch balls.
3. Place some olive oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. Evenly space the meatballs around the pan. After a few minutes turn the meatballs to brown on all sides.
4. For the Sauce: Place the olive oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add the onion, garlic, parsley and paprika. Cook for a few minutes, stirring often. Add the jar of marinara and continue to heat for 5 minutes.
5. Assemble your Caveman MeatBall Subs: Place a slice of almond bread on each plate. Spread with some sauce, top with meat balls and more sauce.

Spice-Rubbed Chicken Breast & Moroccan Herb Dressing



I have 2 goals when cooking chicken breast for dinner, and this recipe meets them both.

My first goal is that the finished product be juicy, and not dry. There's nothing worse than trying to choke down dry chicken. This recipe calls for brining the chicken breast in a bag of water and spices, which locks moisture deep in the meat. I mention below to keep your grill closed while cooking, this also helps create a juicy piece of meat.

My second goal is that the finished product be filled with rich flavor. Bland chicken ranks right up there with dry chicken on the list of things I'd rather not eat. The spice rub in this recipe coats the chicken in savory flavor, and the Moroccan herb dressing adds another dimension.

Even though the ingredient list is long, if you look closely you'll see that it's mainly a bunch of spices, the whole process is quick and painless. Just remember to start your brining 2 hours before dinner, the rest comes together very quickly.

Here's what you need:

For the Brining:

- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 7 cups filtered water
- 2 Tablespoons salt
- 1 Tablespoon coconut aminos
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon whole black peppercorns
- 2.5 pounds organic, skinless, boneless chicken breast

For the Spice Rub:

- 1 Tablespoon ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 teaspoons allspice
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil, melted

For the Moroccan Herb Dressing:

- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin
- 2 teaspoons sweet paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- dash of pepper
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro, minced
- 1/4 cup fresh parsley, minced

1. For the Brining: Place all of the brining ingredients into a gallon-sized Ziplock bag. Add the chicken breasts. Place in the fridge for 2 full hours.
2. For the Spice Rub: Preheat your grill on high heat. Combine all of the spices in a small bowl and then add the melted coconut oil.
3. Remove the chicken from brine, rinse well and pat dry. Rub the spice mixture all over the chicken breasts. Place on the preheated grill for 4 minutes each side, with the lid closed. Remove once the chicken is cooked through.
4. For the Dressing: In a small bowl combine all of the ingredients together. Whisk until well combined.
5. Slice the cooked chicken breasts and top with a generous serving of dressing.

If you have leftover [Real Healthy Steak Sauce](#) then drizzle some of that over the steak as well!

Here's what you need:

For the Dressing:

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered stevia
- juice from 1 lemon
- 2 teaspoon balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tablespoon olive oil
- 2 Tablespoons fresh chives, minced
- dash of salt and pepper

For the Salad

- 4 oz cooked and sliced rib-eye steak (grass-fed of course!)
- 2 hard boiled eggs, sliced
- 1/2 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 avocado, sliced and dressed with lemon juice and sweet paprika
- 6 green onions, grilled
- 4 cups mixed greens

1. Prepare your ingredients and set them aside, ready for salad assembly.
2. In a small bowl whisk together the dressing ingredients.
3. Arrange the greens on two plates, then top with the remaining salad ingredients. Drizzle with the dressing.

Grain-Free Dolmas



These dolmas are packed with flavor, not grains. Cauliflower rice takes the place of traditional rice, making this dish healthier and just as tasty.

I used an expedited cooking method –using an oven — however if you prefer to cook traditionally then do not pre-cook the meat and place the dolmas in a large pot with a couple cups of water on the stove for 2 hours, or until cooked through.

