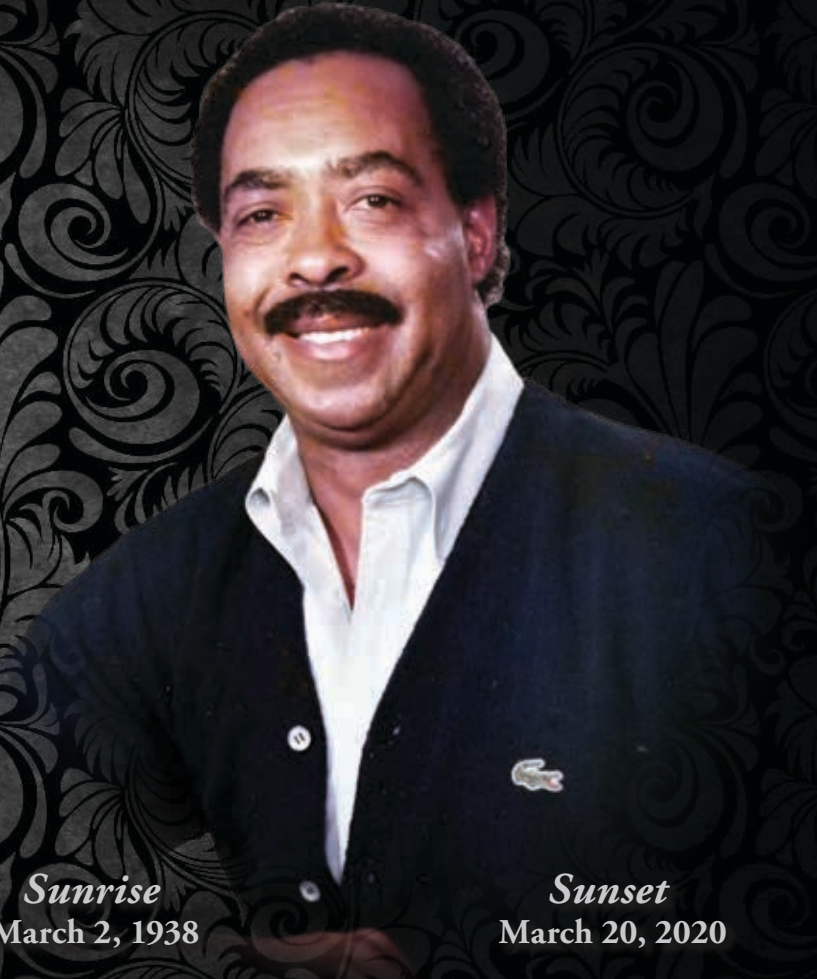
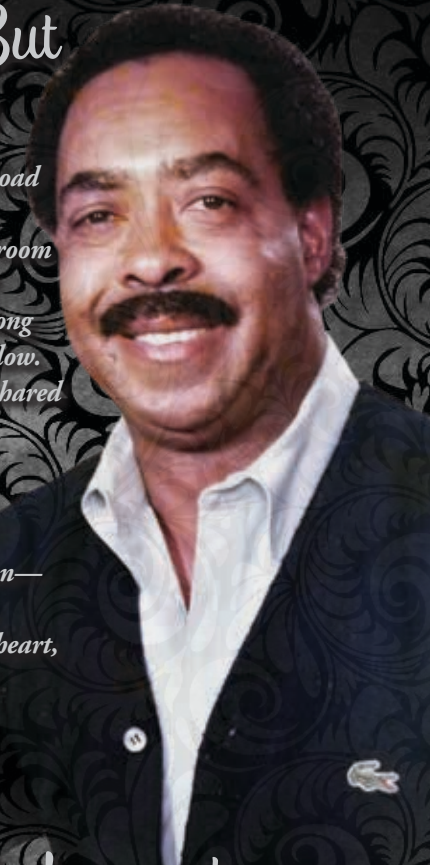

Obituary
