The March 2021 Flood was the 4th disaster in a year for many nonprofits in the Nashville community. This posed both a challenge and a benefit created by the organizations working collaboratively during this time. This disaster was described by many nonprofits as an invisible disaster, with the flood waters receding as quickly as it arrived, but it was Federally declared after a full assessment was completed.

Three particularly vulnerable populations were affected: deaf and hard of hearing, immigrant, and unhoused communities. Spanish speaking residents were the largest group impacted so a partner with cultural and language offerings to serve this community was imperative. Hispanic Family Foundation was identified to serve as the lead agency of the Long-Term Recovery Group as a result.

With so many immigrants impacted, there was some hesitancy among many to seek assistance from FEMA. What was always true of this group was that those affected were renters, which meant some costs were lower since the demand for home repairs was lower than previous disasters. On the other hand, homeowners who were impacted, were those who had also experienced the May 2010 flood, which resulted them in having flood insurance and other protocols in place.

The March 2021 Flood experienced limited fundraising (abount \$105,000). To help support this recovery, the majority of funds came from a reallocation of funds raised to support the March 2020 Tornado, which was still in the middle of recovery.

Grantmaking was limited to a smaller number of organizations than previous disasters due to its scale.
