Scenes from the October Luncheon -- Lethal Injection in Arizona by Lisa Bossard Funk, Esq.

We had a wonderful turnout at our October 16th luncheon, when 45 people turned out to enjoy a scrumptious buffet lunch and to hear a debate about lethal injection in capital punishment cases. Two speakers, Julie Hall and John Todd, discussed this controversial issue from vastly different points of view and experience.

Julie Hall is an attorney in private practice who has focused exclusively on capital litigation since 1999. Ms. Hall argued that 37 of 38 states, including Arizona, plus the US government, use lethal injection as their primary method of capital execution based on protocols that were created three decades ago with no scientific research. According to Ms. Hall, the American Medical Association takes the position that doctors should not participate in executions, and the American Society of Anesthesiologists has issued a public statement strongly urging members to "steer clear" of any participation in executions by lethal injection. Such executions have been challenged in litigation throughout the US as resulting in unnecessary and excruciating pain in violation of the Constitutional ban on cruel and unusual punishment. Ms. Hall discussed and distributed the opinion of United States Supreme Court opinion in *Hill v. McDonough*, 126 S.Ct. 2096 (June 12, 2006), in which a Florida prisoner challenged in a § 1983 action the constitutionality of lethal injection by three-drug sequence. Ms. Hall also distributed materials about the [Arizona State Prison](#) and from the [Death Penalty Information Center](#).

John Todd has served as a prosecutor with the Arizona Attorney General's Office investigating and litigating various types of criminal cases for over thirty years. Mr. Todd contended that the vicious and cruel nature of the murders committed by several local-area death row convicts outweighs any argument that lethal injection might pose a risk of excruciating pain to the convicts upon their execution. He stressed the distinction between objecting to the method of capital punishment and objecting to capital punishment in its entirety. Mr. Todd was of the opinion that challenging lethal injections as cruel and unusual was a waste of judicial resources so long as capital punishment itself remains legal.

The debate on this topic was certainly thought-provoking, and we greatly appreciate the time, effort and energy invested by Ms. Hall and Mr. Todd to create such an engaging presentation.

The State Bar Appointments Committee is currently accepting applications from *active members in good standing* to fill the following upcoming vacancies. ARIZONA COMMISSION ON APPELLATE COURT APPOINTMENTS

Purpose: This non-partisan commission is chaired by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona (or his/her designee). Primary responsibility is to screen, interview and select judicial candidates for submission to the Governor of Arizona for his/her final selection to fill judicial vacancies.

Openings: Two. Commissioner Deborah Oseran (Mendelsohn & Oseran, PLC, Tucson) is completing her second term and is ineligible for reappointment. D. Burr Udall (Chandler & Udall, LLP, Tucson) is completing two and a half years of an unexpired term and is not seeking reappointment to a full four-year term. The other attorney-commissioners are Albert M. Flores (Attorney at Law; Phoenix), Mark K. Briggs (Quarles & Brady Streich Lang, LLP, Phoenix), and Robert E. Schmitt (Murphy, Lutey, Schmitt & Fuchs, PLLC, Prescott). The State Bar's Board of Governors submits nominations to the Governor of Arizona for his/her appointment, subject to the advice and consent of the Arizona State Senate.

Criteria/Qualifications: Applicants must be active members of, and in good standing with, the State Bar of Arizona. Applicants must be admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of Arizona for not less than five (5) years and may reside in any county other than Maricopa County. There are no restrictions as to one's political party affiliation for these openings. The Commission meets as necessary when judicial openings occur.

Term: Four years.

ARIZONA COMMISSION ON JUDICIAL CONDUCT

Purpose: This 11-member Commission (six judicial members appointed by the Supreme Court; three non-lawyer public members appointed by the Governor; and two State Bar members appointed by the Board of Governors) addresses issues concerning the interpretation of the Canons of Judicial Ethics and investigates complaints against members of Arizona's judiciary. Additional information regarding the Commission may be found at Article 6.1 of the Constitution of the State of Arizona.

Openings: One appointment will be made by the State Bar's Board of Governors. Harold L. Watkins (Aspey Watkins & Diesel, PLLC, Flagstaff) is completing a six-year term and is not seeking reappointment to another term. The State Bar's other representative is Sheila S. Polk (Yavapai County Attorney, Prescott).

Length of Term: Six years.

Criteria/Qualifications: Applicants must be active members of, and in good standing with, the State Bar of Arizona. Applicants must be admitted to practice before the Arizona Supreme Court for not less than five (5) years.

