



The Obituary


THE humble servant, King Moore, Jr., was born the fifth child to the late King Moore, Sr., and Mrs. Tennie Humphrey Moore on October 26, 1924. He attended public school in Marlin, Texas, and joined the United States Navy, serving his country honorably for a number of years. King Moore, Jr., fondly shared stories about his experience in the Navy. He shared a story of him being in a windstorm, and he had to hold onto a pole with the wind stretching him out, but God protected him from being blown overboard. After returning from the Navy, he worked for many years in different areas of the Veterans Affairs Medical Center before retiring as a nursing assistant.



KING was married to the late Mrs. Florene Jackson Moore, and to this union was born a son, Lonnie Joe Moore, who was cherished and loved and adoringly referred to by his dad as "My Boy."




KING MOORE, JR., professed a hope in Christ as a child and remained steadfast in this hope until his last breath. He was baptized in Jesus' Name and began pastoring after his calling into the ministry from God. He pastored the Free Church of God in Christ in Jesus' Name under the leadership of Bishop Earl Evans, Sr. He never changed pastoring of the same congregation, but the name of the church was changed to King's Christian House of Prayer in the late 90s, affiliated with Apostolic Pentecostal Fellowship of Churches. He served in this organization as an elder under the leadership of the late Bishop Horace Stacey. Elder Moore was recommended to become a Bishop and was ordained by Bishop Dwayne Williams. He was the oldest member still leading a church and was respected as a humble servant by those who encountered him. He NEVER refused to openly praise the Lord with a dance and "Hallelujah, Hallelujah." Bishop Moore believed in testifying and sharing how good the Lord had been to him down through the years. He shared his calling at 33 years of age, his walk to Beaumont, Texas, preaching at his cousin's church after being refused initially, being saved from injury in a truck wreck in Dallas, TX. At 97 years of age, he had many testimonies and always encouraged us to love and to "Be not forgetful: to entertain strangers for thereby some have entertained angels unawares."




BISHOP MOORE had great faith, was a prayer warrior, FASTED, PRAYED, and was HEALED from being on DIALYSIS for KIDNEY failure. He would testify: "If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you Howbeit this kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting."



BISHOP MOORE was active in the church organization attending local joint meetings and state and national church conventions. He humbly rejoiced when we received first place for Sabbath School banner.