Here's what you need:

- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, diced
- 1 pound ground pork (or ground meat of your choice)
- 2 gloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- pinch of allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground coriander
- 12 prunes, finely minced
- 1 head cauliflower, shredded in food processor
- 2 lemons, one for juice and one sliced
- dash of salt and pepper
- 20 grape leaves
- 1/4 cup water
- 3 bay leaves

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
2. In a large skillet, over medium heat, warm the coconut oil. Add the onion and cook until clear. Add the pork, garlic, cinnamon, cumin, oregano, allspice, ginger, coriander and prunes. Cook until the meat is still a little pink.
3. Add the shredded cauliflower and combine with the meat mixture, cooking for 3 minutes. Squeeze the lemon juice over the mixture, season with salt and pepper, and stir. Set the mixture aside until it is cool enough to handle.
4. Carefully separate the grape leaves and unroll. Spoon a small amount of the meat mixture in the center of the leaf, roll the bottom of the leaf up, then fold the sides over and continue to roll until the end is tucked underneath.
5. Lay the dolmas in a 9×13 baking pan, seam-side down. Lay the lemon slices over the dolmas and squeeze any remaining lemon juice over the pan. Add the water and bay leaves to the pan.
6. Tightly cover with foil. Bake for 30-45 minutes until the leaves turn a dark shade and the water has evaporated. Remove the bay leaves.
7. Serve on a bed of shredded cabbage.

Real Healthy Orange Chicken



Save lots of calories by making this healthy orange chicken rather than take-out.

Here's a recipe that takes all the guilt out of orange-flavored chicken. There's no sugar and no fryer involved. Just skinless, boneless chicken breast, marinated in orange juice, pan seared and then baked. Serve it up with orange-spiked green beans.

Here's what you need for 4 servings:

For the Chicken:

- 2 cups fresh orange juice
- 2 Tablespoons grated orange zest
- 4 skinless, boneless, chicken breasts
- fresh ground pepper
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil

For the Green Beans:

- 10 oz fresh, organic, green beans
- 1/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 1 Tablespoon grated orange zest
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- dash of salt and pepper

For the Orange-Brandy Sauce

- 2 Tablespoon coconut oil
- 3 shallots, minced
- 2 Tablespoons brandy
- 1 cup fresh orange juice
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1 navel orange, peeled and each segment cut into 3 pieces
- 1 Tablespoon parsley, chopped
- Dash of salt and pepper

Cook the Chicken:

1. Place the orange juice and orange zest in a large ziplock bag. Season each side of the chicken breasts with salt and pepper. Place the chicken breasts in the ziplock bag, coating each side with juice. Marinate in the refrigerator for 2-3 hours.
2. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
3. Grease a 12-inch, oven-proof skillet with the olive oil. Place over medium-high heat. Add the chicken breasts in a single layer, cooking for 3 minutes. Turn the chicken, season with a sprinkle of salt and pepper. Place the skillet in the oven for 15 minutes, or until a thermometer registers 165 degrees F in the center of the thickest breast.
4. Remove from oven and cover with foil as you make the sauce and cook the beans.

Cook the Green Beans:

1. Wash the beans, snap off and discard the stems. Place in a large ziplock bag with the orange juice and orange zest. Allow to marinate in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.
2. Heat a medium sized skillet over medium heat. Grease with the olive oil. Remove beans from refrigerator, discarding the juice. Add to the skillet and cook, covered for about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove cover, increase the heat and cook for an additional 3 minutes, until the beans are bright green.

Cooke the Sauce:

1. In a medium skillet heat the coconut oil over medium-high heat. Add the minced shallot, cook, stirring often, for 2 minutes. Turn off the heat, add the brandy. Return to the heat and cook, scraping the bottom, until the brandy has almost evaporated, about 30 seconds. Increase the heat to high, add the orange juice. Boil for 5 minutes. Add the chicken broth, boil for 3 minutes.
2. Add in the orange segments and the parsley. Turn off heat. Season with salt and pepper.

To Serve:

1. Cut the chicken on the diagonal into thin slices and arrange over a pile of green beans. Drizzle with the orange-brandy sauce.

Macnut-Crusted Pesto-Stuffed Chicken with Acorn Squash



One look at this chicken dish and you can see that it's something special.

