










Kathleen Ann Lee, 67, of Paulding, passed away at her home on Thursday, July 4,





Through her deep and committed faith, Kathv's life was enriched in countless wavs and she considered herself deeply blessed. Although gone from love's embrace the heart of Kathy lives on in the lives of all who knew and loved her.
