# **Lillian Wiggins Ames**

1933 was an exciting year. America was a young struggling country yet trying to find itself in the world community. Franklin D. Roosevelt was President and John Garner was Vice President. The movies "Alice In Wonderland" and "King Kong" were the box office hits. In the world of music, Big Band Leader, Cab Calloway was the man! In 1933 a dozen of eggs sold for \$.52, a gallon of milk for \$.41 and a loaf of bread for \$.07. Wow how the prices of groceries have changed! Also in 1933, the average annual income was

\$1,409. The price of a new house was approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000. You could put a car in the driveway for approximately \$550. For \$.18 per gallon, you could keep your car running. This would allow you to drive to the Post Office to mail your house note and car payment bill for \$.03 per stamp!

Along with all the exciting and busy things that were happening in 1933, another historical event took place in a quiet town of Scotland Neck, North Carolina. On June 12, 1933, Lougene Nevilles and Marcus Wiggins became the proud parents of a beautiful baby girl who they named ALICE LILLIAN WIGGINS. The first 14 years of Alice's life was spent with her grandparents, where she received much love and direction for her life.

After their death, Alice moved to Eastern Shore, Va. where she united with her parents and other siblings on the factory yard in Cheriton, Va. At 18, she met and soon married Cecil Ames who preceded her in death. Their 50-YEAR UNION lasted until his death. To continue their lineage, they were blessed with 10 amazing children.



Alice attended Northampton High School in Machipongo, VA. She excelled as an athlete, particularly in the areas of basketball softball. and Her outstanding abilities allowed her to be the

only freshman to play on the school's varsity team during the 1940s. Her first experience with television was during her visits to the small corner store. It was the only place on the Factory Yard where there was a TV. Alice remembered how people crowded into that small store to see the Joe Louis fight.

Sports were not Alice's only interest. While in High School, she also developed a love for shoes. This love affair has been passed on to her daughters. The love affair started when a lady, who lived near to Alice, who owned a lot of shoes and allowed Alice to wear her shoes to school





each day. They both wore the same size shoe, so it worked out fine for Alice. Alice made a promise then that when she got older, she would also have a lot of shoes. This is a promise that she kept. Alice kept up with the other fashion trends of her high school days such as the gathered and broomstick skirts, Gibbson girl blouses, peddle pusher pants and black and white oxford shoes. All neatly coordinated with the "Updo" hairstyle of the day.



At an early age, Alice was baptized and accepted Christ as her Lord and Savior. She joined First Baptist Church in the 1950's. Alice depicted the scripture in Mark that states that Jesus, the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and give his life as a ransom for many. Alice was truly a servant of God. She loved serving others and helping people to flourish and empowering everyone to honor, worship and follow Christ. Alice also



had a warm and generous heart. She instilled in her children to learn the word of God. At the breakfast table on Sunday morning, each child would have to quote a scripture before they would bless and began eating their food. She took her children to church every Sunday morning and evening if there was an evening service.

At First Baptist Church, Alice served as Senior Missionary, Senior Usher, Starlight Choir, Senior Choir, Director of Jr. Choir, Elementary Sunday School Teacher, directed, and was a member of the culinary team. She served faithfully.

She was also on the Virgin-

ia Eastern Shore Economic Empowerment Housing Corp (VESEEHC) board and District 1 community organization to bring better housing and homeownership to low income residents of Northampton County.

Alice served as President and Secretary of Ladies Auxiliary Organization-Post 400. She rosed in the ranks of the Eastern Star Organization: She was a "Life Time Honorary Member." Member of the following Houses: Bright & Morning Star OES #40 (Star Redemption OES) Celestial Court Royal Exalted; Amaranth Rehab Court #2; Heroines of Jericho; Hannah Council #2; Lady Knight Templar; Matile Court #2; Daughter of the Sphinx; and the Roses of the Seven Seals.







Alice was employed by Webster Canning Factory because working in the fields was not for her. In her 70's, Alice received a certificate and training for Home Health Care. As a Home Health Care worker, Alice would not only care for her clients, but she would clean their homes. Cleaning was not part of her responsibilities. Mrs. Mary Belote was one of those clients. Alice became her friend, personal companion and chauffeur.

Both parents (Marcus and Lougene Wiggins), husband (Cecil Ames), daughter (Vivian Wiggins), brothers (Isaac, Marcus, James, John, and Jesse Wiggins), sisters (Katie Mae Mosley, Catherine Wiggins, and Maggie Moses) all preceded Alice in death.