It all started when I found a large bunch of fresh basil and had a hankering for pesto...then entered a bag of macadamia nuts and some free-range chicken tenders. I wasn't really sure where this dish was going to lead, but I'm glad that I took the time to find out. It ended up being one of the most delicious dinners ever.

This recipe has a few extra steps, due to the stuffing and crusting, but it's well worth the effort when you're biting into the tender, flavorful result of your efforts.

Here's what you need:

For the Acorn Squash: (If you want to skip the acorn squash, serve on a bed of arugula.)

- 1 acorn squash
- salt and pepper
- juice from half a lemon (save other half for pesto)

For the Pesto:

- 1/2 cup macadamia nuts
- 2 cups fresh basil leaves
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1/3 cup nutritional yeast
- Juice from half a lemon
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- dash of sea salt

For the Chicken:

- 2 lbs boneless skinless chicken tenders
- 1/3 cup Dijon mustard
- 2 Tablespoon olive oil
- 2 Tablespoons pure maple syrup, grade B
- 1 Tablespoon sweet paprika
- 1/3 cup macadamia nuts, finely chopped
- 1/8 cup coconut flour
- salt and pepper

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Lightly grease 2 baking pans with olive oil.

2. For Acorn Squash: Slice the acorn squash in half, scoop out the seeds and using a sharp knife score the inside of the squash flesh. Place in one of the prepared baking pans and drizzle with the lemon juice, and season with salt and pepper. Bake for 50 minutes. Remove from oven and set aside.
3. For Pesto: Place the macadamia nuts, basil leaves, garlic, nutritional yeast, salt and pepper and lemon juice in a food processor. Pulse until well combined while drizzling in the olive oil. Set 1/3 of the pesto aside to serve with the chicken.
4. For Chicken: Rinse the chicken tenders with cold water and pat dry. Place between two sheets of wax paper and lightly pound with the back of a wooden spoon. The idea is to flatten the tenders out so they are wider, yet still intact.
5. Place a tablespoon of pesto in the center of each tender, and spread out until the pesto evenly covers the entire side. Roll the tender up and place, seam side down, in the prepared baking pan, leaving space between each chicken roll.
6. In a small saucepan combine the mustard, olive oil, syrup and paprika over low heat. Mix constantly, and remove from heat after 3 minutes, when the sauce is uniform. Spread a tablespoon of the mustard sauce over the top of each chicken roll, reserve the leftover sauce.
7. In a small bowl combine the chopped macnuts, coconut flour, salt and pepper. Press a tablespoon of the macadamia nut topping over the top of each chicken roll.
8. Cover the entire pan with foil. Bake for 25 minutes covered. Remove the foil and turn on the high broiler. Broil, watching closely, for 2-5 minutes, until the tops are nicely browned.
9. Scoop the cubed acorn squash out of the shells and place in a skillet over medium heat. Add the reserved mustard sauce, and mix until fully combined. Continue to heat until the squash is fork-tender and the sauce covers each piece.
10. Place a scoop of acorn squash on each plate, then top with slices of chicken roll. Serve with a few dollops of the reserved pesto.

Italian Green Beans & Eggs



Fresh, organic green beans are hard for me to resist when I spot them at the store or farmer's market, but then I find myself wondering how to cook them.

There's the standard green bean salad, but that gets old.

This recipe came about as a combination of whatever-I-had-on-hand and trying to recreate a dish that I'd eaten years ago with the main ingredients of green beans, eggs and tomato.

The tender green beans and onion, soft eggs and tangy-sweet tomato sauce make this side dish both tasty and satisfying. And best of all it's really quick!

Here's what you need:

- 1 TBL olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 cups fresh green beans, trimmed and cut into 1 inch segments
- 1/2 cup tomato sauce (no sugar added)
- 3 omega 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- Salt pepper

1. Heat olive oil in large skillet over medium.
2. Add onions and garlic, stirring occasionally until translucent.
3. Add green beans and cover, reduce to low heat. After 8-10 minutes, when beans are bright and tender, remove cover.
4. Add spaghetti sauce. Mix and cook for 3 minutes.
5. In small bowl crack and beat eggs. Add basil, salt and pepper. Add the skillet.
6. Cook, stirring often until eggs are set and sauce is absorbed.

