


Stakeholder Mapping for CCB Standards Revision

Stakeholders: Stakeholders are individuals and organizations who are affected by and who themselves influence the CCB Standards. A stakeholder mapping where stakeholders are grouped according to interest sectors is shown below:



Likely issues with each of the interest sectors:

1. End Users: Interests may diverge among some of the end users:
 - a. Project developers : ease of use, capacity building, guidance and tools requirements, cost considerations

- b. Local communities and Indigenous Peoples: discouraging exploitative projects, respecting local rights and customs, participation in decision making and implementation
 - c. Investors, offset buyers: to achieve a balance between not diluting audit requirements for projects with multiple benefits and at the same time not make it burdensome led projects, criteria to help to instill confidence among investors and offset buyers
2. Research Institutes : Technical elements to be addressed accurately and effectively
 3. Quality Assurers : reduce risks for communities or biodiversity from carbon projects from using the CCB standards, increased flow of funds to deserving projects
 4. Implementing/executing entity: incorporating feedback received from users, modifications to allow CCB standards to be supportive of smallholder- and community-led projects.

Means of communication to reach stakeholder groups:

A variety of communication strategies have to be used to reach all the stakeholders. While generally phone, face to face meetings and email will be the form of communication used the most, it is realized that for some stakeholders (e.g. smallholder representatives) there will have to be effort made to seek them out. This can be done by arranging face to face meetings in locations convenient for them where possible.

Stakeholder participation goals:

To gain the input of key stakeholders, to be achieved in the following ways

- a. Appointing a CCB Standards Committee composed of all possible stakeholders and ensuring balance of interest. This committee will propose revisions to the CCB Standards and will be responsible to approve the drafts of the revised standards.
- b. There will be two public comment periods when anyone can contribute to the revision process. These will be publicized to all the CCB Standards users and to Climate-L.
- c. Specific stakeholders will also be sought out for face to face interviews, phone interviews, email exchanges and workshops to ensure that all the stakeholders have been involved in the revision process.
