

Every day millions of children leave school after the bell rings without a place to go or a person to watch over them. Employees and volunteers at the Springfield Boys and Girls Club (SBGC) are the people and the place for the 1500 Springfield Massachusetts inner city children in need of help.

The Springfield Boys and Girls Club has been serving children and teenagers for over 120 years. Families from all backgrounds are welcome, with special concern for those from disadvantaged circumstances. These children are encouraged to walk through the SBGC doors and have a FUN after school experience with purpose! Kids can find a program for any interest.

A wide range of activities are offered including swim lessons, computer

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Indian Orchard Elementary School Hosts Popular After School Program

he Indian Orchard Elementary School is home to a satellite unit of the Springfield Boys and Girls Club. This program is one of the most popular after school programs in the area, and enrollment in the program is filled to capacity each year. "The neighborhood has a real gap for quality after school programs," said Sarah Tsitso. "Parents tell me every year that it's a real struggle to find places to put their children. The Indian Orchard After School Program is so popular due to the quantity and quality of the program. There aren't a lot of options out there and it's kept affordable. Enrollment is up over 15% from last year." Annually 165 students participate, with more eager to join.

The program is open 3:30 to 6pm Monday through Friday during the school year, and 9am to 4pm Monday through Friday throughout the summer months. Volunteer mentors and staff assist students with homework, interact with them in group activities and sports, and host a story time for younger members. Teen members can attend group discussions on age appropriate matters such as hygiene and saying no to drugs and alcohol, peer pressure, and bullying.

Healthy living is a fundamental principal taught at the Indian Orchard after school program. Mentors help the children

develop a positive self-image and healthy social skills, as well as giving them a safe place to have fun in a tolerant atmosphere.

The after school program has been at Indian Orchard for more than 15 years. Nydia Gallagher and Anthony Nowak of Nowak Funeral & Cremation Services recently donated tissues, pencils, rulers and writing paper. "My brother and I were both students at Indian Orchard Elementary. We are very excited to show our support for the Boys and Girls Club!" said Nydia. The SBGC fosters development throughout a child's formative years into young adulthood. Teen members are offered job readiness programs as well as junior staff employment opportunities. "We are open to first graders through young adults 18 years old. Our older children have more leadership roles and can become junior counselors. A junior counselor will be paired with a member of our youth development staff and help out with our younger kids and lead activities," said Sarah Tsitso, the Executive Director of the Springfield Boys and Girls Club.

The SBGC can be a much needed home away from home for a young person in need. This agency also operates year round, giving inner city children a place to go and

feel safe throughout the summer, all the while being surrounded by supportive adults that lead by example. To become a member go to their website at www.sbcg.org and fill out an application, or call 413-732-7201. The website also offers comprehensive information about upcoming programs and events.

If you would like to get involved and make a difference, volunteer opportunities can be found to fit any skill set. "We love to hear from the committed folks in the community. Volunteers are needed that are willing to come in and teach. The kids need exposure, and we need people to bring their talent into the club and let the kids know what their job is like, and what their life is like on a daily basis," said Sarah Tsitso. It only takes a few hours a week to help a child begin to make healthy lifestyle choices and foster meaningful relationships. he Festival of Trees has been a long standing tradition known to Springfield residents, hosted by the Springfield Boys and Girls Club. Located on the second floor of downtown Tower Square, it has been bringing holiday delight to attendees for the past 14 years. Area residents can attend the Festival and tour the beautifully decorated trees Wednesdays through Sundays, beginning November 28th through December 14th.

Area families and businesses are already busy at work creating a feast for the eyes for the 2014 season. This event is fun for all ages, with over 100 unique trees on display and special visits from Santa. The trees are raffled off at the end of the end of the Festival. The winners not only receive a tree, but all the decorations on it and all the gifts under it! "Most of our trees come with lots of great stuff. We had a tree last year that had \$1500 worth of gas cards on it," said Sarah Tsitso.

Nowak Funeral & Cremation Services will join in the festivities this year with their peace inspired tree. "Our tree decorations will highlight the dove. The dove is a symbol of peace, caring, and devotion. We hope everyone will love it as much as we have loved putting it together," said Nydia Gallagher, Funeral Director at Nowak.

"The SBGC Board of Directors is committed to keeping club membership fees low so we can bring in as many kids as possible. But

that makes budgeting challenging. We really rely on events like the Festival of Trees to continue our work," added Sarah Tsitso.

Entertainment abounds, as many area choirs will perform throughout the festival. "We have a chorus that operates out of the club that performs during the festival. Our kids not only sing, but also help with the themes and decorating trees for the festival," said Sarah Tsitso. Frequently Asked Questions



How do I survive the holidays after the loss of a loved one?

Coping with loss during the holidays can be difficult. "Holidays can definitely be harder for bereaved people. They are used to being surrounded by their family during the holidays, and when that person isn't there it brings up emotions that can be challenging to handle," said Nydia Gallagher.

Give yourself permission to be flexible. Everyone experiences the death of a loved one differently. Recognize there is no time limit to the grieving process and holiday traditions may be adjusted.

Be tolerant of what you aren't able to accomplish and be proud of the things you are able to accomplish. You may feel too tired to haul out all your holiday decorations, and that is okay. It is important to listen to what your body and mind are telling you.

Plan ahead for family and work gatherings. Knowing your schedule can reduce your chances of being caught off guard emotionally.

Stress reducing activities may be extra helpful during the holidays and times of increased anxiety. Getting enough rest and exercise is not only crucial for physical health, but mental health as well. You may not relish the idea of group gatherings or intimate conversations, but surrounding yourself with supportive friends and family will help ease you through this period of time.

Talk about the person that died. "At times a person experiencing the loss of loved one may not want to celebrate certain occasions at all. But it is important to still share memories of that person. It will not assist the grieving process to hold those feelings inside," Nydia added. Your love did not end with the death of someone close to you.
