




Not Enough Time

Samuel Council was born to the late John and Lubertha Council on September 1,1939 in Fayetteville, NC. At an early age he relocated to Trenton, NJ and was educated in the Trenton public school system. He was a member of Bethel United Holiness Church under the leadership of Bishop Jesse Spivey, where he accepted the Lord as his savior.

Sam always took extra care of his dear mother and dominated as the fearless protector of his family. He had a special bond with his brothers John and Emanuel. Some of his favorite past times included fishing, playing cards, riding motorcycles, switching into fancy cars, training his son Samuel and others to box, listening to oldies music, watching Family Feud, and roller-skating with his brother Emanuel and friend Carter. He had a love for soul food, sweets, hats, wing tip shoes and money. Sam loved horses and was known for riding his wild horses into the city. Quiet often, he would provide this experience to his entire family and take them horseback riding for the day. Sam had a large and in charge personality. He held a vast portfolio of many businesses: Councils Fuel Oil, Councils Janitorial and Trucking, Councils Demolition, Gloria's Used Cars; five bars: The Coco, The Nite Life, Broadway Lounge, Thunderbird, The Horseshoe; two dance halls: Paynton Place and Teenage Paradise; a seafood restaurant, three deli's: Southern Street Deli, Lincoln Deli, Councils Deli and multiple rental properties throughout the county. He was also ower of a horseback riding stable where he maintained 25 horses.

In addition, he was a talented boxer and trainer. A two time golden glove champion in 1960 and 1961; Sam was referred to, as the "Golden Glove Man" because every boxer he trained became a golden glove champion. He was known for his mean left hook. As his brother Wayne would say, "He was known for slipping and jabbing not shooting and stabbing". He was also known as "Sam Money Count", "The Rock" and "Jitter Bug". A lover of big hats, he was one of the Big Hat Boys. His life and legacy speak for itself. He led a life that needed no introduction.


