## Scenes from the September Luncheon

For anyone interested in becoming a member of the judiciary or wanting to learn more about the judicial selection process, September's luncheon was the place to be. Judge Leslie Miller facilitated a discussion with three members of the Pima County Commission on Trial Court Appointments before approximately 45 attendees and seven visitors. The Commission is responsible for submitting names of successful applicants to the Governor for consideration for judicial appointments. Commission members Lyle Rayfield, Carole Siegler and Elizabeth Bushell shared these insights:

<u>Demonstrate Commitment to Community Service</u>: The Commission looks for candidates who have participated in significant community service. Siegler shared that while it is important to be a bright person, the Commission looks at what the

person has done with that intellect. Commission members would like to see that an applicant has contributed to the community to advance herself beyond just obtaining a law degree. Bushell further elaborated that, in addition to trial experience, the Commission looks at the applicant's reputation in the legal community, their bar service, and whether they have given back to the bar and legal community.

<u>Face Any Problems in Your Background Head On.</u> Many attorneys may have a blemish on their record due to a mistake, a lapse in judgment, or some other problematic event. The panelists stressed that an applicant may be able to overcome such a problem by directly addressing the problem and demonstrating how he or she has dealt with it, learned from it and moved on from it in a positive way. As Bushell explained, "It is easy to make a mistake, but it can be overcome if the situation is addressed head on and the applicant explains what they have done differently." Having peers come forward to share how the applicant has been changed because of the problem is also helpful.

References Should Give Specific Information About Your Character. Recommendations play an important role in the selection process. The panelists strongly recommended against

generic statements. Instead, the Commission needs to hear specific examples that show an applicant's character. Siegler explained, "We want to see what sets this applicant apart." The power of good recommendations should not be underestimated. The panelists reminded applicants to notify

their references so they are prepared to answer questions from the Commission. The Commission members stressed that, while it is important to have an equal balance between references who are close to the applicant and references who are well-known in the community, it is the quality of what the references have to say that is most important.

<u>Contact Commission Members</u>. While applicants may feel shy about contacting Commission members to introduce themselves, our panelists emphasized the importance of contacting at least one to two members. Commission members stated that they are happy to speak with applicants to learn more about them and answer appropriate questions.



<u>If At First You Don't Succeed, Reapply.</u> It is no secret that the judicial selection process is rigorous, demanding and competitive. If an applicant is not selected, the panelists encouraged them to re-submit materials and keep trying. "Re-applying shows what is important to the applicant," stated Rayfield. "This demonstrates the applicant's commitment and determination."

<u>Final Thoughts</u>: Although there is no set age requirement for applications, the trend has been toward individuals aged 40 or older. If an applicant feels she is "too young" but is still serious about being considered, she should address this issue by explaining why the Commission should select her and the experiences she would bring to the position. Siegler commented that life experience plays a large role, rather than strictly a numeric age. Overall, the Commission looks for bright, well-rounded applicants who have contributed to the community. Quick learners are also favored because the successful applicant will often begin on a bench in which they have limited experience. The panelists provided many helpful insights into the judicial selection process. AWLA members who are considering applying for judicial appointment are reminded that the AWLA Judicial Appointments Committee is available to help applicants by conducting mock interviews and providing assistance in completing applications.



# "When I went to law school, nobody heard of civil rights."

Constance Baker Motley died this month at the age of 84. The following story about her life was found on the Columbia University website.



Over fifty-plus years as a jurist, Constance Baker Motley has had a major impact on ending racial discrimination. As the NAACP Legal Defense Fund's associate counsel, she participated in writing the briefs for *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, Kan., et.al.*, the landmark 1954 U.S. Supreme Court case that ended school segregation. From October 1961 to the end of 1964, Motley won nine of the 10 civil rights cases she argued before the Court, including James Meredith's successful suit to attend the University of Mississippi. She went on to break down other gender and race barriers as the first African-American woman elected to

the New York state senate (1964) and to the Manhattan borough presidency (1965). Appointed to a judgeship for the Southern District of New York in 1966, she became the first African-American woman on the federal bench and, in 1982, the first African-American woman to serve as chief judge. Motley assumed senior judge status in 1986, and in 2001, President Bill Clinton awarded her the Presidential Citizens' Medal in recognition of her achievements and service to the nation.

After graduating from New York University in 1943, Motley took a well-paying job with a wartime agency that aided the dependents of servicemen. A year later, she turned down a promotion to attend Columbia Law School. "That's the dumbest thing I ever heard, a complete waste of time," her supervisor told her. "Women don't get anywhere in the law." While still a law student at Columbia, Motley met Thurgood Marshall, the NAACP's legal director, who offered her a job as a law clerk in the organization's New York office. After receiving her law degree in 1946, Motley became a full-fledged member of the NAACP's legal staff. In April 1995, she returned to Columbia to receive the Florence

E. Allen Award, given by the New York Women's Bar Association and named after the woman Motley said was her role model as a female judge. In February 2004, Motley came back to Columbia Law School for an event marking the 50th anniversary of *Brown v. Board of Education*.

## **Faculty Profile from Mount Holyoke College**

## Martha A. Ackmann Senior Lecturer in Women's Studies

**Specialization**: U.S. women's movement; women in politics; women athletes; representation of women in the media; female body image; sexual harassment; women in aviation; women astronauts.



Martha Ackmann is a noted feminist and public intellectual. A former journalist and radio broadcaster, she is the author of *The Mercury 13: The Untold Story of Thirteen American Women and the Dream of Space Flight* (Random House, June 2003). The book tells the story of a group of female pilots who were secretly tested for space flight in the early 1960s, only to be dismissed by NASA and Capitol Hill. Lynn Sherr of ABC News and

20/20 has written the foreword for Ackmann's book. Sherr was one of forty finalists for the Journalist in Space Program in the 1980s. Ackmann received the 2001 Amelia Earhart Research Scholars Grant from the Ninety-Nines, the international organization of women pilots. Her book has been optioned by CBS.

Ackmann, who teaches courses on contemporary feminism, has published a wide-variety of opeds in many national outlets. Recent essays have run in the *New York Times*, the *Los Angeles Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, the *Christian Science Monitor*, *Salon*, and major newspapers in Atlanta, Philadelphia, Detroit, Boston, Chicago, Miami, Anchorage, and Charlotte. Among the topics Ackmann has examined are the popularity of prescribing Prozac for women's health issues, the NCAA's treatment of women athletes, pay inequity for female tennis champions at Wimbledon, abandoned baby cases, Clinton/Lewinsky, and "widow's mandate" political candidates.

Ackmann has done numerous radio interviews for outlets including NPR and the Voice of America, as well as provided commentary for Internet sites, such as ESPN. She also has served as a source for news articles for *USA Today*, the *Chronicle of Higher Education*, and the *New York Times* on topics as diverse as women in the American political process and the use of maiden names by married women.

Ackmann is an expert on the poetry of Emily Dickinson; her scholarly work has appeared in the *Emily Dickinson Journal*, the *Dickinson Encyclopedia*, and the anthology *The Emily Dickinson Handbook*. In 1999, Ackmann coordinated the largest gathering ever of Emily Dickinson scholars, hosting the Emily Dickinson International Society at Mount Holyoke. Ackmann has lectured on Dickinson in Austria and Norway, and at many colleges and universities across the United States. She serves on the board of the Emily Dickinson International Society and on the board of the Dickinson Homestead in Amherst, Massachusetts. She is also cofounder of the scholarly publication *Legacy: A Journal of American Women Writers*.
