TERAH SHELTON HARRIS

Terah Shelton Harris is a collection development librarian in Alabama and a freelance writer. Her debut novel. One Summer in Savannah, was published in 2023 and earned accolades such as "astonishing," "unforgettable," and "poignant" from the press. Her latest work, Long After We **Are Gone**, is a gripping novel that lays bare an epic family legacy. Harris talks with LJ about her new novel, her process, and her proudest moment as a librarian.

Can you give our readers a brief synopsis of Long After We Are Gone?

Four Black siblings—a school principal, lawyer, teacher, and carpenter—fight to save their ancestral land, two hundred acres called the Kingdom in North Carolina. After their father dies suddenly, the Solomons face immediate expulsion from the home their family has owned since 1782, a dispossession based on it being heir property. The siblings must confront their own demons while uncovering secrets from the recent and distant past.

The term heir property is probably new to many readers. What would you like the public to learn about heir property?

Heir property is a form of ownership in which property is passed down without a will, so descendants inherit an interest in the land—like holding stock in a company—but not an actual deed to the land. Heir property does not constitute a clear title, which means the land is vulnerable to acquisition by developers, corporations, and governments.

Heir property is recognized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as "the worst problem you never heard of" and the "the leading cause of Black involuntary land loss." It is estimated that between 1910 and 1997. Blacks lost about 90% of farmland worth billions of dollars. Unfortunately,



have never heard of "heir" property. How common are the challenges

facing "land rich, cash poor" families like the Solomons? What surprised you during your research process? What surprised me during the research process was how common heir property is and how many families are unaware that their family land is heir property...until after an elder dies. Additionally, I discovered

that many of the Reconstruction laws, policies, and practices are still on the books and continue to dispossess families of their land.

Do you think the Solomons sacrificed too much over the years to keep their land?

As much as Long After We Are Gone is about ancestral land, it's also about family and trauma passed down from generation to generation. King, the Solomon patriarch, dedicated his life to the Kingdom and promised to never sell "a plot of land. Not one acre. Not one inch." The weight of such a promise opened the Solomon family up to a series of bad decisions that had a ripple effect for a generation. All the siblings have sacrificed themselves for the Kingdom, directly or indirectly.

What was your process for creating this entire family of characters?

First, I cried lots of tears and kicked myself for deciding to write a book that features four POVs! Then, I decided to focus on one sibling at a time, each section at a time. Next. I fleshed out each of the characters, their motivations, their insecurities. I wanted readers to be able to identify or at least relate to one or more of them. Each of the siblings are grappling with very real issues that many people face today. They are not perfect, but no family is.

As I Lay Dying is one of my favorite books and served as my book inspiration for Long After We Are Gone. William Faulkner used fifteen different points of view to tell the story. Each point of view moves the story forward while highlighting each character's own personal struggles. Long After We Are Gone is such an emotional story—using multiple points

of view made all the difference.

Did anything about the story change as you wrote it?

Everything! I write the last chapter of my books first. That gives me an endpoint. From there, I take my characters on a journey to the last chapter. I'm a pantser, so I make up my story as I go along. Because of this, I often change my mind, especially if the direction conflicts with the last chapter. In Long After We Are Gone, several aspects of the siblings' stories changed. The biggest change is a HUGE spoiler so I can't talk about it!


What are your proudest accomplishments as a librarian?


I've worked as a librarian for almost two decades and there's been no greater honor than to serve my community. As a librarian, I have written proposals and received over a half million dollars in local, state, and federal grants. I'm most proud of my Wifi-in-the-Park project, which provides free Wi-Fi to over 200 acres of Westgate Park in Dothan, Alabama. This project created a community Wi-Fi access point and expanded the Wi-Fi outside for patrons to access while the library is closed.