Gluten and Dairy-Free Pizza



This dough recipe calls for yeast, which is gluten-free, that gives the pizza an authentic flavor. If you are able to handle dairy, then sprinkle it with some organic cheese. If not, then enjoy it like I did, with lots of tasty sauce and toppings!

Here's what you need:

- 1 Tablespoon raw honey
- 1 packet (2 tsp) active dry yeast
- 1/4 cup warm, filtered water
- 3/4 cup blanched almond flour
- 3 Tablespoons coconut flour
- 1/2 cup arrowroot starch
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 omega-3 egg
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup organic pizza sauce (no sugar added)
- 1/2 cup ground sausage
- 1/2 cup green bell pepper, thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup red onion, thinly sliced
- 3 Tablespoons sliced black olives

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Lightly grease a baking sheet with olive oil.
2. In a small bowl combine the honey, yeast and warm water. Mix carefully with a fork. Set aside for 5 minutes, until foamy.
3. In a medium bowl combine the almond flour, coconut flour, arrowroot starch and salt. Work out the lumps with a fork. Add the egg, olive oil and vinegar to the yeast mixture and mix to combine.
4. Add the wet ingredients to the dry ones. Mix well and form a ball of dough. Work the dough for about 30 seconds with your hands, smoothing out any lumps.
5. Place the dough ball in the middle of your prepared pan. Dip your fingers in olive oil, then use them to flatten the dough into your preferred pizza shape (hearts are fun!). Place the dough in preheated oven for 5-7 minutes.
6. In a small skillet saute the bell pepper and red onion with a drizzle of olive oil for 5 minutes or until tender. Remove from skillet. Add the ground sausage to the skillet and cook until browned, about 5 minutes.
7. Top the crust with sauce, sausage, bell pepper, onion and sliced olives. Bake for another 5-7 minutes.
8. Slice and enjoy immediately.

(Bean-less) Chili Loaded Sweet Potato



So why make a bean-less chili? Beans contain phytates which inhibit nutrient absorption and cause inflammation—ever heard the term ‘musical fruit’? Beans also contain lectins which can mess with healthy hormonal functions. And to top it off, beans are high in carbohydrates. Beans (also known as legumes) are promoted as a healthy food, because of their fiber, vitamins and minerals, and “high” protein content. In fact, beans aren’t a dense protein source, since most contain 2-3 times as many carbs as protein. When compared to vegetables and fruits, beans are lacking in both fiber and micronutrient density.

This dish is easy to put together, just make sure that you afford yourself the 1.5 hours of simmer time.

Here’s what you need:

- 3 purple sweet potatoes
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 bell peppers, red, orange and yellow, chopped
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 1.5 pounds ground pork sausage (or your ground meat of choice)
- 1 Tablespoon chilli powder
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1 Tablespoon sweet paprika
- pinch of cloves
- 1 1/2 Tablespoon unsweetened cocoa
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon sea salt
- 2 (15oz) cans organic tomato sauce
- 1 Tablespoon apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup filtered water
- 1 avocado

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Wash the sweet potatoes and pierce the skin in several places with a knife. Bake for 45 minutes.
2. In a large pot, heat the olive oil over medium. Add garlic, bell peppers and onion. Cook for about 5 minutes, until tender.
3. Add the pork and chili powder and cook until the meat is no longer pink.
4. Add the rest of the spices, tomato sauce, vinegar and water. Bring to a simmer. Reduce heat to low and simmer, uncovered for 1 1/2 hours.
5. To serve: Slice open a piece of sweet potato and top with a big scoop of chili and avocado slices. Season the avocado with lemon juice, cumin, sweet paprika and sea salt.

