



Celebrating 100 years

in the Life of

Mrs. Letha Juanita Page

100 years ago on November 15, 1919 LETHA JUANITA (COPHER) PAGE was born to the union of Henry and Tabitha Copher in Troy, Missouri. *Letha* was the baby, the tenth child, and the last living. Her parents, sisters, Beulah Bragg, Adalee Copher, Emily Copher, Stella McKinney, Lutiel Wheeler, Goldie Vincent; brothers, Ed Copher, Henry Copher, Jr. and Charles B. Copher all preceded her in death.

Letha attended school in the St. Louis Public School System and graduated from Sumner High, Class of 1935. She worked in food service and daycare for all her employment.

Letha married Hiawatha Page and to their union five children were born. Letha and her family lived in "The Ville" area and she was well loved. She was a mother to everyone and would help anyone in need. She had a great sense of humor and loved to make people laugh. She would walk up and down the street smiling and speaking to everyone. Letha was a God loving woman who enjoyed watching "Judge Judy" and "The Price is Right." Letha was celebrated and most proud to have lived to see 100 years of age and the first black President of the United States. She passed away just one month and one day of what would have been her 101st birthday.

Letha's husband, Hiawatha, and two sons, Carrol Leeroy Allen and Alex Page preceded her in death. She is survived by one daughter, Juanita Page; and two sons, Damon Page and William "Billy" Allen (Arcelia); 8 grandchildren, 5+ great grandchildren, and a host of nephews, nieces, and friends.
