### CONNECTION POINT:

The best interruptions come from God.

### THE BIBLE MEETS

**LIFE:** Many adults look back on their lives and realize they are not doing or living the way they thought they would in high school. Our interests change and new people come into our lives that often change the trajectory of our lives. Many of these changes are good and others feel like a serious setback. However, when God steps in and interrupts our lives, we can trust that where He is taking us is the best path to be on.

**LIVE IT OUT:** Your student has been encouraged to take practical steps to live out his or her faith.

## PRESCHOOL

**Scripture:** Isaiah 7:14; 9:6; 11:1-5; Micah 5:2

**Live It Out:** Review the Bible story. Say that this story is from the Old Testament, many years before Jesus was born. Say together: “The Bible teaches about Jesus. 2 Timothy 3:5”

Prophets were people who told others what God wanted them to know.

One of the prophets was Isaiah. He wrote what God told him. Isaiah wrote about God’s promise to send a very special child to be born. The special baby would be God’s Son. Isaiah said the child would be called names like Mighty God and Prince of Peace. The child would grow up and do what is right.

Another prophet who lived a long time ago was named Micah. Micah also wrote about Jesus. He wrote that God’s Son would be born in Bethlehem.

People heard or read the words that the prophets wrote. They knew that God was planning to send His Son.

## KIDS

**Scripture:** Isaiah 7:14; 9:6; 11:1-5; Micah 5:2

**Live It Out:** Read together 2 Timothy 3:15. Remind your child that this verse makes clear that the whole Bible tells about Jesus. Help your child memorize the verse.

God sent a special message to Isaiah about Jesus’ birth. He said a virgin would have a special baby and the baby would be called Immanuel, that means “God with us.”

God sent a message that Jesus would be Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, and Prince of Peace.”

Through the prophet Isaiah, God reminded the people that the Messiah, Jesus, would be born from the family of King David. God also sent a message about many wonderful things the Messiah would do.

God sent another message through the prophet Micah. God said that although Bethlehem was a small town, someone would come from Bethlehem to be the country’s ruler. That person would be born in the town of Bethlehem—the same town where King David was born.

## STUDENTS

**Scripture:** Hebrews 11:8-19

- Why was Abraham willing to walk away from his comfortable life?
- What about God has captured your attention in a way that you no longer think about where you came from?
- In your own words, why can we trust God with all we have?

**Live It Out:** Abraham certainly had his struggles, but his life was overwhelmingly characterized by his faith in God. Abraham was willing to leave his homeland to follow God, and when God called him to offer his son, Abraham proved that he was willing to obey. We are called to have this same posture before God and be willing to obey in all things, even to the point of sacrificing what’s most important to us.

Abraham was called to live in a way that was set apart from the people around him. Ask your student what ways God may be calling him or her to be set apart. Share ways God may also be calling you to be set apart as well.
