Presentation of Safety Gear by Dan Hoke and Tara Harney

<u>Binoculars</u>: Extensive information presented. Some notes: Many options. Dan discussed the uses for binoculars including looking for distant destinations, paddling across a harbor, noting paddlers within and outside the group, who may be in the distance. Coast Guard presence and the ability to assist rescuers. <u>Important features include</u>: Eye Relief, which is how far you can be from the lens and still maintain a full field of view. 16 mm is most significant number for the binoculars. Binoculars are written as number (for example 8) by another number (for example 25). The first number is the magnification. The second number is the diameter of the lens. The greater the diameter, the more light is admitted. Coated lenses may offer better light colors. The initials WP mean waterproof...good for us water people. Dan is a great resource for additional detail.

<u>GPS and Tracking systems</u> were discussed by Dan Hoke and Tara Harney. Many factors to consider. Take some time to determine what you are looking for in GPS systems including navigational charts, satellite capability, radio functions, mapping functions, personal locator, waterproofness, coastal and topographical maps, way points, e-tracking, battery operation-rechargeable? Screen size. Dan and Tara are excellent resources for further information.
