



## Charter Memberships Available April 1-June 1

Things are moving fast at Bellingham At Home. Since our last newsletter, we've developed a launch plan and will be starting to sign up members next month. The big news right now is Charter Memberships. Beginning April 1, Charter Memberships are available at a special rate of \$350 per year for three years. By joining early, you'll be able to lock in the annual membership fee. If you choose to wait, you will be subject to annual increases as services are added.

We're firming up membership details. Check the website for updates. The membership application form will be available very soon. We will notify you when it's posted on the website, and we'll let you know how you can request a form if you don't use a computer.

## Soft Opening June 1

Volunteers will start delivering support services in June. We're calling it a soft opening because we know we'll need a little time to get things running smoothly. We will have everything working by July 1, our full-program launch date. We remind you, and ourselves, that we are a work in progress and will respond to input from members, volunteers, and the community at large.

## Membership Details Announced

Our Membership task force, headed by Elaine Cress of the Leadership Council, has been hard at work developing a definition for Bellingham At Home membership, including criteria, levels, membership fees, and benefits. At the BSAC's Housing Options As We Age 2016 event last month, we previewed the membership plan and got feedback from attendees. The reception was enthusiastic.

Below is a summary of Bellingham At Home membership.

### ***Membership Levels***

You can join at the Full Household Membership level, with or without the Charter Membership option. Charter Members are Full Household Members with the added benefit of a membership fee that doesn't change for the first three years. Full Household Membership applies to one home. The other level of membership is Associate Membership, which is offered at a reduced membership fee to those who wish to have access only to our activities and our vetted service provider referrals; they may live outside our Village boundaries.

Membership is open to people age 50 and over (exceptions will be considered) who reside in the Bellingham At Home area.

### ***Membership Fees***

Bellingham At Home is a community cooperative enterprise. Membership fees are used to support operating expenses such as part-time paid staff, office rental, telephone, equipment, vetting, insurance, and monthly software charges.

**Charter Full Household Member:** Fixed membership rate (\$350) for three years. Joining with this membership option is available only from April 1 to June 1, 2016.

**Full Household Member:** Payable annually. Year 1 (2016) \$350; subsequent years subject to increase as services are added. A monthly payment plan is available for this level but may incur an additional charge.

**Associate Member:** Payable annually. Year 1 (2016) \$150; subsequent years subject to increase as services are added.

### ***Member Benefits:***

- A single number to call for a helping hand
- A chance to talk with someone who cares about you as a member
- Referrals to vetted service providers with preferred terms and rates for our members
- Access to vetted, trained service volunteers for helping-hand chores and transportation
- Participation in social events
- A chance to volunteer and be part of a community within a community
- Bellingham Senior Activity Center membership for one person in the household.

Additional benefits will be available in years 2 and 3.

### ***Membership Applications***

Applications to join will be accepted starting April 1st, 2016. Before then, the application form will be downloadable from our [website](#). We will notify you when it's there. A membership form will be mailed to individuals who have recently submitted the paper form indicating an interest in joining.

## **Bellingham At Home Service Area**

Where will our Village services be available? We're close to pinning it down on the map. The boundaries include everything within Bellingham city limits--plus. What are we deciding? Well, frankly, we want to make sure that we can get service volunteers into all the areas that we open up to membership. Setting our boundaries too far from the city center may seem beneficial to some people who live on the fringes of the city limits, but in reality it could be a source of dissatisfaction if we are unable to deliver on our service promise. We want to start with something manageable and then possibly extend the boundaries as we grow. Please check our website. We will have details posted soon.

## Task Forces Need Help:

More volunteers are needed for two of our pre-launch task forces, Fundraising and Service Providers. Their work is key to laying the groundwork for our Village so we can launch services. Please consider joining one of these:

### ***Fundraising***

Our budget depends on more than membership fees. Established villages report needing to raise 50-60% of their budgets from other sources. Particularly in this start-up year, our Fundraising task force needs more person power. If you would like to help, please join us.

### ***Service Providers***

One of the primary benefits we provide members is access to service providers in our communities who are interested in working with older adults and willing to provide their services at a discount. The task of the Service Provider task force is to recruit such businesses and coach them through the application process. We are contacting everyone, from electricians to estate planners, from contractors to counsellors – and beyond. There is a long list of services our members will need.
