Of many important accomplishments this year, perhaps the most significant was the decision to merge the League's 501(c)(4) membership entity into its Educational Fund 501(c)(3). Encouraged by Carol Reimers, President of LWVCT, guided by the professional advice of Tom Carson, who has shepherded 200 Leagues through this process, and influenced by conversations with two other Leagues who have made the transition, a Board Committee of five (Caroline Adkins, Jane Brash, Becky Gillan, Louisa Greene, and I) recommended the merger in March 2021 to the Board.

Unanimous Board support and overwhelming support from the membership at the Annual Meeting on June 2 means that we move into an era where volunteer work is much less complicated and where all financial contributions, including membership fees, are tax deductible – this with no loss of advocacy influence.

As we are a volunteer organization, the IRS limit on lobbying is a relatively insignificant restriction. Although we maintain a placeholder budget line for lobbying expenses, LWV Greenwich has never incurred anywhere close to the IRS maximum of 20% of expenditures communicating with our state legislators, our membership, or the public.

We renamed our organization LWV Greenwich to reflect our interest in attracting both men and women to membership and committee and Board service.

Our new digital capabilities open a new world of connection to younger people – including parents of children in primary and secondary education, as well as students. We are adapting our highly regarded publications to the digital medium to reach a wider constituency of people. We are filling out our website with information about many events, activities, issues, and opportunities to participate. Members have shown an interest in communicating to us about the topics they care about. We are actively recruiting those who want to help. Please let me know if you are interested.

The Board is highly active and productive. Zoom Board meeting attendance has been above 90%.

Board priorities were to expand membership and membership engagement. Our nonmember database of nearly 1500 represents those interested enough in LWV Greenwich to attend our programs and expands our ability to target and to recruit new members. We ask every nonmember attendee to our events to join the League, and that request has produced positive results.

Our website automates the membership renewal process and enables us to offer member-only benefits only to members in good standing.

Adapting to our new digital platform has come with growing pains, too, as some digitally reluctant members are confused by the need to sign in. However, we understand from other Leagues using the Club Express platform that this adjustment is short-lived.

Marla Laney received the prestigious Burnett Award in thanks for her decades of service to the League. She was the talented creator of the *Voter's Guide* and the *Greenwich Voter* newsletter. More information about this award and Marla are available on our website.

Our Voter's Services team – Joanne Stavrou and Becky Gillan – will be presented with the Mary Award at our Annual Dinner on September 23, 2021. More information about this award and Joanne and Becky are available on our website.

A special thank you goes to retiring Board members Joanne Stavrou and Marla Laney, League stalwarts. Also, thanks to Anne-Marie Hesser, Michele Kinner, and Sharon Kinney who gave much positive energy and work toward our cause. We will miss them all, but, hopefully, they will all stay connected through our League activities and events.

LWV Greenwich *Voter Services*

Thanks to our members and friends, the move to virtual events via Zoom has been highly successful. Many on the Board, members, and volunteers worked diligently to make these events possible.

The July 8, 2020, Legislative Picnic was via Zoom and 92 attended.

For National Voters Registration Day on September 22, 2020, Cathy Steel led an email campaign totaling 32,705 mailings working with local partners such as the Selectman's Newsletter, YWCA, YMCA, Boys and Girls Club.

A total of 380 unique Zoom visitors attended our October 8, 2020, Debates with our State and House Representatives in two live sessions in Town Hall at 7pm and 7:45pm. The debate was live on GCTV (Greenwich Community Television), Channel 79 and on YouTube at GCTV. Those registered submitted their questions in advance, and they were collated and artfully presented by our moderator, Kay Maxwell.

The League prepares an extensive *Voter's Guide* before each election. Importantly, this year the guide was done digitally for the first time through the herculean effort of Kath Burgweger, Marla Laney and Helaine Winer. We used the League's National Platform of Vote411.org. The guide provides nationwide information on the election for candidates at the federal, state, and local levels. The candidate responses in the guide come directly from the candidates and are unedited by the League.

Over 550 teachers and students zoomed on October 30, 2020, for the Greenwich High School "We the People Debates" with four moderator students asking questions they prepared to the eight candidates. Greenwich High School's WTP coach, Aaron Hull, and Lucy Arreco, Social Studies Coordinator, worked with the students to make the event a huge success.

LWV Greenwich *Membership/Development*

For the past fiscal year, LWV Greenwich membership drives have been conducted in both print and online. The success of the League's virtual Zoom events has helped membership grow. Both new individual and household members have been persuaded to join us following these interactive events, including those about the BET and Board of Education.

