His encouraging words were “keep doing good.” Before he died, he said to his daughter, “I need to get my car fixed so I can go to the assembly. He had spiritual things on his mind.

Adell worked as a domestic care giver for many, many years taking care of families and children from birth to adulthood and beyond. Adell loved to cook; her specialty was macaroni and cheese, lemon cake, potato salad, glazed carrots, fried corn and spinach. She made great biscuits.

Adell also had a spiritual routine; her love for Jehovah was evident to all. Adell was never late for meetings or assemblies. If you were riding with her you had to be ready to go or get left behind. Her spiritual routine did not waiver. Her love for the ministry over flowed. She never had trouble talking to anyone about the truth and never had a problem speaking her mind.

Adell opened her home to many pioneers, many speakers and to her grands. When you stayed with Adell, she made sure you studied the Bible and attended the meetings, you were well dressed and that you paid attention. Adell loved collecting pictures and when anyone came to her home you would see pictures from wall to wall all in the living room and bedroom.