* For a meal lower in carbs, serve your chili over scrambled eggs instead of sweet potato

Real Healthy Broccoli and Beef



This recipe for Real Healthy Broccoli and Beef has all the attributes of the perfect weeknight dinner...

2. It's bursting with protein and fiber.
3. It's low in carbs.
4. It has aaaaaaaamazing flavor!
5. It doesn't contain any gluten, soy, sugar or MSG.

In my book this dinner recipe gets a perfect 10!

Here's what you need:

- 2/3 cup coconut aminos
- 1 1/2 Tablespoons fresh ginger, minced
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 cup filtered water
- 1/3 cup pure maple syrup, grade b
- 3 Tablespoons arrowroot starch
- 2 Tablespoon Olive oil, divided
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- 4 cups organic broccoli, cut into small pieces
- 1.5 lbs grassfed flank, skirt or minute steak, cut into very thin strips

1. In a medium bowl combine the coconut aminos, ginger, garlic, water, syrup and arrowroot. Set aside.
2. Heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil, on high, in a large skillet or wok. Add the green onions and broccoli, saute for 5 minutes. Remove from skillet.
3. Heat the remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil and stir-fry the steak until almost done, about 4 minutes.
4. Return the veggies to the skillet and add the sauce. Heat until the sauce boils and thickens, about 3 minutes.
5. Serve over [Stir Fried Cauliflower rice](#).

(Gluten-Free & Sugar-Free) Awesome Crispy Orange Chicken



I used to LOVE getting crispy orange chicken from our old favorite Chinese take-out restaurant, and sometimes would even get frozen crispy orange chicken from the store to cook up for a quick dinner. While those traditional orange chicken dishes tasted great they were filled with gluten, sugar, soy and unhealthy fats.

So I created this recipe for crispy orange chicken with zero gluten, sugar or soy. It is sweetened with fruit-only orange juice concentrate and zero-calorie Stevia.

This dish is really quick to throw together for a weeknight dinner, and tastes so good you won't believe it's healthy. As a bonus you won't get that big bellyache like with the take-out version.

Here's what you need:

- 1/2 cup orange juice concentrate (no sugar added)
- 3 Tablespoons coconut aminos
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- Zest from one orange
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- Dash red pepper flakes
- 2 packets Stevia
- 1 tablespoon coconut oil
- 2.5 lbs boneless skinless chicken thigh, cut into bite sized pieces
- Dash salt and pepper
- Dash granulated onion
- 1 tablespoon sesame seeds
- 3 green onions, chopped

1. Combine the orange juice concentrate, coconut aminos, olive oil, orange zest, red pepper flakes and Stevia in a small bowl. Mix well and set aside.
2. In a large skillet, heat the coconut oil on medium-high.
3. Generously season the chicken pieces with salt, pepper and granulated onion. Add chicken to hot skillet and brown on all sides.
4. When chicken is almost fully cooked, add the orange sauce, stirring to coat all of the chicken. Cook, uncovered, simmering the sauce until thickened and fully sticking to the chicken.
5. Garnish with sesame seeds and freshly chopped green onion.

Real Healthy Meatloaf



Who doesn't have fond memories of meatloaf dinners?

This recipe uses healthy, grassfed beef and takes out the gluten and corn syrup. The hard boiled egg surprise in the middle is a fun way to pack in some more protein.

Here's what you need:

- 1/2 cup unsweetened coconut milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- Dash of salt and pepper
- 1 Tablespoon balsamic vinegar glaze
- 1 cup almond meal
- 1 1/2 lbs grassfed ground beef
- 1 cup mushrooms, chopped
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 4 hard boiled eggs, peeled

For Glaze:

- 1/2 cup [homemade ketchup](#)
- 2 Tablespoons balsamic vinegar glaze

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
2. In a large mixing bowl combine the coconut milk, egg, salt and pepper, balsamic glaze, and almond meal.
3. Add the ground beef, mushrooms, and onion. Press half of the mixture in a loaf pan. Line up the 4 hard boiled eggs (see picture) and then press the remaining beef mixture on top. Smooth out the top. Bake for an hour.
4. While the meatloaf bakes, mix the ketchup and balsamic glaze. After an hour of baking, remove the meatloaf from oven, pour the glaze over the top and smooth out. Return to oven for 10 minutes.
5. Serve with [cauliflower rice](#).