LWV Greenwich closed out the fiscal year with a membership of 335, including 71 Centennial Patrons (\$100), 52 Centennial Households (\$150), 51 Households (\$100), 119 Individuals (\$65), 26 Seniors, 9 Students, and 7 Lifetime Members. We have 20 new members since January. The fiscal year budget for Membership was \$17,000. We exceeded our financial goal, a major accomplishment since our Annual Meeting had to be conducted virtually rather than in person.

The Development Budget for FY20-21 was \$7,500. The year-end digital appeal raised \$7,700, exceeding the goal during a very challenging year in which most events and programs were conducted by Zoom. The Development Budget funds the League's voter services and citizen education activities. In 2020-2021, these activities reached an estimated 6000 people through its *Voter's Guide* and programming, including candidate debates.

Since August 2020, the League has used Club Express to host our website, handle event management, online donations and membership subscriptions. The transition to online membership has had its share of challenges, but LWV Greenwich membership has increasingly embraced the digital age! There has also been a positive response to combining both membership and donations on the reply envelope as well as on our LWVG website DONATE page. Many donors use the League's website to add an Ed Fund donation when they join or renew their membership. The League is also using social media with a link to our website DONATE page to inform potential members and donors about ways to support LWV Greenwich financially.

At the June 2, 2021 Annual Meeting, LWV Greenwich members approved the merger of the League's two IRS entities into one 501(c)(3) non-profit tax-exempt organization. This means that Membership dues are now fully tax-deductible. This new streamlined non-profit status simplifies the process of joining, renewing, and donating in one transaction – either by check or online using a credit card.

Thank you sincerely to all who joined, renewed and donated to LWV Greenwich during our Centennial year. We look forward to working together as we enter an important municipal election in November 2021.

Club Express: New Website and Communication System

Social Media

In August 2020, we launched the new website for LWV Greenwich on the Club Express platform. Since that time, we have had approximately website 13,000 visits due to the usage of the website as a membership database management system, club calendar, email platform and general information hub for our organization.

During COVID, the website has allowed LWV Greenwich to maintain contact with our community and enhance our outreach by maintaining and growing our email contact list. As of today, we have over 1800 unique email addresses of both members and non-members. We continue to add to that list through co-sponsored programming with the Greenwich Library, the Greenwich YWCA, the Greenwich Historical Society, the Greenwich Association of Realtors and other community-based groups.

Our communications for LWV Greenwich programming include an initial email with 2 follow-up emails, social media posting (Facebook and Instagram) and a post event follow up email that includes a survey (also housed on the website) and an ask for donations. We also now include a newsletter type format for our emails which includes information on upcoming events or other membership related to minimize the number of emails that go out to our membership.

New to the website in the past couple of months is the League News page where we house recent articles and information about community related issues, LWV Greenwich Voter, program related documents, Student Essay Contest essays, and other pertinent information.

There are more than 80 LWV chapters now using the Club Express website/membership database management system. The League has organized roundtable groups for these chapters to discuss “best practices” and act as one voice in communicating with Club Express. We participate in the general sessions as well as the committee-based group meetings.

The communications committee is looking for volunteers to help with the collection of content for our League News page – articles related to our programming and other community issues.

Digital Media & Virtual Engagement

LWV Greenwich has reached more people and had more events and interaction than in any year prior. We've owned the narrative and improved perception of LWV Greenwich as a non-partisan community civics organization for people of all ages regardless of gender. Managing and hosting our digital engagement presence via Zoom has enabled us to develop a clear path to membership growth and diversification but engagement and education, too. But this is a learning process. We're learning how to take full advantage of the digital tools available to us. Virtual events held on Zoom expanded our reach and became more important than ever.

Summary:

- Added Zoom functionality for up to 500 attendees
 - Hosted all of our events virtually March 2020 - June 2021
 - Added capacity to take polls
 - Utilized virtual breakout rooms for discussions in smaller groups
- Completed 10 virtual Community Events – four Members events, six Non-Member events
- Created a successful LWVG YouTube channel – adding eight new videos to our channel and to our website. This work included:
 - Editing of event videos
 - Posting of event and essay videos on our website
 - Creating League video graphics for intro and outtros
- Expanded and diversified our Youth Engagement and Membership – three Youth Engagement events
- Improved Board and Committee Member communications such as Board Meeting Reports & Agenda, Membership Reports, Finance, Reports
- Used multiple new tools on website improving engagement, communication, planning, managing and reporting all our activities
- Hosted events and promoted activities virtually and on social media for members and non-members
- Increased Social Media presence and followers with more digital interaction with our community
- Outperformed the number of people reached year-over-year and reduced cost to reach more people in our community and beyond
- Continuing to develop new partnerships with local non-profit organizations for ongoing community engagement, education and advocacy.

