

In addition to being active in education, Evelyn was active in her church, Calvary Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and in her community. She served as an Elder, Chairman of the Deacon Board, Vice-Moderator of the Women's Organization, Sunday School Teacher, After School Program Teacher, Choir Member, Church Greeter and in whatever capacity she was needed or decided she needed to create. She was also active in her husband's church, St. John A.M.E., where she served as a Vacation Bible School Teacher and she provided financial assistance to the church through their various fund-raising campaigns, church offering or wherever they needed financial assistance. Her children arise and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her. "Many women do noble things, but you surpass them all." Charm is deceptive and beauty is fleeting; but a woman who fears the LORD is to be praised. Give her the reward she has earned. The life of Evelyn Dolores Ulmer Henry was one that was worth far more than rubies. She worked hard, married, "The Love of her Life," MSG (Ret.) Taft Henry, traveled with him to his military assignments, had a beautiful family, came back home to live in Winnsboro, South Carolina, worked hard in her church and made an indelible imprint in her church, community and in education.

Evelyn was born August 14, 1931, to a Presbyterian Minister, The Late Reverend George Ulmer and a teacher, The Late Loretta Ayers Ulmer. She was reared in a Christian home where it was instilled in her to have a strong belief in God, work hard and get a good education. She often told stories of attending Presbyterian Churches in various places because of the pastoral assignments of her father. She could tell you about the Sunday meals that were prepared for the pastor and his family, the length of time they would be in church, the lasting friendships she made and the life of being what is now called a "Preacher's Kid" or a "PK." She would tell stories about the piano lessons she was required to endure and the fun that she had with her siblings. Life was not always perfect. She lived during the time of segregation. It was not always easy, but she always had the love and support of her family.

Evelyn was an honor graduate of Fairfield High School. In fact, she graduated a year early. She was serious about her studies and strived to excel in them. She received her B.S. Degree in Social Studies from Barber Scotia College in Concord, North Carolina where she graduated summa cum laude. During this time, she was dating her future husband, Taft Henry, who had enlisted in the United States Army. After graduation, she began her career as a fifth-grade teacher at the Jasper County Training School.

On March 15, 1952, she married "The Love of Her Life," Taft Henry. For over 68 years they were inseparable! They were in sync with everything they did in life. He supported her in all of her endeavors, and she supported him in all of his endeavors. They welcomed people into their home, and they provided meals to many relatives and friends. Evelyn was famous for her spaghetti and garlic bread. You would never leave there empty-handed. Their marriage was an embodiment of Ruth 1:16-17 (KJV).

And Ruth said, Intreat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee: for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will

lodge: thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God: where thou diest, will I die, and there will I be buried: the LORD do so to me, and more also, but if ought but death part thee and me.

After finishing her contract with Jasper County Schools, she began to travel with her husband to his military assignments. During that time, she taught in the Army Education Center and the American Dependent School. She served as President of the Protestant Women of Phillips Chapel and as a Girl Scout Leader.

In 1965 she began her teaching career in Fairfield County as a third-grade teacher at McCrorey-Liston Elementary School in Blair, SC. Because of her attentiveness to detail and her high degree of mental ability, she was the "go to" person when the principal needed things done correctly and the teachers needed answers to complex questions. In 1972, she was selected as the Team Leader at McCrorey-Liston Elementary School in a new program called South Carolina Teacher Corps. The purpose of this program was to train and retain teachers for disadvantaged school districts, who would collaborate with the communities they served. Some of the interns became teachers in the communities they had worked in after the program ended. During this time, she was encouraged by her mentor in the Teacher Corps Program, Dr. Wanda Gale Breedlove, to pursue her Masters' Degree in Education. In 1974, she received her M.Ed. from The University of South Carolina. Dr. Breedlove recognized the skills that she possessed and encouraged her to pursue her doctorate; however, Evelyn felt that it would take too much time away from her number one priority, her family. That was her decision and she stuck by it.

Following her completion of serving as the Team Leader for the Teacher Corps program, she was assigned to another administrative position. The school district was required to adhere to the guidelines of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. (Title IX protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs or activities that receive federal financial assistance). At that time, the school district did not have an African American Female Principal. Through her exemplary work in education and her educational certification and qualifications for the position, Evelyn was selected as the first African American Female Principal in the Fairfield County School District since the enactment of Title IX. Her assignment was as the principal of McCrorey-Liston Elementary School. A position she loved and held until her retirement.

Under her leadership, the school received numerous awards and recognition. She was afforded the opportunity to be a presenter at national and state conferences. The school had a highly active Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and a highly active School Improvement Council. One of her greatest
