The weather was forecast as threatening for Saturday 24 February, but this did not dampen the enthusiasm for the Annual Organizational Meeting. The crowd was Standing Room Only with more than 80 members present. The meeting was held in the Herrington Harbour Club Room, which was sporting an attractive new paint job on the walls (" bulkheads ", for the sailors out there). This is in addition to the carpet having been freshly cleaned. GREAT!! These improvements to the Club Room are greatly appreciated. Also, HHSA would like to pass its complements to HH Marina Management on their new digs in that recently remodeled passionate pink office building in the sky, "CHANEY TOWERS". Things are really looking up in Rose Haven these days. Rumor has it that the Head situation and Marina security are in the process of being improved. There may also be some new bulletin boards with glass fronts and locks installed SOON, as well as possible additions to the picnic tables and charcoal braziers on the beach. These rumors are attributed to a usually reliable Marina authority who demurs at being quoted as making "promises", but who has been reasonably accurate in the past.

One item receiving major attention at the meeting was the FIRST ANNUAL QUESTIONNAIRE compiled and reported by Nick Brixius, which will be reiterated in detail later in this issue of HARBOUR LIGHT. The QUESTIONNAIRE, while not producing any great surprises, provided the EXCOM with reinforcement on how to schedule 1990 events in a manner best designed to provide membership consensus. Another important subject was the 1990 Racing, Cruising and Social Schedule which looks very innovative and also is reported in detail elsewhere in this issue of HARBOUR LIGHT. According to the Budget report given by Chuck Messner the Association is in good financial condition. Rich Ordeman,

the Immediate Past Commodore, and last year's EXCOM are commended for leaving HHSA' budget so healthy and balanced without the benefit of Graham-Rudman style measures.

Membership dues were payable on the First of March and are in arrears on the First of April. Rich Nemerson, who is in charge of the" Press Gang" [Membership Committee], reports about 75% of the membership is already paid up in good shape. However, this means about 50 members are still in danger of either being shanghaied or at least having received their last issue of this FANTASTIC Newsletter. Bob Parker discussed his management concept of the soon to be operational Video Lending Library. He also sold a few HHSA tote bags while describing his merchandising plans. Evidently Bob is planning a very full year for the Training Committee. The details of operations of the Video Lending Library and Merchandising program should be published in the near future as they become available. In the meanwhile Bob has some very interesting Training sessions planned for March and April that you will not want to miss. Check the HARBOUR LIGHT masthead Monthly Calendar At A Glance for details. Come one come all. Mary Beth Downs presented some possibilities on commencing racing programs for Juniors and a ONE-Design for adults. Enough enthusiasm was evidenced to schedule a committee meeting later in the day to further investigate the idea. She also described some workshops coming



CRUISING LOG

I am going to use my space this month to summarize the results of tabulating the 1990 HHSA Questionnaire and to briefly review the calendar for the coming year.

The questionnaire, which was mailed to all 1989 members, contained questions on cruising, racing and social events. The individual questions were devised by the Executive Committee. Joe Batts did a great job designing the format and getting the forms printed. When I volunteered to tabulate the results, little did I know what I was getting to into --because 84 of you returned the questionnaires! That is an outstanding return and a testament to the active interest in these matters by our members. We had 43% of the forms returned, while we had expected about 20% at best. THANK YOU to everyone who took the time to complete and return the questionnaire.

The detailed tabulation of the questionnaire is available. If you would like a copy, please let me know.

Social

The social events had much interest in general, with the Chili Feast, New Members Party, Summer BBQ and Annual Banquet showing the highest interest. The breakfast before a cruise and post race gathering in the HH bar with race videos rated somewhat lower.

The favored location of the Annual Banquet was split between the Herrington Harbour Restaurant and the Virginia suburbs. The results indicate it may be advisable to change the location each year, since no clear preference was seen.

Membership

Only 19% did not approve of allowing paid advertising in the newsletter or the membership directory. The directory was the more favored place to allow advertising. 86% want to allow free ads from members in the newsletter.

Training

The highest interest in training seminar topics was heavy weather maintenance topics. Fairly high

interest was shown in buying HHSA logo merchandise in the form of tee shirts and sweat shirts. Some interest was also shown in tote bags and sun visors.