Blackberry Chicken Tenders on Asparagus



This fast, tasty dinner recipe centers around protein and veggies. Blackberries add a unique and unexpected flavor.

Here's what you need:

For the Chicken:

- 1.5 pounds organic, skinless, boneless chicken tenders
 - 1 cup organic blackberries
 - 1/4 cup coconut aminos
 - 1/4 cup plum vinegar
 - 1 Tablespoon olive oil
 - 1/8 cup yellow onion, minced
 - 4 garlic cloves, minced
 - 1 packet Stevia
1. Rinse the chicken tenders and pat dry. Place in a large ziplock bag.
 2. Combine the rest of the ingredients in a high speed blender until smooth.
 3. *optional* Strain the seeds from marinade (If you don't mind the crunch, then leave the seeds in!)
 4. Pour the marinade into the bag of chicken, seal and place in the refrigerator for 4 to 6 hours.
 5. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Place the marinated chicken in a baking pan and bake for 30 minutes.
 6. Remove from oven, drain off excess marinade, then place under high broil for 4 minutes, watching closely.

For the Blackberry Sauce:

- 1 TBL coconut oil

 2. Simmer, stirring often, until the blackberries become bright and the sauce reaches desired consistency.

3. If you wish to thicken the sauce more, add 1/2 teaspoon of arrowroot powder.
4. *optional* Strain the seeds from the sauce (If you don't mind the crunch, then leave the seeds in!)
5. Serve over the cooked chicken.

Sauce: 4 servings

For the Asparagus:

- 1 bunch skinny asparagus, ends trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Lightly grease a baking sheet with olive oil.
 2. In a bowl combine the asparagus, oil, salt, pepper, garlic and lemon juice. Spread over prepared pan.
 3. Bake for 17 minutes, or until tender and bright green.

Whole Roasted Chicken and Veggies



One of the most satisfying things to make for dinner is a whole roasted organic chicken, flanked with organic, herb-coated veggies. It looks super impressive without being difficult at all to make. And best of all it only takes very little actual prep time.

This is the recipe that I use for my Sunday roasted chicken. Serve with a fresh loaf of [almond bread](#). Divine!

Here's what you need:

- 3 bulbs garlic
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- salt and pepper
- 4 Tablespoons coconut oil, gently melted
- 1 Tablespoon each minced, fresh rosemary, oregano, tarragon
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- zest and juice from one lemon
- 4 large organic carrots, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 3 organic zucchini, cut into 1 inch half-moons
- 1 cup pearl onions, ends trimmed
- 1 cup Brussels sprouts, halved
- 1 hormone-free, organic chicken
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 Tablespoon coconut flour

1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
2. Cut off the tips of each section of the garlic bulbs. Place the bulbs in a small glass pan. Brush the tops with the olive oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover the pan with aluminum foil and set aside.
3. In a small bowl combine the melted coconut oil, fresh herbs, minced garlic, lemon zest and lemon juice. Set 1/3 of the mixture aside for the veggies.
4. In a large bowl combine the carrots, zucchini, pearl onions and Brussels sprouts with 1/3 of the herb mixture. Season with salt and pepper. Set aside.
5. Rinse your chicken and pat dry. Carefully slide your hand between the skin and the breast and liberally rub some of the herb mixture. Rub the rest of the herb mixture over the top of the chicken. Season the chicken with salt and pepper and tie the legs together with kitchen string. Place the chicken on a large roasting pan, and surround it with the veggies.

