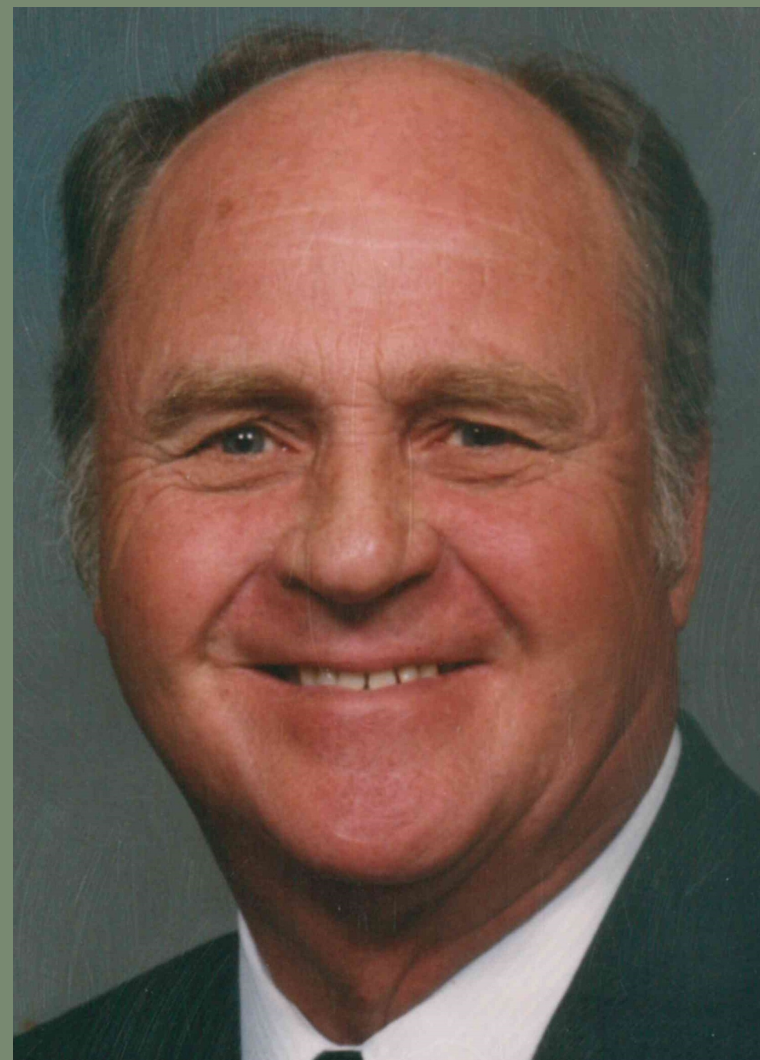


I think I caught one