The Greenwich Voter and Voter's Guide

There were three *Greenwich Voters* published during the year, in printed and digital form. The format and size of the printed version was modified for ease in printing at home should anyone want to do so, and for better viewing on hand-held devices.

The *2020 Voter's Guide* was digital-only in order to reach a much wider audience and to save a large amount of money on printing costs. The *Guide* was distributed to Greenwich residents via several online platforms including: the LWV Greenwich website, email, and Facebook and Instagram ads.

In the past, printing and distributing the *Voter's Guide* cost the league well over \$2,500 and reached only those households that receive the local newspaper and read it on the one day it was sent. This year, we spent less than \$900, had almost 60,000 impressions, reached about 20,000 viewers, garnered 1,500 links to the *Guide* at a cost of less than \$.60 per click! Success!

LWV Greenwich *Civics*

The collaboration between LWV Greenwich and the Case Method Institute (formerly the Harvard Case Method Project) entered its fourth year in 2021.

LWV Greenwich has acted as the League's coordination point for this civics project nationally, with chapters in 33 states nominating over 260 high school teachers to participate since 2019. The institute's founder, HBS Professor David Moss, has led dedicated workshops to teach the case method pedagogy to League-nominated high school teachers in 2019, 2020 and 2021. Teachers return from these workshops and begin using his democracy cases in their classrooms to supplement their existing civics, US history or government curriculum. The project's aim is to teach students to become active citizens in the same way an MBA program trains students to be business leaders. Data shows that high school students using case-based classes have improved critical thinking and evidence-based argumentation skills. They also exhibit a greater commitment to our democracy.

LWV Greenwich also piloted a community case discussion with Professor Moss in 2017. This event allowed adults and students to join together to discuss a case which would normally be confined to a high school classroom. The success of the pilot led the Greenwich League to host a community case discussion annually. Leagues from around the country are now following suit, with around 75 community case discussions planned to take place by the end of 2021.

Surveys have shown that close to 90% of the participants in community events enjoyed the case method of teaching and recommended that it be used by other schools and civic groups. Also, those who participated in these events reported a materially positive impact on their civic attitudes and behavior, including an increased likelihood to vote, become involved in politics, and engage in constructive debate with those having an opposing political view.

The move to Zoom/online forums has expanded our access to speakers. It has also facilitated our outreach to the community, as audience members can listen in from the comfort of their home computers. The average attendance at our online events has grown from 80-90 per event last spring to close to or over 200 per event this spring.

We have an active program scheduled for the coming year, with panels in planning on the capital budgeting process for the Greenwich Public Schools, how to vote in local elections, voter access and ranked choice voting. In addition, in response to requests for events during which members can more easily interact with each other, we will be starting a series of members-only discussion groups in the fall.

LWV Greenwich *Youth Outreach*

Despite the obvious impact of Covid-19 on our student population, four student League clubs (Greenwich High School, Greenwich Country Day School, Greenwich Academy, and Sacred Heart Greenwich) continue to grow and did a great job of utilizing their personal social media accounts to share information on voter registration and voting rights.

The annual essay contest was a great opportunity to see how our students are responding to the work of our first female Vice President. The prompt was 'Dear Madam Vice President'. We received almost 200 essays from grades k-12. Student volunteers judged the essays using an anonymous judging system in order to identify a winner in each division as well as honorable mentions (see list below). LWV Greenwich *Advocacy*

The VP Advocacy position has been vacant since Jara Burnett resigned from the Board in February 2020. Recruiting her replacement has been challenging. As the Legislative Program Meeting in February is traditionally organized by the VP Advocacy, we have not been able to conduct an effective advocacy effort since 2018.

However, in April 2021, the Board unanimously approved the recommendation of the Nominating Committee that Jennifer Dayton fill the VP Advocacy position until year end and that she be nominated to fill the position in 2021-2022.

Jennifer attended her first Board meeting in May 2020.

