Remembering the Life of Willie" Joe Louis" Gary

Joe Louis was born on March 28, 1938 in Elbert County, Georgia. He was the son of the late Lonnie L. Gary and Patience (Dubose) Gary-Banks. He gained his wings and transitioned to eternal rest on March 11, 2021.

The dictionary defines resilient as a person able to withstand or recover quickly from difficult situations. Joe Louis was the epitome of resilience. He attended Elbert County schools until 8th grade. Times were tough for his mother, so he briefly went to Pennsylvania to live with his aunt, Zora. He knew he wanted more for himself so he enlisted in the Army at Fort Benning, Georgia, where his occupation was a light truck driver for 1 ½ years. After the military a friend paid him to drive him to Chicago but they had to make a pit stop in Detroit first. This "pit stop" turned into him planting roots. He met and wed Mary Lomax and from that union two children were born.

Joe Louis got hired at Ford Motor Company in 1965 at the Rouge plant and worked on the assembly line making the Ford Mustang. His resiliency allowed him to work for 33 years until he retired in 1998.
