Eunice Duke, the eldest of three siblings, was born October 30, 1931 to Rev. Ernest and Annie Scails Williams in Marvell Arkansas. Deciding she wanted a middle name, she renamed herself Eunice Renee. The family relocated to St. Louis, Missouri during her toddler years.

Eunice expressed her belief in Christ at an early age and was baptized at Fairfax Baptist Church under the leadership of the late Rev. J. D. Howard. She later became a member of New Home Baptist Church which was organized and pastored by her father, Rev. Ernest Williams.

She was educated in the St. Louis, Missouri Public School System graduating from Charles Sumner High School and attended Stowe Teachers College. Eunice was soon hired by the United States Federal Government in St. Louis as a clerk typist, eventually relocating with the job to Indianapolis, Indiana and became a purchasing agent.

While in Indianapolis, she met and married Dan Harris Duke who also became a minister. To this union three children were born. There she became a member of Mount Lebanon Primitive Baptist Church pastored by her husband, Elder Dan H. Duke.

Upon retirement, she returned to St. Louis, Missouri and became a substitute secretary employed by the St. Louis Public School System. At that time, she re-established membership with New Home Baptist Church pastored by Rev. Dorris Strong. In May of 2017, Eunice re-located to Miramar, Florida to reside with her son and his wife. There she became a member of New Jerusalem Primitive Baptist Church pastored by her son, Elder Kenneth A. Duke.

Mrs. Duke lived a life surrounded by ministerial pastors from sunrise to sunset. Her maternal grandfather, father, and husband were pastors; her son and two grandsons continued the tradition.

Eunice Duke's church ministries involvement included church musician, Pastor's Aide, Sunday School and Bible School Teacher, providing clothing and food for the homeless, the Benevolent Committee and choir member. She was also artistically gifted. Her favorite pastimes were making exquisite jewelry and afghans, drawing portraits and designing hats. She loved spending time with her children, frequently taking them to museums, the municipal opera, Botanical Gardens and fishing. She loved to fish, often sitting for hours with her children holding a stick with a string lowered into the water; seldom catching a fish. More important to her was spending time with her children.

Eunice was preceded in death by Rev. Ernest and Annie Williams (parents), Rev. Dan H. Duke (husband), and Julia Ann Duke (daughter-in-law). She leaves to cherish her memory her daughter: Debra J. Duke Mack (Ollie) of St. Louis, Missouri; sons: Dan Stan Duke of St. Louis, Missouri, and Elder Kenneth A. Duke of Miramar, Florida; two sisters: Vera W. Rhiney and Ruth W. Simmons of St. Louis, Missouri; grandsons: Elders Kenneth D. Duke and Dr. Kelon D. Duke of Miami, Florida and Kevin O. Mack of Sacramento, California; granddaughters: Aheisha J.
