

After reconnecting with a childhood friend Annette (Monica), they got married and he migrated to the USA in 1983 to start a new life with his wife and 3 step children Maggie, Denton and Kim Brathwaite. Looking out for his family meant everything to him. He had several nieces and nephews, great nieces and great nephews who all have felt his generosity.

He left to mourn His wife Annette. His sister Ira, a host of Nieces and nephews, three step children, six grandchildren Jamal, Richard Anton, his "dependable Elijah especially who he so lovingly raised called "My little granddaughter and protector Kiara and his little diplomat Keilani" (He enjoyed his active role as grandfather to the younger Elijah ,Kiara and Keilani)
