

Milton Frink, the son of the late John Burris Frink, Jr. and the late Blanchie Lawrence Frink, was born on May 28, 1952 in Columbus County, North Carolina. On Thursday, March 21, 2019, he peacefully and victoriously entered into eternal rest at UNC Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

Being reared in a very spiritual home, led by his mother, Milton confessed Christ as his personal savior at a very early age, and joined First Missionary Baptist Church, Chadbourn. As a lifelong member, he loved his church and church family, always working for its betterment. There he has served as an usher, member of the junior choir, trustee, and treasurer. Very dear to Milton's heart was serving as the church's dedicated Minister of Music and Musician (organist) for over 44 years, making a great impact on the music ministry of First Missionary Baptist Church, as well as the surrounding areas. He has also been director and musician for the Chadbourn Fellowship Alliance. He is the founder, leader, and was the primary musician for the Mary Lawrence Scholarship Choir. Under his leadership, the choir performed 30 years and from it the "New Generation Choir" was born and continues to thrive. Other churches Milton has served as musician are Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist, St. James Baptist, and Central Missionary Baptist. He has also been a part of the music ministry of the Columbus County Area Singers for several years. Milton started his music career in the humble beginnings of his home, but became a great and efficient musician in his own right, honing his skills at music conferences and workshops, most notably the Hampton Ministers' and Choir Guild Conference in which he enjoyed attending for many years until his health declined.

Milton received his elementary education at Westside High School, Chadbourn, NC, his secondary education at West Columbus High School, Cerro Gordo, NC and graduated in 1970. He matriculated to Fayetteville State University and graduated in 1974 with a B.S. Degree in Mathematics. In his desire to make his best better and mold the minds and lives of as many children as possible, Milton went on to receive a M.A. Degree and Licensure as a principal from North Carolina Central University, Durham, NC.

Before going away to college and beginning his career as the ultimate educator, Milton valued hard work. He performed manual labor on the farm and was employed with Davis' Cafe, some days working from sun up to sun down, all the while developing his work ethic which was carried over into his professional career. In 1973-1974, while completing his degree at Fayetteville State University, he was employed as a Substitute Teacher at Acme-Delco Junior/Senior High School, Delco, NC. In 1974, Milton embarked on a distinguished teaching career at Waccamaw Elementary School, Ash, NC. In 1975, he started the first of many assignments for Whiteville City Schools, Whiteville, NC, the most rewarding of which was the opportunity to serve as the illustrious Principal of Central Middle School from 1987 until 2003. Through his strong leadership, Central received Exemplary Growth and School of Distinction designations. In recognition of his being a consummate professional, Milton was awarded Whiteville City Schools' Wachovia Principal of the Year twice and Administrator of the Year Award four times. Because of the seeds he sowed and the teachers he trained under his leadership, Central Middle school continued to thrive and grow positively even after his retirement in June, 2003.

Upon his retirement from Whiteville City Schools, after 28 years, his love of education led him to seek a position in Horry County, SC. In the 2003-2004 school year, because of his Middle School expertise and success, Milton was selected as Assistant Principal of the brand new Aynor Middle School in Aynor, SC. In July, 2004, he became the principal of Aynor Middle with the overwhelming support and love of the Aynor

community. After eleven years, he ended his tenure in Horry County as an Assistant Principal at North Myrtle Beach Middle School in June of 2014.

As an educator for 41 years, Milton's ultimate goal was to help every student develop to the highest level of his or her ability. He was a dedicated and competent administrator who was cognizant of the fact that the student is the core of the curriculum around which everything else revolves. He felt that everything should be in the best interest of the students and all should be treated fairly.

Milton was active in many community organizations, and received honors and awards from many of them. He received The United Negro College Fund's Outstanding Citizen Award in 1994 and the Westside High School Alumni, D.C. Chapter Leadership and Community Service Award in 1991. He was a proud member of the National Westside Alumni Association and served as its Financial Secretary and was an active member of the Whiteville Civitans. Milton is a member and Past Worshipful Master of Dothan Lodge #200, a member and Past Worthy Patron of Morning Glory #538 Order of the Eastern Star, a member and Past District Grand Master of the 24th and 18th District Masons, a member of Allen Mingo Assembly Consistory #325, a member of Allen Mingo Commanders of Rite, and Past Grand Musician of Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

Fulfilling a dream of both his and his mothers, Milton graduated from Fayetteville Technical College with a Funeral Director's Diploma in May, 2017, in hopes of becoming a Funeral Director. He spent several months with People's Funeral Home of Whiteville, NC in preparation for this position and found it to be a very rewarding experience.






Milton was preceded in death by his parents, John B. Frink, Jr., Blanchie L. Frink and his sister, Phylisa F. Kelly.