DNA-PEOPLE'S LEGAL SERVICES, INC. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Purpose: This 24-member Board provides direction to the largest Native American legal services program in the country. The State Bar of Arizona is allotted three seats on the Board. Since its inception in 1967, DNA, a non-profit corporation, has pursued an aggressive program of legal advocacy for the disadvantaged, has actively promoted community legal education, and has been instrumental in the advancement of the Navajo Nation's court system, which serves as a model for tribes across the nation.

Openings: Two appointments will be made by the State Bar's Board of Governors. DNA Board member Robert L. Miller (Law Office of Robert L. Miller, PC, Flagstaff) is completing his final term and ineligible for reappointment. DNA Board member Craig W. Soland (Arizona Attorney General's Office, Phoenix) is completing two years of an

unexpired term and is seeking reappointment to a full four-year term. The State Bar's other representative is Faith C. Klepper (Calderón Law Offices, Phoenix).

Criteria/Qualifications: Applicants must be active members of, and in good standing with, the State Bar of Arizona. Judicial members are also eligible to apply. The DNA Board meets four times per year, usually on a Saturday, in Window Rock, Arizona. Expenses are paid (by DNA) for all meetings, but there is no other compensation for service as a Board member.

Term: Four years.

PIMA COUNTY COMMISSION ON TRIAL COURT APPOINTMENTS

Purpose: This non-partisan commission is chaired by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona (or his/her designee). Primary responsibility is to screen, interview and select judicial candidates for submission to the Governor of Arizona for his/her final selection to fill judicial vacancies.

Opening: Two. Commissioner Anthony J. Abruzzo (Attorney at Law; Supervisorial District 3) has served two terms and is ineligible for reappointment. Commissioner Cynthia T. Kuhn (Rusing & Lopez, PLLC; Supervisorial District 1) is completing her first term and is seeking reappointment to a four-year term. The other lawyer-commissioners are John C. Hinderaker (Lewis and Roca, LLP; Supervisorial District 2), Elizabeth D. Bushell (Elizabeth D. Bushell, PLC; Supervisorial District 4) and John R. Evans (Arizona Attorney General's Office; Supervisorial District 5). The State Bar's Board of Governors submits nominations to the Governor of Arizona for his/her appointment, subject to the advice and consent of the Arizona State Senate.

Criteria/Qualifications: Applicants must be active members of, and in good standing with, the State Bar of Arizona. Applicants must reside in Supervisorial District 1 or 3 in Pima County and be admitted to practice before the Arizona Supreme Court for not less than five (5) years. There are no restrictions as to one's political party affiliation for these openings. To learn what district you reside in within Pima County, go to <http://www.recorder.pima.gov/search/geocode/search.html> or call the Pima County Recorder's Office at 520-740-4350. The Trial Court Commission meets as necessary when judicial openings occur.

Term: Four years.

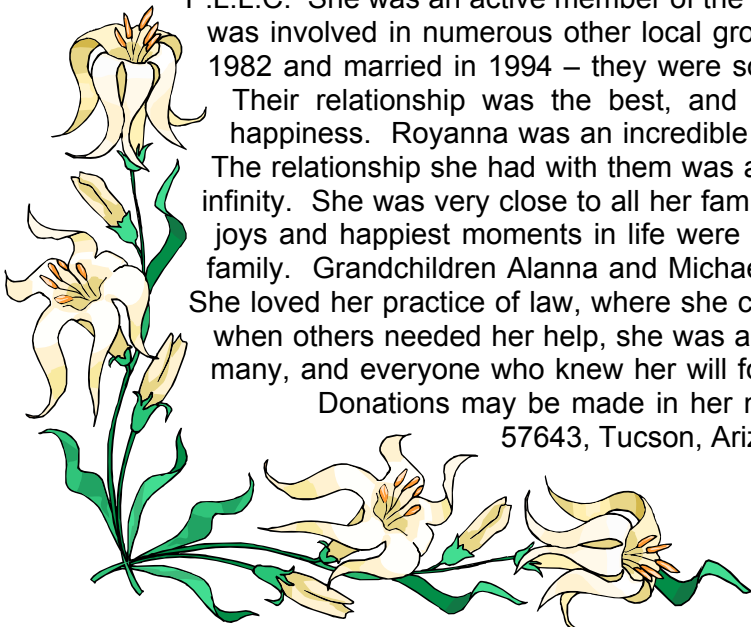

This month's factoid: Arizona ranks near the bottom of the states when it comes to volunteering, says a national study released in June. Arizona placed 45th (tied with Rhode Island) for volunteers 16 and older over the three-year period of 2003-05. Utah led the nation at 48%, with Nebraska second at 42.8%, followed by Minnesota at 40.7%, Iowa at 39.2% and Alaska at 38.9%. Arizona was at 24.9%. The nationwide volunteer rate is 28.8%.
