

Proposition Posed

New Odorless County Sewage Plant Will Be Attractively Landscaped

WHITE PLAINS—

The proposal to build a new county sewage treatment plant on the Hudson River front in Yonkers near the New York City line has won the approval of public officials and agencies, of political leaders and others. The referendum thereon is County Proposition No. 1 on Tuesday's ballot.

All are agreed that the proposition authorizing a \$14.8 million bond issue to finance the plant needed to replace the "hopelessly outmoded" ones should get the "Yes" votes of Westchester electors.

Only objection raised concerns the plant's proposed location and, according to experts, these fears are unwarranted.

No Offensive Odors
Experts in the designing, construction and operation of modern sewage treatment plants, such as the one planned, assure that there will be no offensive odors from its operation and that instead of being an eyesore the structures will be attractively laid out and landscaped.

Engineering "know-how" has made great strides since pioneer treatment plants were built and every technique will be used to insure that there is nothing objectionable.

Practically all the processes will be carried on in underground tunnels and tanks, which leave no means for noxious fumes to escape from the time the sewage enters the plant until the extracted solid material is conveyed into a closed barge to be hauled far out to sea for disposal. The purified liquid will be carried through a pipe line into the deepest part of the Hudson where it will be rapidly and harmlessly dispersed.

Gerlach Urges Approval
Herbert C. Gerlach, chairman of the Republican County Committee and former County Executive, urges a "Yes" vote in the following statement:

"The interests of all the people of Westchester, both those within and without the sewage treatment districts involved, are served by County Proposition No. 1 on the ballot on Nov. 2.

"This is to authorize the expenditure of about \$15 million for badly-needed sewage treatment on the western side of the county. The plant has been ordered by the Interstate Sanitation Commission and the State Department of Health. Our own health authorities are in agreement that the new plant is necessary.

"There is no politics involved. This is simply a matter of sanitation and of health. I know of no substantial opposition from any group or any section of Westchester. But unless all voters who have our best interests at heart take the time to vote it might fail of passage.

"I strongly urge a favorable vote on County Proposition No. 1 on Election Day, Nov. 2. Pull down the lever at the top of the voting machine over 'Yes.'"

Garrity Backs Plant

Harold T. Garrity, Democratic County Chairman, made this statement in favor of the proposition:

"The pollution in the Hudson River is a detriment to our community, and the rapid growth of Westchester makes it mandatory that the county keep pace with sewage disposal. I urge every citizen in Westchester to vote 'Yes' on this proposition because it not only affects the health of our community but also will in the future make the Hudson bet-

ter for boating and fishing and possibly bathing.

"It seems a shame that we have the most beautiful, scenic river in the world but little or nothing is made of it due to the lack of planning in the past of sewage disposal. Adequate planning can eliminate this and the Hudson will come into its own as a recreation field for the entire County of Westchester."

WCA Supports Plan
The Westchester County As-

sociation joined in asking the Supervisors for a favorable vote on the bond issue proposition as follows:

"For a considerable time this association has studied the overall need of sewage treatment plants. These studies were instigated by complaints of pollution in waters bordering our county. Our board of directors in a recent meeting unanimously endorsed the action of your honorable board in approving an issuance of bonds for the construc-

tion of sewage treatment plants in the Yonkers area and the placing of this bond proposition on the November ballot in the form of referendum.

"In the interest of health of our citizens and the improvement of our waterfronts, we urge our Westchester citizens to vote in favor of this referendum at the coming November election."

Yonkers Man Was Partner \$300,000 Is Recovered From Bankrupt Company

NEW YORK—A receiver in bankruptcy of the defunct B. G. Phillips & Co., a stock brokerage firm in which a Yonkers mechanic was a partner, has recovered securities worth \$300,000 for distribution to 270 customers who were allegedly swindled by the firm.

This announcement was made in New York by State Attorney General Nathaniel L. Goldstein who got a court order last April 26 putting the firm out of business.

The operation was run by an

ex-convict, with the mechanic, a medical student and a society butler as silent partners. Mr. Goldstein charged that the firm, which did an annual business of millions of dollars, defrauded customers by using their funds, invested with the company, to defray its own deficiencies in capital.

The principal figure in operation was Ben Guy Phillips, fifty-eight, formerly of White Plains and now of New York. He was convicted in 1947 of attempted grand larceny. The attorney

general charged that he drew more than \$100,000 of the firm's assets without the consent of the investors. He was alleged to have told customers that his wife was an heiress and, if he needed money, she would be able to supply him with "anything up to a quarter of a million dollars."

The silent partners in the operation were Andrew Kanischak of 22 Alder Street, Yonkers, an assembly line mechanic at the General Motors plant in Tarrytown; Fernand Goyer, a butler for the Vanderbilts and the Morgans, of New York; and Dr. Arthur Root, then a medical student, of Forest Hills, N. Y.

Mr. Goldstein later dropped the case against Mr. Kanischak and the other two silent partners, when it was determined that they were "dupes rather than principals."

The case against Phillips was turned over to District Attorney

Frank S. Hogan for possible criminal action.

The receiver of the firm, Abraham Grenthal of New York, moved today before Justice Morris Eder in Supreme Court here for authority to distribute the \$300,000 in securities recovered to the alleged victims.

The motion is returnable Nov. 1.

Court Pays Tribute To M. J. Sweeney