The following accomplishments this year are notable:

Bottle Bill. Kathy Golas of the CT League attended the Board's April meeting to outline the provisions of the bottle bill before the state legislature. Based on that presentation, the Board supported LWV Greenwich's addition to the list of supporters for this bill before the State House. The CT General Assembly passed the Bottle Bill (SB 1037) as amended by LCO #9775. (SENATE 33-1, HOUSE 105-42)

The bill included four key provisions as follows:

1. Raises the handling fee to 2.5 cents for beer and to 3.5 cents for other covered beverages. (*Effective October 1, 2021*)
2. Increases the deposit on covered containers from 5 to 10 cents. (*Effective January 1, 2024*)
3. Expands the program to cover beverages including hard seltzer, hard cider, juice, juice drink, tea, coffee, Kombucha, plant infused drink, sports drink or energy drink. (Effective January 1, 2023) The liquor nips are not part of the expansion. Instead, there will be a 5-cent "surcharge" on each nip (50ml or less) which will be sent by the wholesaler to the municipality in which it was bought. (*Effective October 1, 2021*)
4. Includes a provision to move to a beverage industry redemption-operated program. (Section 9 was significantly changed in the amendment LCO #9775) (*Effective from passage*).

Currently, we are actively following legislation and policy decisions in three key areas:

1. **Absentee Ballots**

CT's constitution restricts use of absentee ballots to excuses of religion, illness, military service or absence. As a temporary measure due to Covid, in 2020, one third of CT voters used absentee ballots. Voting by mail or Dropbox showed no concrete evidence of voter fraud. Enabling legislation can make permanent, "no excuse" absentee ballots. This legislation passed the Senate. It also passed the House but without a sufficient vote margin. Therefore, it will be voted again by the General Assembly in 2023. No excuse absentee ballots could then

be decided by voters on a ballot referendum to change the state constitution in 2024. This year, the Senate passed HJ59 by a significant margin; however, the House did not approve with the needed 2/3 majority to bring the issue to referendum. So, it will likely be raised in 2023, requiring then only a majority vote for consideration by voters by referendum in 2024.

2. **Early Voting**

CT's Constitution restricts voting to a single Election Day and voter participation is often inhibited due to the pressures of work, travel and family care. Enabling legislation to add election days to the calendar for in-person, early voting passed the Senate and the House. State Senator Alex Kasser and Representative Steve Meskers were co-sponsors of this bill. Harry Arora supported it; Kimberly Fiorello did not. Early Voting will be decided by voters on a ballot referendum to change the state constitution in 2022.

3. **Redistricting**

After the census every ten years, in CT, a bipartisan committee of state legislators reviews up-to-date population data to adjust boundary lines of US Congressional and state legislative districts. The League is well positioned to monitor the process and ensure accountability to citizens for transparency and fairness.

Local Advocacy Initiatives

Capital Projects' Study Committee

The Board proposed, and at the June 2 Annual Meeting, the Membership supported, the extension of the mandate of the Capital Projects Study Committee, for another two years.

Archiving RTM Study and Recommendations

The Board proposed, and at the June 2 Annual Meeting, the Membership supported, the archiving of LWV Greenwich's RTM Study and its recommendations.

LWV Greenwich *Treasurer*

2020/21 was an unusual year for the League with many of our physical events being replaced by web-based events. Our new website was an important tool for fundraising this year since we couldn't do it in person and didn't have our annual meeting/dinner in June 2021.

Thanks to our members and the Centennial Year, we managed to slightly exceed our League and Educational Fund budgets with a combined income of \$25,709.

We focused a great deal of our spending on the development of our website and on Zoom webinars so that we could reach as many people as possible with as much information as we could.

We had budgeted for a combined shortfall of -\$8,526 but managed to turn a profit of \$3,414 due to the cancellation of our in-person events and other savings. This upcoming year, we are hopeful to be back to "normal," and we have budgeted for physical debates and events.

Our fiscal year runs from July 1st to June 30th. The combined budget for next year totals \$24,500 in income, with 70% of that coming from membership dues and the other 30% coming from donations. The League's obligations to support the work of the national and state organizations make up a significant part of our budget since they typically derive most of their funding from the local Leagues.

The remainder is used to fund our *Greenwich Voter* newsletter, conduct studies of interest to our community, present monthly programs and panels, lobby for League positions, run voter registration drives and education, hold debates, maintain the website and pay our operating expenses. We expect our operating expenses to be about \$17,500 next year. Membership basically covers our operating budget, and we rely on donations to fund our programming.

Next year, unless we exceed our budget for membership renewals and donations, we expect a net loss of about -\$2,000.
