

Quinton James Singleton was born July 9, 1922 in Anderson, South Carolina, the youngest son of Eugene & Delia (Lindsey) Singleton. He was preceded in death by his four brothers: William, Clifton, Ulysses, Boyce, and two sisters: Althea and Grace.

His early education was in Anderson Public schools. He graduated from Reed Street High School in 1943



where he served as Class President. In May 14, 1944 Quinton responded to Uncle Sam's call to serve in the U.S. Army in France where he learned to speak French fluently. He served his country faithfully and was honorably discharged on November 26th, 1945. After his military experience, he enrolled in Tuskegee Institute Industrial Arts program at the Tuskegee Institute now Tuskegee University where he learned the skill of Tailoring. Upon his graduation, "Q" (as he was so affectionately known by many) returned

to Anderson to work several years and serve his community as assistant High School football coach with the late Coach William Roberts under the late "Brown Williams". He also coached little league football and baseball.

When a better career opportunity was presented, he moved to Detroit, Michigan to work at Ford Motor Company. He was a computer reader in the Ford stamping plant until he retired in 1986. While in Detroit he connected with an old acquaintance, Ms. Myrtle P. Newton, and married her August 5th,1978. In 1996, "Q" and Myrtle moved back to their hometown, Anderson, S.C. They joined the Thompson Centennial United Methodist Church where "Q" served as Church Treasurer, sang in the church choir (The Centennial Voices), and joined the United Methodist Men. He was an avid bowler, liked to play card games, loved eating a big bowl of ice cream, telling a good story, and watching football. Quinton loved his family unconditionally. He was a pleasant soul! God broke the mold when He made "Q". There will never be another like him!

He leaves to mourn his beloved wife, Myrtle N. Singleton, of 39 years; two sons: Quinton Dante Singleton (Barbara), Thomas Singleton (Carla); three daughters: Janet Dubois, Lauretta Baylor (Curtis), and Elishia Norman; three granddaughters, five grandsons, six great grandchildren, numerous nieces & nephews and a host of friends.

A good name is better than fine perfume, and the day of death better than the day of birth.


