# Life's Reflections

Delores Harris was born July 23, 1928 in Wendell, North Carolina to the late Deacon Thomas Harris and the late Deaconess Mamie Debnam Harris. She entered into eternal rest peacefully on December 11, 2021. Delores was preceded in death by her parents, her son, Henry Anthony Goodson, her granddaughter, Tonetta Chambers, her great grandson, Markis Perry, and her siblings, Ronald Harris, Deacon Willie Harris, Thomas Harris, Jr., Charles E. Harris, Sr., Marjorie Harris Ritter, Mamie Harris Scarboro, Lottie Harris Dunston, Don Ameche Harris, Sr., Deacon Joseph Harris, and Della Harris Clemons.

Delores was the life of the party and LOVED PEOPLE! She was affectionately called "Sainty" by her family and friends and "Granny Harris" in the educational field.

Delores received her formal education in Wendell, North Carolina, beginning with Carver Elementary School. She graduated from James E. Shepard High School in 1946 in Zebulon, North Carolina and enrolled in Fayetteville State Teachers College, known today as Fayetteville State University, Fayetteville, North Carolina. She graduated in 1951, obtaining a Bachelors of Science in Elementary Education. She was a continuous learner, participating in educational courses at Virginia State University and University of Virginia. Her teaching career spanned over 38 years. She started teaching elementary school in Beaufort, South Carolina for two years. Delores relocated to Richmond, VA, where she began her teaching career with the State of Virginia's Hanover Learning Center for Boys. She taught Mathematics to a wide age range of troubled teenage boys. Her teaching style was very firm and fair. "Granny" worked well alongside anyone, especially the correctional staff, faculty, and support staff of the learning center. She was an asset in many ways to all she came in contact with - sharing lifelong experiences and encouraging others to do well. She was a GREAT MENTOR to all! "Granny Harris" LOVED to educate young men, LOVED her job, and shared a special bond with many of the students she taught and the faculty she worked with.

During her years in Wendell, North Carolina, Delores received the Lord Jesus Christ as her personal savior at the Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church. She participated in B.Y.P.U., later called BTU. While in Richmond, Virginia, Delores attended Union Baptist Church and St. Paul Baptist Church.

Delores was known for always giving a history lesson. You could often find her reading a book to gain knowledge or listening to the news to hear about the latest events happening in our country. She shared many history lessons with her children and grandchildren throughout the years. From poem recitations to singing historical songs, Delores left a lasting stamp on her family. One well-known poem that she began reciting at Fayetteville State University, and lastly at her 93<sup>rd</sup> Birthday Celebration, was "The Bible." Outside of the history lessons, 'Granny Harris' was an avid gardener. You could OFTEN find her with her favorite 'grubbing hoe,' digging holes, filling them with cow manure, and planting vegetables and flowers; many of which, she shared with her family, friends, and neighbors when they were in season.

Delores had a strong will to live and embrace all that life had to offer and was an inspiration and blessing to all she came in contact with. She brought joy and excitement to all family gatherings. She was well-loved throughout her life and had many friends that stayed in contact with her for many many years.
