Johnson, Jr. Rev. Johnson was first called as a pastor of a church in April of 1954, which means Sis. Devora has been a First Lady for 65 years. She was not a First Lady content to sit back and let others do the work. Sis. Devora Bradley Johnson has worked timelessly over the years as Vice President of mission auxiliary, mission president, a Sunday school teacher, Director of youth department at Upper Zion Missionary Baptist Church, Treasurer of ministers wives of the Falls County District Association, Youth Director of the Sunday school and BTU Congress, member of intercessors of prayer warriors, sponsored youth to attend summer camp through the Falls County Cooperative Extension Program, and served as chairperson on a number of other programs and committees. Other community clubs/organizations include: Marlin Chamber of Commerce, BTW Alumni Association, Ready to Help Club, NAACP, and Order of Eastern Star Peace Chapter #232.

Sis. Devora once said, "He (referring to her husband, Pastor Johnson) works on the soul, and I work on the body. "

Sis. Devora is known by many for providing kind, comforting words to everyone she encounters. She was quoted as saying, "My thank you, get well and congratulation cards cost as much as my groceries do every week." All cards were handwritten by her to make others feel special and loved. She said, "I love doing it because it makes them feel better."

EMPLOYMENT

On March 1, 1960, Devora was hired as a license vocational nurse with Torbett Hutchins-Smith Memorial Hospital, now renamed Falls Community Hospital and Clinic. Devora was inspired at an early age by "playing-nurse" for her younger siblings. Devora said, "I just love to do things for people and I always have."

At the Marlin Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year Award Ceremony in 2008, the late Willis Reese, who was administrator of the Falls Community Hospital and Clinic from 1996 to 2017, presented Devora with the Citizen of the Year award, which she had no idea that she was receiving. During the presentation, Mr. Reese said, "I would like to be more like her myself. If everyone was like Mrs. Devora, we wouldn't have any problems in the world today."

Mr. Reese shared comments from Mrs. Devora's initial interview file notations: Appears promptly for appointments, very neat in appearance, courteous and polite, a very confident adult. Mr. Reese said, "And that's still her standards today. She is an exceptional nurse providing excellent care to all her patients. She works extremely well with her coworkers and is always on time. In 12 years, I have never known or have I heard a complaint about Mrs. Devora...NEVER, always compliments!"

She has said on many occasions, "I can retire at any time, but nursing is my ministry. I love people and I love ministering to them. The more I give, the more God blesses me to give to my family and others."

Mrs. Devora retired on February 1, 2011, at the age of 80. She was employed as an L.V.N. for 50 years and 11 months. When she retired, she was working three 12-hour shifts a week.
