Dear Friends,

We are delighted to report that, since our inception just six years ago, membership in Newton at Home has more than doubled as word of our success has spread rapidly throughout the Newton community.

But more important than numbers is the profound impact the organization has had on those members and the more than 100 NAH volunteers who are the driving engines of much of what we do.

In this report we have chosen to highlight three individuals who tell us what Newton at Home has meant to them: two are current members; one is a long-time volunteer. All have benefited in different ways from their NAH experience.

As many of you know, NAH offerings fill a wide variety of needs.

- Last year alone, 676 check-in calls gave peace of mind to some of our more fragile members;
- Volunteer-based technology support enabled many others to use social media to communicate with grandchildren;
- Our Winter Buddies program paired 42 members with volunteers who made sure they were safe during major snowstorms;
- Transportation again remained our premier service, with volunteers completing more than 1,637 rides throughout Greater Boston.

One of the most life-changing aspects of NAH membership has been the opportunity for social connection. Our affinity groups brought folks together by appealing to a broad range of interests from knitting to restaurant dining. This past year we launched a new group called History Folks that made field trips to venues such as the Jackson Homestead, the Larz Anderson Auto Museum, the Museum of World War II and the Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the U.S. Senate.

Our volunteers also benefitted greatly from their own affiliations with Newton at Home. When they tirelessly helped members with transportation, home repairs, grocery shopping and computer support, it was often hard to tell who was getting the most out of these encounters. Friendships have blossomed, enriching the lives of members and volunteers alike.

While we are deeply encouraged by the positive effect NAH has had on all of our constituents, we know this would not have been possible without the generous support of friends, donors and our wonderful staff and board. ***Your efforts and contributions have made an enormous difference in so many lives.*** And for that we are extremely grateful.



Dan Reilly has been a volunteer for Newton at Home for six years. He learned about NAH while researching the Village Movement for his master's thesis in Elder Care Marketing at Lasell College in 2011.

As a volunteer, Dan brings his “fix it” talents to the organization helping many NAH members with household repairs and projects. But for Dan volunteering is much more than doing the work and providing a service. It's about people. He has always been curious about people so it is no surprise that he learns a great deal about the members he visits. And this has given him a better idea of what he wants for himself as he ages. “Many of these folks are leading rich and productive lives. They are my role models now,” he said.

Dan is proud of the impact that his services have upon members. He points out that if a house isn't kept up it can affect the health and safety of those who live there. At the same time, he recognizes the value of social relationships and how important they are at every age. “Relationship building does not come reflexively to me,” he observed. “But being a volunteer at Newton at Home certainly does help. It's been a life-changing experience.”

In addition, she has taken full advantage of NAH's computer support. An avid e-mailer and internet user, she knows that if she runs into a "glitch" she can call an NAH technical support volunteer who most likely will solve the problem right over the phone.

Sheila also looks to NAH for intellectual stimulation. She is an active member of one of the NAH book clubs and has attended many local theatrical productions with other NAH members. These contacts have led to some new friendships and social opportunities.

"Newton at Home allows me to continue to live independently in my apartment and enjoy a wide range of activities and interests," she says. "I feel secure knowing that I have a marvelous organization I can depend on and one that has enriched my life immeasurably."

What attracted her to Newton at Home was the opportunity to become a member and a volunteer. "I had a strong need to give back," Maria said. "I also was looking to meet other people my age who lived in Newton." NAH enabled her to do both.

In addition to volunteering as an NAH driver, Maria takes full advantage of the many social activities and informational sessions the organization provides. She is an active member of the Reading Aloud, History and
