


Willie James Goodman

"Living is loving, caring, and sharing..." this phrase was constantly spoken by Willie James Goodman. He believed it wholeheartedly and lived his life in this manner.

Living: Happiness and joy filled the spring air in Henning, Tennessee on March 31, 1942 when Marion and Annie Lee (Harvey) Goodman welcomed their second child Willie James Goodman. He was reared in Covington, Tennessee in a christian home and at an early age he accepted Christ and united with Avery Chapel CME church. Willie James served faithfully in various capacities including junior steward, Sunday School Superintendent, as well as participated in youth and young adult activities. Willie James continuously supported Avery Chapel in annual fundraisers and the upkeep of the Avery Chapel cemetery. He was a firm believer in the power of prayer and the grace and favor of God in his life.

Willie James grew up on the family farm where he gained agricultural skills and a strong work ethic. He was educated in Tipton County public schools and graduated from Frazier High School in the class of 1960. After high school, he attended Lane College in Jackson, Tennessee. Willie James loved family get-togethers and celebrations of family achievements, especially the annual Yarbrough Family Reunion. He loved to recount stories of the joy he shared with his siblings and cousins in his youth. He was very astute and also loved spirited debates on political issues, financial matters, and the moral decay of society.

Caring & Sharing: Willie James shared his time, talents and skills to help others. Some of his favorite pastimes included gardening, barbecuing, cooking, and socializing with family and friends. Each year, he freely shared tomatoes, collard greens, cucumbers and even pumpkins from his home garden with his neighbors. If you ever had the privilege of visiting him at his residence, you would be offered refreshments ranging from a can of Coke to his latest homemade peach cobbler. When tough Michigan winters hit, he would get up extra early to blow not only his snow but also the snow of his elderly neighbors. Willie James really exemplified the meaning of a good neighbor and friend. He was always happy to share whatever he had with those he cared for.

And think of him as living in the hearts of those he touched... for nothing loved is ever lost and he was loved so much.











