Westminster Home Connection is a nonprofit construction agency that, outside of disaster recovery efforts, serves older adults and persons with disabilities whose homes are in need of critical repairs or mobility modifications, due to issues of function or mobility. Our improvements (including everything from plumbing and electrical repairs, to mobility modifications like wheelchair ramps and bathroom grab bars) give homeowners a way to remain in the home they love and in the communities where they've built their lives. Our model, which uses a construction project management approach to assess a home's needs, preserves the affordability of existing Middle Tennessee homes by ensuring they're livable for the current homeowners; we preserve more than 200 homes every year, some of which otherwise might be torn down. Our organization was heavily involved in the wake of the 2010 flood, after members of the Westminster Presbyterian Church community helped survivors of the flood repair their homes.

It was because of this experience a decade prior, that leaders of the tornado recovery efforts asked Westminster Home Connection to lead the construction portion of the city's Long Term Recovery Group. In that coordination role, we hired a temporary construction project manager, who helped assess the needs of tornado survivors and assigned construction projects to participating nonprofit construction agencies. When the number of homes needing repairs exceeded the capacity of the nonprofit construction agencies, contractors were hired to complete the homes.

Westminster Home Connection was involved in some capacity with 64 homes through Davidson and Wilson counties' Long Term Recovery Committees. All of those homes have been resolved, with the exception of two that were total rebuilds and are currently under construction. [October 24, 2022 update: one of the total rebuilds has been completed and the last home is under construction.] When the work was done by contractors, Westminster served as a pass-through agency, paying the contractors for the tornado recovery work as it was completed.

- Nearly all of the homes (47 total) were able to be repaired.
- Of the destroyed homes, two were replaced by purchasing a new home, and two others are currently under construction [October 24, 2022 update: one home has been completed and the last home is under construction.]
- Four survivors sold their homes instead of repairing them.
- There were a variety of resolutions for the rest of the homes, such as the homeowner finding other resources to repair the home, or the home not actually incurring tornado damage.

We hired a temporary project manager with previous experience in assessing post-disaster construction needs. We then assigned projects to nonprofit construction companies, who made the tornado repairs, or we worked with homeowners to hire contractors. Westminster Home Connection did not take an administrative fee for any of our tornado work, and all of the grant funds we received were reimbursements for specific costs we incurred. In fact, we paid for some of the tornado repairs ourselves, with donations from our church and others. 83% of the money we received from Community Foundation grants were spent directly in tornado damaged homes, primarily for reimbursements for contractors and materials. 15% was spent for costs directly related to coordinating the city's construction projects: salary for the person who led those efforts, as well as time our staff spent organizing and convening construction agencies. 2% was spent for other costs directly related to the

tornado program, such as technology to assess and track the projects and gas money. All of these costs were reimbursed expenses; there were no allocated costs or administrative fees.
