

LIFE AND LEGACY OF MARGARET JEAN WILLIAMS

On November 7, 1951, a bouncing baby girl was born in Swainsboro, Georgia, to the late Reggie and Calmeta Williams. The proud parents welcomed their first-born daughter, Margaret Jean Williams.

Jean grew up in Miami, Florida and was a true product of Miami Dade County Public Schools System. She began her educational journey in several schools: Phyllis Wheatley Elementary, Frederick Douglass Elementary, Booker T. Washington Senior High, Madison Middle and graduated in the Class of 1971, from the iconic Miami Central Senior High School, Home of the "Mighty Rockets!" She was very popular among her peers and participated in various school activities: Miami Central High School Senate and was honored as Princess Margaret Williams in their 1970-71 traditional Homecoming Court Event. Jean was a shopaholic and a bargain hunter, spent countless hours online shopping for bargain brands.

Upon graduating from high school, Jean was employed as a cashier at Earl's Supermarket. Although she worked in that capacity for a while, she never abandoned a desire to pursue a career in the field of education. Jean furthered her education by attending various colleges and universities: Bethune Cookman (Daytona Beach), Florida Atlantic (Boca Raton), Miami Dade Community College, and graduated from Florida Memorial College in 1984, earning a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Elementary Education.

Jean, a longtime member of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church, was baptized under the leadership Reverend James E. Jenkins and served as a youth usher and sang in the youth choir. She was always active in the church and continued serving under the pastorage of Reverend Dale L. Powell and our current Pastor-Teacher, Reverend Dr. Gaston E. Smith.

Years later, Jean accepted a teaching position in Miami Dade County Public Schools as a full-time 3100. It was a job she enjoyed, took pride in her work, and earned endearing love and respect from students throughout the years. It was her passion for education that inspired her to mentor and bring out the best in students. After twenty-five years of hard work and dedication, Jean retired from Morningside Elementary School due to triple bypass heart surgery.

Jean was energetic and had a zest for life. To those who knew her well, she was a warm, loving, witty, and kind-hearted individual who touched the lives of so many people. She will be truly missed, but never forgotten.
