

Obituary

Our father, Lagous Williams was born to Ulysses and Mildred Parker Williams on August 14, 1943 in Columbus County, NC. He is the youngest male child with five siblings and extremely close to our grandmother (affectionately referred to by all as Mother) his first love.

Dad moved to Upstate, NY at a young age and worked for the U.S. Department of Treasury. He later moved to Brooklyn, NY where he met Gertrude Brailsford. They married at the young age of 21 and gave birth to their first born Tarsha Williams, November, 1966.

Dad didn't attend college but was a brilliant man with a photographic memory. We have been told that he was able to pass any civil service test taken on the first attempt. He decided however to serve with the New York City Department of Corrections where he later retired. He also worked with the Civil Court of the City of New York as a Court Officer after retirement.

On July 1997, Lagous and long-time partner, Elaine H. Brown, gave birth to Damien Brown in New York City. Both Damien and Tarsha provided him three grandchildren, Cydney Vaughn Turner, 23 years old, Caiden Harrison, 4 years old and Elizabeth Stocker McMullan, 2 years old.

In his later years, Dad fell in love and partnered with Karen Adams. It was Ms. Adams that was pivotal in galvanizing our family to establish new dynamics of communication and openness with our father. This was pivotal in improving our relation with our father and extending the new family dynamics to the grandchildren for the last 15 years. Our father was a strong man who was rarely, if ever, sick. Despite the challenges of his last days, he was true to form in his strength and pure will.

Our father was a complicated man and it is difficult to try and explain all of his dynamics and complexities in a few short paragraphs. He was mysterious, private, territorial, yet compassionate, kind and giving. There were a few things he loved and cared about – visiting his family's hometown of Boardman, NC, Atlantic City and cars. But we have come to know in these later days that we and the entire Williams clan (his nieces, nephews and cousins), were his greatest love.

It is hard for us to believe that this giant is gone and the memories he has left behind with so many answered and unanswered questions speak to his mystery. However, we are grateful that he afforded us an opportunity to get to know him better. We are even more grateful that he fully accepted with much joy and openness the role of "grandpa" with the Three Grand Musketeers. We see so much of our father in both of us. And there are glimmers of his attributes in the grandchildren as well. We are proud to be his offsprings and even more honored to have been afforded this opportunity to honor him as he transitions to the new phase in his life.