6. Roast the chicken and veggies for 30 minutes. Reduce the oven temperature to 350 degrees F, pour 1/2 cup of chicken broth over the chicken and veggies, and place the garlic pan in the oven off to the side.
7. For the next 90 minutes, pour 1/2 cup of broth over the chicken and veggies every 30 minutes as it cooks at 350 degrees F.
8. To see if the chicken is done, poke the tip of a sharp knife between the leg and body and see that the juices run clear. Transfer the chicken and veggies to a large platter. Add a couple of the roasted garlic bulbs to the chicken platter, reserving one for the gravy.
9. To make gravy: Pour all of the roasting pan juices into a skillet and bring to a simmer. Remove the garlic cloves from one of the roasted bulbs and smash with a fork. Add garlic to skillet. Mix in the tablespoon of coconut flour, and whisk the gravy as it simmers. Cook for 10 minutes, or until desired thickness. Season with salt and pepper.

Vegetable Soup with Savory Pesto



If you are a fan of minestrone soup, but don't want the carbs of beans and noodles, then you'll love this all-vegetable alternative. The strands of cabbage mimic those of noodles and the pesto adds amazing flavor.

Here's what you need for 10 servings:

For the Soup:

- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 1 large organic yellow onion, chopped
- 1 organic red bell pepper, chopped
- 2 large organic carrots, chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 small organic green cabbage, thinly sliced
- 1 cup organic cauliflower pieces
- 3 Tablespoons fresh Rosemary, minced
- 3 Tablespoon fresh Italian parsley, minced
- 2 bay leaves
- 8 cups chicken broth

For the Pesto:

- 4 garlic cloves
- 2 cups basil leaves
- 1/2 cup walnuts
- juice from half a lemon
- 1/2 cup nutritional yeast
- 1 cup olive oil

1. In a large soup pot, over medium heat, warm the olive oil. Add onion, bell pepper, carrots, and garlic. Cook until the vegetables are tender.
2. Add the cabbage, cauliflower pieces, rosemary, parsley and bay leaves. After 5 minutes add the chicken stock. Allow to simmer, covered for 20 minutes then season with salt and pepper.
3. For the Pesto: In a food processor, combine the garlic, basil, walnuts, lemon juice and nutritional yeast. Pulse until all ingredients are mixed in. With the blade spinning, slowly pour in the olive oil. Continue to blend until the mixture is smooth.
4. Fill each soup bowl with the soup and top with a generous spoonful of the pesto.

Cold Day Chicken Soup



A time-tested way of showing love is to share homemade soup.

This Cold Day Chicken Soup is extra special as it doesn't contain any high-carb ingredients like noodles or potatoes, like most do.

Enjoy and allow this simple, nourishing meal warm you from the inside out.

Here's what you need for 8 servings:

- 1 Tablespoon coconut oil
- 1 medium organic yellow onion, chopped
- 3 carrots, grated
- 2 celery stalks, finely chopped
- 1 Tablespoon curry powder
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 quarts chicken broth
- 3 cups diced roasted chicken
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 organic apple, chopped
- dash of salt and pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- zest from 1 lemon
- 2 cups unsweetened coconut milk

1. In a large pot, over medium heat, melt the coconut oil and add the onion, carrots and celery. After 5 minutes add the garlic and curry powder.
2. After a couple minutes add the chicken broth, chicken, bay leave, apple, pepper, thyme, and lemon zest. Stir well. Bring to a simmer and cook for 40 minutes.
3. Stir in the coconut milk, and some salt if desired, remove the bay leaf and serve.

Teriyaki Chicken Plate



A marinade can make or break the flavor of your meal.

This marinade uses Zevia lemon lime soda, which is sweetened with stevia, making it all natural and calorie free. This adds sweetness to the chicken without cane sugar. The intensity of the flavor, when marinated overnight, is amazing.

I like to serve this over a big bed of baby arugula and a scoop of cooked quinoa.

