Kirk John Walston Phillips, son of the late Spencer B. Phillips and Irma C. Phillips was born on January 19th, 1960 in Trinidad and Tobago where he also spent a major part of his life. He was the only child. As a infant Kirk migrated to the United States with his parents and attended P.S. 147 in Queens New York. The family returned to Trinidad in his early years when his father took up a prestigious position with Texaco; then the biggest oil company operating in Trinidad. Kirk attended high school there and he and his family lived a good life. Kirk often talked fondly of those days growing up on the Texaco camp and the many lasting friendships he made with people around the world. He was so thankful for that experience.

Kirk would eventually return to the U.S to attend Queens College and then go onto work for the New York Board of Education as a School Health Aid in Manhattan.

In the 1980' s he worked at Parkwood Hospital, Parkway Hospital, and Inner Harbor in Douglasville, Georgia as an Addiction Counselor. 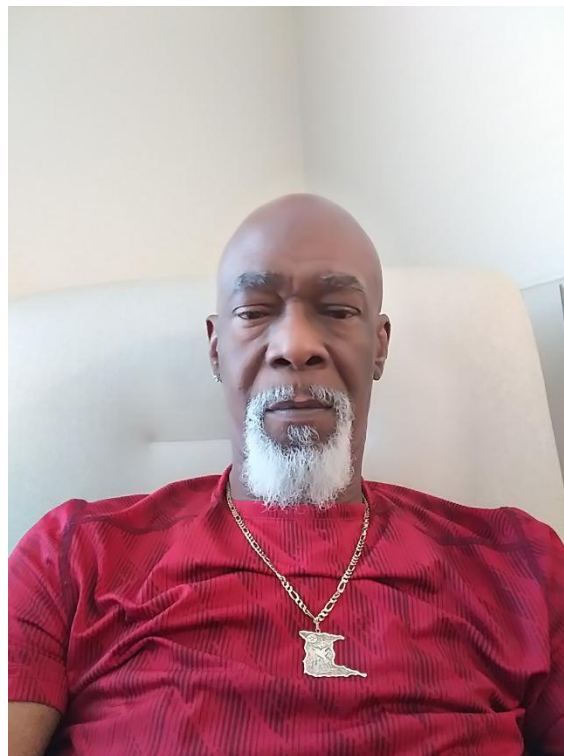

Working with young people was Kirk's passion and he did it well. His commitment to helping people is what sparked and drove his career in mental health and he transformed the lives of thousands in this important field. In 2010, he retired and enjoyed making memories with his family and friends in Carrollton Georgia.

"Bamboo", "Iron Man, or "Turkey" as he was sometimes called, had a charismatic personality. Kirk was full of life and loved to be around friends. Of course he also loved to party.
