Broken Chain

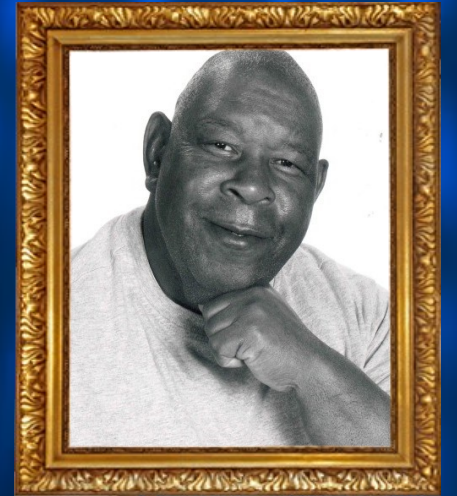

Obituary