Cruising

Most members wanted a 9am cruise captain's meeting, with 9:30am the next choice. The preferences to move or not on the second day of a three day cruise was pretty evenly split. Almost all respondents disagreed with allowing a last minute change in a published cruise destination. One or two pickup cruises per month were highly favored, but not more frequently than that. Moderate interest was shown in a four day weekend cruise not falling on a holiday weekend. One week vacation cruises were the most popular. Very little interest was shown in vacation cruises longer than 2 weeks. The most popular location for vacation cruise was South of Herring Bay, but not as far as Norfolk. The next most popular was the Northern Bay, followed closely by the areas around Herring Bay. A clear preference was shown for June to take a vacation cruise, with July, August and September showing about equal interest, but less popular than June. May was not of interest.

Racing

The types of racing scheduled in the past continued to be of interest to those who race, with Regattas showing the most interest. The nonracers showed the same pattern of interest, but at a lower level of interest.

A charge of \$5 to participate in a race event if the annual racing fee had not been paid was clearly the most favored.

Two Wednesday night series were desired by about 2 to 1, and the desire to race on Saturday rather than Sunday was about 3 to 1 among the racers. Nonracers were evenly split on Saturday versus Sunday, and favored two series as well.

Sufficient interest was shown in supporting a Junior Racing Program and an Adult One Design Racing Program that the Racing Committee has undertaken a more detailed investigation by talking directly with members who may be interested.

Most thought HHSA was not offering too many races.

The predominant reasons for not racing were conflicts with cruising, boat not prepared to race and time constraints.

1990 Calendar

You will find a detailed calendar elsewhere in this newsletter. The schedule for 1990 includes:

- o Eight social events
- o Fifteen defined destination/theme cruises
- o Eight pickup cruises
- o Two vacation cruises (possibly more)
- o Two Wednesday night series of races (7 races each)
- o Four Saturday race events
- o A Fall Regatta
- o Seven point to point races in conjunction with cruises
- A series of seminars and workshops for new racers

Those of us working on the calendar certainly don't expect all members to participate in everything, but we wanted to make sure you could have your favorite activity available for you on the weekends you can join in with your HHSA friends for sailing activities. Major race weekends will generally have pickup cruises available as well and the many members who enjoy both racing and cruising can combine their interests on the point to point races which coincide with cruises. We did not schedule a cruise on the weekend of the Summer BBQ on the assumption most people would want to attend the BBQ.

As I write this I can see forsythia and daffodils blooming in my yard, so, even though it's still February, sailing weather can't be too far away! The first events of the racing season will be for those of you who are new to racing, or who just want to see



what racing is all about. Beginning in April we will have a seminar series featuring racing rules, tactics and techniques. Bob Gouw will present the first seminar (Rules) on the afternoon of April 7. Plan to hear Bob, then head over to the Annual Chile Feast. On April 21 and 28, techniques seminars will be held in the morning, with on-the-water practice following. Rich Ordeman will teach us all how to have great starts and mark roundings and I will give a presentation on spinnaker handling. (OK, no laughter from those of you who saw me with the great red and yellow cobra shaped thing snaking up my mast last year!) On May 5, Tom Schuyler will present the last seminar, upwind tactics. Following his seminar will be an afternoon regatta for new racers. Now is the time for those of you who have never raced to try, or for you racers to turn the helm over to your spouse or teenager. If you would like an experienced racer on your boat for either the practices or the regatta, please let me know in advance.

The results of the HHSA Survey indicated enough interest in developing a dinghy fleet to warrant further study. The first Laser Fleet planning meeting was held after the Organizational Meeting on February 24. Two options for developing a fleet were discussed: (1) private ownership of the boats by either individuals or small groups and (2) club ownership. The majority of people attending the meeting favored beginning the fleet with privately owned boats. If the private fleet is successful, the club may wish to purchase more boats. Steuart Chaney is interested in helping us get a junior program started and has indicated that he might help purchase the boats if he sees enough HHSA support for the project. He does not wish to make a profit from the venture, but needs to be reimbursed in a reasonable amount of time. If you are interested in or have ideas for either the Laser Fleet or a junior program, please contact me. Although we have the results of the survey, we need a firmer idea of the amount of support and the number of people who will want to race.






Dont forget to pay your dues if you haven't done so. THis is the last newsletter for 1989 members. Next month's newsletter will only be sent to current 1990 members.


