Cora's Life and Impact

Cora Helen Johnson Williams, age 72, transitioned peacefully to her eternal home on November 17, 2019. She was the only child of the late Reverend Ulysses and Annie Bell Evans Johnson. She is survived by her husband Louvell Williams, Jr. They were married on March 25, 1967.

Mourning her loss are their two children: son, Colonel Richard L. Williams, DMD, PhD (U.S. Army) and his wife Patricia Neal Williams of Columbia, South Carolina, and daughter, Monica E. Williams, business owner and consultant of Charlotte, North Carolina.

Also surviving are her seven grandchildren: Kendrick D. White, Bianca D. Williams, Richard (Ricky) L. Williams, II, Darius M. White, Hannah M. Williams, Alicia S. Wilson and Ciara M. Nelson.

BIRTH STORY

Cora was born on a Friday morning in July of 1947. A longstanding 'family story' indicated that her parents, Ulysses and Annie Bell, who were big fans of the (then existing) Negro Southern League baseball teams, had planned to attend the game between the Asheville Blues and the Raleigh Tigers, in Asheville, North Carolina, on the fourth of July. This would be the couple's last outing "before the baby comes". Much to her surprise, 37 year old Annie Bell's baby (Cora Helen) was born around 10:15 a.m. that same morning. Over the years, and on numerous occasions, a few of Annie Bell's friends joked with Cora about "spoiling her mama and daddy's July 4th outing".

In spite of this 'rocky start', Cora Helen grew up knowing she was loved by both parents, and was taught at an early age to love and help others. She believed that this was a deciding factor in choosing her life's career.

EDUCATION

Cora graduated from "Old" Westside High School in 1965. She attended Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia in the fall of 1965. Later, in the fall of 1966, she was among the first group of six African American students to attend Anderson Junior College (now, Anderson University) after the school de-segregated. Cora persevered to become the first African American to graduate from Anderson University in the fall of 1966.

With family responsibilities and other priorities, it took a while for Cora to achieve her dream of higher education. She never gave up and graduated from Clemson University in August 1978, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology. At that point, she became more determined to reach her ultimate goal – earning a master's degree in Social Work. During the fall of 1988, with family encouraging her, Cora enrolled in the Master of Social Work program at the University of South Carolina – Columbia. She successfully completed the academic program in May of 1990. She was tested by the South Carolina Board of Social Work Examiners and became a licensed social worker (LMSW) in June of the same year.

CAREER

Cora was employed as a social worker for over twenty years. She worked for various governmental agencies, corporate bodies and community service organizations during her accomplished career, with unwavering zeal. Her resume lists a diverse range of positions as: Social Services Case Manager; U.S. Census Bureau Interviewer; Employment Counselor for Job Service; Field Director for Old Ninety Six Girl Scout Council; and Clinical Social Worker for AnMed Health.

Although the field of Social Work was not considered a lucrative profession, it proved to be rich in rewards for those fully committed to helping others in need. Cora's love for public health eventually drew her to Appalachia I Health District [Upstate Region, South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC Region I)] – first as a volunteer, and later as a Public Health Social Worker. Cora was often recognized as one who was willing to go the 'extra mile' for the benefit of a client or family. In 1998, she earned the prestigious Ruth G. McCall Award – the Public Health Social Worker of the Year Award for the State of South Carolina. Cora retired from DHEC Region I in January 2009.

CHRISTIAN FAITH

Cora loved the Lord, and she believed that we show God's love best when we render service to others. Her Christian foundation was first established at age 12, through baptism at Royal Baptist Church, where she was active in Sunday school, BTU and other youth leader development programs. Her sound preparation for Christian service ultimately carried over to adult life. In March of 1970, Cora joined Mount Moriah Baptist Church. For almost five decades, she participated in various activities to support the church's core missions, including Sunday School Teacher; Missionary Circle No. 1; and working with other members of the Women's Missionary Union to organize Mt. Moriah's first newsletter – "Focus on Mt. Moriah". Cora especially loved the Vacation Bible School program, to which she committed countless hours, and always maximum effort, to assure that the program was informative and entertaining for children, as well as adults. Her enthusiasm for service was further demonstrated by many

years of promoting community outreach, as a member of Iva Chapter No. 275, Order of the Eastern Star, P.H.A. and Azzam Court No. 184, Auxiliary to the A.E.A.O.N.M.S.

Cora placed God first in every endeavor, with relentless passion. She truly exemplified the fundamental teachings of the Christian Faith. Her favorite Bible verse is found in the Book of Proverbs (16:3) "Commit your works to the Lord, and your thoughts will be established". Upon calling this angel home, it is certain that God smiled with pride, and approved her job "Well Done".

Throughout her lifetime, Cora Helen Johnson Williams represented the epitome of selfless service, and she undoubtedly made this World better than she found it.