Here's what you need for 4 servings:

- 1 can naturally sweetened, zero calorie lemon lime soda (Zevia brand)
 - ½ cup soy sauce
 - ¾ cup brown rice vinegar
 - 1 medium yellow onion – half minced and half thinly sliced
 - 4 cloves garlic, smashed
 - 1 Tablespoon fresh ginger, grated
 - 1 Tablespoon coconut crystals (or 1 teaspoon agave nectar or 1 packet Stevia)
 - 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs
 - 2 teaspoons coconut oil
 - 1 bunch asparagus, trimmed and cut into 1 inch segments
 - 2 Tablespoons chopped cilantro
 - optional *baby arugula and cooked quinoa
1. Combine the soda, soy sauce, vinegar, minced onion, garlic, ginger and coconut crystals in a bowl. Add the chicken and turn to coat. Place in refrigerator overnight.
 2. Remove chicken from marinade and pat dry. Reserve 1 cup of marinade.
 3. Heat one teaspoon of coconut oil in a large skillet. Add the chicken and heat on medium high, turning once, for 8-10 minutes, until browned and cooked through. Transfer to a plate.
 4. Wipe out the skillet. Heat remaining 1 teaspoon of coconut oil. Add the sliced onion and asparagus. Cook for 5 minutes, until browned. Add the reserved marinade and boil until slightly reduced. Add the cilantro.
 5. Serve over a bed of baby arugula and cooked quinoa.

Turkey Kebabs with Mint Yogurt Dip



This Mediterranean dinner is easy to put together and tastes amazing.

The turkey kebabs are high in protein, and the rest of the plate is filled with savory, fiber-filled veggies. It's very satisfying without the waist-expanding carbs that most dinners are filled with.

Here's what you need for the Turkey Kebabs:

- 1 1/2 pounds turkey breast, de-boned, trimmed of skin and cut into thin strips
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup almond meal (more if needed)
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon sweet paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- dash of salt (optional)
- 2 Tablespoons fresh parsley, finely chopped
- 1 Tablespoon fresh mint, finely chopped

1. In a food processor, blend the turkey strips until ground. Add the remaining ingredients and pulse until well blended.
2. Pre-heat your grill or grill pan.
3. Lightly grease your hands, then press the meat into the wooden skewers until it covers about 3-4 inches in an elongated meatball shape. If the meat is not sticking then add some more almond meal.
4. Grill for about 8 minutes per side.

Chicken Sausage, Cauliflower and Kale Casserole



The only way that I used to eat cauliflower was slathered in real mayonnaise and then smothered with cheese. Not exactly healthy. What I love about this casserole is that the ricotta cheese gives you the creamy cauliflower experience, while also sneaking in kale — which is high in calcium and has loads of vitamins — and some chicken sausage for protein.

This nutritional jackpot takes home cooked comfort food to a real healthy place.

Here's what you need for 6 servings:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, diced
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 cups kale, chopped
- dash of salt and pepper
- Pinch of each, dried: thyme, rosemary, tarragon, and parsley
- 4 links nitrate-free, chicken sausage, sliced into half moons
- 1 head cauliflower, cut into small florets
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 cup fat free ricotta cheese
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese, shredded and divided

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Lightly grease a casserole dish with olive oil. Place a large pot of water to boil with a pinch of salt.
2. In a large skillet over medium heat, saute the olive oil, onion, garlic, salt and pepper, dried herbs and chicken sausage. Mix well, then add kale. Cover for about 3 minutes, until kale gets bright green and wilted, then remove cover. Saute for an additional 3 minutes until everything is tender. Set aside.
3. Place the cauliflower florets in the pot of boiling water. Boil for 5 minutes, then remove from heat, drain, and return cauliflower to pot.
4. Add the kale mixture to the pot as well as the chicken broth, lemon juice, ricotta cheese and half of the Parmesan cheese. Mix well over medium heat until all has been incorporated.
5. Transfer to prepared casserole dish. Top with remaining Parmesan cheese. Cover with foil and bake for 15 minutes. Remove foil and bake for an additional 5 minutes.
6. Remove from oven and serve.
