

# NEW MEXICO CERTIFIED FLOODPLAIN MANAGERS

I think it's about time we talk a little about CFM renewal and decertification. In the past I have gone to great extents to keep CFMs from being decertified. In January of 2007 the NM CFM Charter was revised to keep in conformance with the ASFPM CFM Charter. Some of the revisions included a new section called DECERTIFICATION. The half-page section describes a detailed policy on different reasons to decertify a CFM and explains the procedure involved. The 2007 revision to the NM CFM Program also includes the creation of 2 decertification letters that are to be sent to CFMs who do not renew by the due date. The first is to be sent to any CFM due for renewal who does not apply by the due date, which is July 1 or January 1 each year. The letter explains that the CFM is scheduled for final decertification within 30 days if an application for renewal is not submitted. The second letter, which is notification of permanent decertification, is sent at the end of 30 days if no application is received from the CFM. I will be following this procedure from now on and will not be able to make the same kind of adjustments as I have in the past.

We still try to help and encourage CFMs to remain active. Our Charter still has a provision for a CFM who has not been able to attend enough conferences or trainings to earn the required CECs that allows an extension of the renewal due date. In order to qualify for an extension, a letter stating 3 things must be written to the CFM Program Administrator:

- 1. Explain why the CFM has not been able to gain the required CECs necessary for renewal:
- 2. Explain how the CFM plans to gain the required CECs (i.e.: attend the next conference);
- 3. Ask for an extension.

The letter is reviewed and in most cases an extension is granted. CECs then gained at the next conference, or from an on-line course or other sources, will count for the previous years CEC requirement and notice of recertification is sent to the CFM.

The NM CFM Program was set up at the beginning to make it easy for CFMs to gain the 16 CECs that are required for renewal every two years. NMFMA conducts 2 conferences each year, each one worth 12 CECs for attendee CFMs. If each CFM attends one conference each year, he/she will always have enough CECs for renewal when the due date arrives. The renewal application and a generic CEC form are available from the NMFMA web site.

Don't forget that the CFM exam is proctored at every NMFMA conference. In order to take the CFM exam, an application and fee must be submitted and approved prior to the date of the exam. The application package is available on the NMFMA website. Click on Certification, then Read, Print, or Download the Application Package for the NMFMA CFM Exam.

# REGIONAL MITIGATION STAFF CONTRIBUTE TO REDUCTION SEMINAR IN MEXICO CITY

In November 2007, Mitigation representatives from FEMA Regions IX and VI participated in a seminar on "Risk Reduction and Mitigation of Disaster Losses in Urban Environments/City Centers" in Mexico City.

Region IX Mitigation Division Director Sally Ziolkowski presented a paper at the seminar entitled, "Determining Risks, Assessing Vulnerabilities and Hazard Mitigation." Mayra Diaz, a natural hazards program specialist with the Region VI Mitigation Division presented a paper entitled. "Case Study: Tropical Storm Allison. June



tion Division presented a paper entitled, "Case Study: Tropical Storm Allison, June 2001, Texas Medical Center, Houston."

Approximately 300 emergency managers, urban planners and social scientists from Canada, Mexico, Costa Rica, El Salvador and the United States participated in the seminar and discussed a range of topics, including the increasing number of severe natural disasters experienced worldwide. International experts shared research tools and study data on disaster vulnerability analysis, disaster loss reduction, assessment practices, weather and climate change analysis and risk reduction in urban areas.

The seminar provided an opportunity for networking and open exchange to facilitate increased knowledge of crucial hazard risk reduction elements.

Ziolkowski said, "The need for political leadership and public policy change, increased education and outreach, and community sustainability efforts" was a common theme among all participants regardless of their country. "Although different cultures and languages, we all have the same goal of making our communities more disaster resilient," Diaz said. "I received a lot of feedback on the way the United States government empowers community participation. The seminar provided an opportunity to share FEMA's mitigation message with other neighboring nations." She said some of the participants asked to visit her regional office and New Orleans to learn more about FEMA's programs.

## FROM THE EDITOR

On October 5, 2006, Gilbert F. White, "Father of Floodplain Management" died at the age of 94. If we as floodplain managers can do just 10% of what Gilbert White accomplished in his life time, I believe this world would be in better shape. I quote Mr. White:

"It is striking that in a century of evolving public policy the prevailing aim has been to minimize losses from floods and not to optimize the net social benefits from using floodplain resources, including the preservation of the basic associations of soil, vegetation, biota, and water. In simplest terms, it is the contrast between "loss reduction" and "wise use."

