
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(Life and Legacy of BRO. WILLIE JAMES MORROW

When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things. 1 Corinthians 13:11

Willie James Morrow was born on Monday, January 16, 1950 to the late Mr. and Mrs. Willie and Bernice Morrow of Northport, AL. He was the baby brother of five siblings.

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. John 3:16

As a youth, he joined Springhill AME Zion Church, where he dedicated his heart and soul and remained a life-long member. Over the years he served as a Stewart, Chairman of the Trustee Board, taught Sunday School and filled whatever capacity that was needed.

Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honour to whom honour. Romans 13:7

As he grew, he became "Will". He made history in 1966 as one of the 12 black students who integrated Tuscaloosa County High in Northport, AL (previously, an all white school). He arrived on campus escorted by the FBI, state troopers, news media and helicopters flying. He was the only black senior in his class. In addition to being the first and "only" black student, he played sports, basketball, in the previously all-white Tuscaloosa County School System.

From there, he went to Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, AL, where he graduated. In 1976, he became a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.
