

In this edition of Fourth Press, as we reflect on ways God is moving in our midst, we need to be clear we are rejoicing in God's accomplishments, not ours.



Our team presented different aspects of health to four different churches in different communities in the Andes Mountains. Matilda provided insight on how we are to physically care for our bodies. Melody and my father gave insight on how to take care of our spiritual health and our faith and relationship with God, as well as how to maintain a healthy marriage. Caitlyn and I helped with the children by playing games with them. My ability to speak Spanish, thanks to my mom, who is from Bolivia, helped me develop close relationships with some of the kids whom I am still in contact with via social media.

Arriving in Quito, we were greeted by Fourth missionaries, Alan and Fabi Gordon, and coworker Luis, who assists them in Riobamba. Alan planned where we went and led our presentations. He was the key communicator at churches we attended. His exceptionally strong faith in God was visible not only through how he lives but also in how he serves others. His gifts in language and music enhanced our private devotions along with our worship in front of the churches.

I'm thankful Fourth organized this trip. We were all blessed to see how our missionaries minister to the Quichua people.

This year, about 40 women registered for one of three outstanding books: *Katharina and Martin Luther: The Radical Marriage of a Runaway Nun and a Renegade Monk*, by Michelle de Rusha and Karen Prior, led by Esther Steele; *No Little Women: Equipping All Women in the Household of God*, by Aimee Byrd, led by Susan Scola; and *Sense and Sensibility*, by Jane Austen, which I led.

Esther chose an excellent book to read to mark the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's birthday! She said that she and others in her group enjoyed how well written the book was and how in depth and detailed the descriptions were of both the time period as well as the characters of Katherina and Martin.

Susan's group delved into a book by Aimee Byrd, who was the keynote speaker at the last women's retreat. She writes, "This was not a light summer read, but we benefited from working through it. Aimee's message is that women should not be weak or gullible when it comes to theology. Women need to know God's word,

grow in it, follow it, and mature in their faith (so as not to become 'little women')."

In the Jane Austen group, we looked at Austen's life as the daughter of a country rector, as well as the role her faith played and how it influenced her writing. We looked at God's fingerprints in a novel most would consider to be secular. Austen is never didactic or preachy, thank goodness, but her characters and plot affirm biblical truth. In addition to literary study, we enjoyed the story!

The annual summer book clubs are certainly worth the time and work spent reading and thinking and studying. I love making new friends every year, and I look forward to next summer's clubs. Susan Scola said it best, "We all agreed that we have been blessed at Fourth Church because the initiative to include women under the ministry of God's Word has been part of our experience for generations. Summer book club continues to be a vibrant part of that initiative."

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OUR GREATEST NEED


When my wife and I first attended Fourth a few years ago, we wondered if the church had any needs. The community seemed flush with resources, and the people we met were successful in all areas of life. Although the church and its people were very welcoming, it didn't seem like Fourth really needed us.

After a few months serving as a deacon, I have learned Fourth is a desperately needy church.

Many people who are "doing fine" over coffee in Halverson Hall are worried about paying the bills or are in a short-term cash crunch. The Deacon Board has been able to assist with grocery gift cards and funding for car repairs, medical bills, mortgage payments, and many other payments. Some members came to us with specific requests; others simply wanted to explore options in case of future need. The deacons make appointments, listen, and pray with each person seeking help.

Others in our church family are sick or suffering. Although some people are mentioned by name at each worship service or printed in the bulletin, this is a small fraction of the members of our church family struggling with short- or long-term health issues, facing upcoming surgery, or caring for ailing family or friends. Sometimes the only indication of suffering is an empty (or emptier) pew on Sunday. The deacons write care notes, make phone calls, and pray regularly for our family members with health needs.

However, our greatest need—individually and as a church family—is for Jesus Christ and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. As a deacon, I am constantly reminded of my own daily (sometimes hourly) need for Christ to dwell in my heart and of our church family's need of Christ, who promises, "And the ransomed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Isaiah 35:10).



MY RECENT PRAYER JOURNEY

Recently, I went through a trying experience that left me mentally and emotionally worn yet encouraged by how God works through prayer. To give some context, about five and a half years ago, I was halfway through my clinical fellowship in Speech Pathology when I was a passenger in a near-fatal car accident. My family was blessed by thousands of prayers offered on our behalf from around the globe, including many from our family at Fourth Presbyterian Church. God answered those prayers by allowing remarkable recoveries in both of my parents and me. Yet, as is the case for all of us at times, the journey on this side of heaven has not always been easy.

This brings me to the recent experience reminding me how God is at work in the prayers of his people: needing to retake the cumulative exam in Speech-Language Pathology. I had easily passed this exam when I finished graduate school. However, the accident prevented me from completing my clinical fellowship within the allotted time, so my scores expired. To be fully licensed, I had to retake and pass this massive and challenging exam, which contained topics I had not actively studied for years. I reached out to many people for their prayers and received wonderful prayer support. I still needed to live with the tension of knowing that while God was fully able to intervene, he was in no way required to give me the outcome I wanted. Yet I was encouraged by the response Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego gave King Nebuchadnezzar when thrown in the fiery furnace. Those men stated that, "Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace, and he will deliver us out of your hand, O king. But if not, be it known to you, O king, that we will not serve your gods or worship the golden image that you have set up" (Daniel 3:17-18). Our God is able to deliver us, but even if he doesn't, our following him will not be compromised.

I would like to say I was completely and faithfully at ease beginning the exam. However, I felt less and less sure of myself as the minutes ticked on. Eventually, I stopped "Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace"

Daniel 3:17





and prayed, "God, you know the circumstances that have brought me here. I'm just determinedly moving forward unless you make me aware of a different thing to pursue. I give this test to you, please guide me to interpret the questions correctly...and to choose the right answers!" Weeks went by until I finally received the official "passed" notification, bringing with it relief as well as some observations on prayer.

During my recovery, God has answered many requests with outcomes amazing to professionals in the brain injury field. Yet despite my prayerful, hard work and determination, some goals have yet to be actualized. There have been innumerable moments of humble gratitude and joy, but others of acknowledged disappointment and loss. We don't know how God will respond to our requests, but we can trust the sovereignty of our ever-attentive God.




MEDIA CENTER