#### **Congressional Session Wrapped Up**

By the time the Congress wrapped up its most pressing business for the 1st Session of the 110th Congress, it was just a few days before Christmas. The Senate did not finally adjourn until December 31st to make certain that the President could not make "recess appointments" to federal positions. Both the House and Senate will officially convene for the 2nd Session on January 3rd. All legislation introduced in the 1st Session will remain active

A major focus during December was completion of appropriations for the federal government in Fiscal Year 2008. Since the fiscal year began on October 1, the government has operated on a series of four Continuing Resolutions. After much negotiation and many veto threats, the budgets for all of the federal government except the Department of Defense were combined in an omnibus appropriations bill compiled in House Report 110-497. The final document reflects the results of negotiations to resolve differences between versions of the various regular appropriations bills acted on by the House and Senate. Instead of the usual House-Senate Conference process, these final numbers were arrived at through behind the scenes discussions among Appropriations Committee members and officials and House and Senate leadership. A Senate amendment on December 18<sup>th</sup> added approximately \$70 billion for continuing needs associated with the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The report can be reviewed by going to: http://thomas.loc.gov and typing in H.Rept. 110-497. The measure was signed by the President on December 26, 2007.

Overall funds for Disaster Relief are: \$1.4 billion and language provides for many additional requirements for DHS/FEMA to report to the Congress.

In the budget for the Federal Emergency Management Agency, there are several items of interest:

Emergency Management Preparedness Grants \$300,000,000
Flood Map Modernization \$220,000,000
Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grants \$114,000,000
Flood Mitigation Assistance Grants \$34,000,000
Severe Repetitive Loss/Repetitive Claims \$90,000,000

Despite the intended competitive nature of the Pre-Disaster Mitigation grant program, for the first time Congress has directed earmarks. The report identifies 95 communities (not specific projects) totaling \$51 million, leaving just \$63 million for competitive grants and administrative costs. Report language requires the earmarked projects to comply with the criteria for award set forth in the Sec. 203(g) of the Stafford Act.

#### On to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Session of the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress

The <u>President's Budget Request for FY 2009</u> will be released in early February. This will kick off the next cycle of appropriations hearings. House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees will hear from officials of the Federal departments and agencies in defense of their budget justifications. Generally, this process begins in February and continues through March and well into April.

While the 1<sup>st</sup> Session did succeed in completing action on the Water Resources Development Act and on the Energy bill, there is much legislation in the midst of the legislative process. Following is a partial list of expected legislative activity in coming months.

<u>Flood insurance</u> reform legislation (H.R. 3121 and S. 2284) is nearing completion, but has encountered some delays in the Senate. A full report is available in the December issue of "News and Views".

<u>Catastrophe insurance</u> bills are active and will remain so in the 2<sup>nd</sup> session (H.R. 3355 and S. 2310). Other bills to create a commission on natural catastrophe risk management and insurance are under consideration, notably S. 2286.

<u>Climate change</u> is an active subject during this Congress and a number of bills are in active status, notably S. 2191 the Climate Security Act, S. 2307 the Global Climate Change Research Improvement Act and S. 2355 the Climate Change Adaptation Act.

The <u>Farm bill</u> (H.R. 2419 and S.2302) has yet to be finalized even though the previous Farm Bill expired on October 1<sup>st</sup>. A compromise agreement reached in December should allow the bill to move forward.

<u>Dam safety</u> bills are also in active status. H.R. 3224, the Dam Rehabilitation and Repair Act passed the House and a similar bill, S. 2238 is awaiting committee consideration in the Senate. H.R. 1662 to amend the Reclamation Safety of Dams Act has passed the House and a similar bill, S. 1258, has been introduced in the Senate.

A bill supporting adoption of <u>state building codes</u> and the use of Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant funds for the purpose has been introduced: H.R. 3926

# Purpose of the New Mexico Floodplain Managers

- 1. To promote public awareness of proper floodplain management;
- 2. To promote the professional status of floodplain management and secure all benefits resulting there from;
- 3. To promote a liaison between individuals concerned with proper floodplain management and to encourage the exchange of ideas;
- 4. To keep individuals concerned with proper floodplain management well informed through educational and professional seminars and to provide a method for dissemination of information, both general and technical;
- 5. To inform concerned individuals of pending floodplain legislation and other related management matters; and
- 6. To study and support legislation pertinent and necessary to the effective implementation of floodplain management matters.

To accomplish the purpose of NMFMA, meetings and conferences are conducted, distribution of a quarterly newsletter. In addition, NMFMA also works with the New Mexico Department of Public Safety, and the Department of Home Lane Security/Federal Emergency Management Agency and others.
