She clerked for the late Chief Judge of the Western District of Pennsylvania, the Honorable Gary L. Lancaster, and later became a partner at Reed Smith and then a director at the Pittsburgh law firm of Cohen & Grigsby. Judge Bissoon was an original member of Pennsylvania's Interbranch Commission for Gender, Racial and Ethnic Fairness. She was appointed by Chief Justice John Roberts as a member of the Judicial Conference's

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Advisory Committee on Civil Rules. She is a founding member of the Q. Todd Dickinson Intellectual Property American Inn of Court, and was elected as its first president in 2012. Judge Bissoon serves as a member of The Sedona Conference Diversity Committee, as a member of TSC's Judicial Advisory Board, and as Judicial Advisor for The Sedona Conference's Working Group 9 on Patent Damages and Remedies (WG9) and Working Group 10 on Patent Litigation Best Practices.
