

He kept track of birthdays, photos old and new, and family accomplishments as the webmaster for over 20 years even after Facebook became a more convenient way of staying connected. Family members continue to visit the website to make sure birthdays aren't missed. In his retirement years if he was not on the go, he enjoyed working on the Family Ancestry. He spent countless hours investigating and chronicling the family lineage.

To say he loved family is truly an understatement. He loved his own family immensely. But one of the things that made him so special was the way he treated everyone like they were family.
