

Volume 8 (Summer 2026) Kids Sermon Outlines

UNIT 22, SESSION 1 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus has power to heal with just a word. (John 4: 50): Jesus didn't need to travel to Capernaum; His power isn't limited by distance. This shows His divine authority.

Faith means trusting what Jesus says—even before we see results. (John 4:50–51): The official believed Jesus' word and went home without seeing the miracle yet. Faith often requires obedience before confirmation.

Jesus' miracles show He is the one true God and lead others to faith. (John 4:53-54): The official's whole household believed because of what Jesus did. When we trust Jesus, our faith is on display for others to see.

UNIT 22, SESSION 2 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus is the promised Messiah from the Old Testament. (Luke 4:16–21): Jesus read Isaiah and said, "Today this Scripture is fulfilled," confirming He is the one Isaiah wrote about.

People often reject truth when it challenges their expectations. (Luke 4:21–24): The people of Nazareth struggled to see Jesus as the promised Messiah.

Even when others reject Jesus, He continues His mission. (Luke 4:31–44): Jesus didn't let rejection stop Him. He kept teaching, healing, and calling people to believe.

UNIT 22, SESSION 3 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus teaches and responds with unmatched authority. (Mark 1: 21–22; 26–27): People were amazed because Jesus taught like no one else and even unclean spirits obeyed Him.

Jesus heals with compassion and power. (Mark 1: 31–32): Whether it was a demon-possessed man or a sick woman, Jesus responded to real needs with real help.

Jesus' healing points to a greater restoration. (Luke 4:43–44): Jesus' miracles show what the kingdom of God is like—where all things are made right.

UNIT 22, SESSION 4 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus cares for people deeply and personally. (Mark 1: 35–39): Jesus didn't just heal crowds; He stopped to touch and heal one man with leprosy—someone others avoided.

Jesus was willing to heal and restore the outcast. (Mark 1:40–42; Luke 5:12–13): The leper's question wasn't "Can You?" but "Are You willing?" And Jesus said, "I am willing."

Jesus made time for prayer even while helping others. (Mark 1:35): Despite the crowds, Jesus sought quiet time with God, showing us how important it is to stay connected to the Father.

UNIT 23, SESSION 1 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus has the authority to forgive sins. (Matt. 9:1–2; Mark 2:1–5; Luke 5: 17–20): Jesus did not just heal the man's body; He addressed his deepest need—his sin. This shows Jesus is God.

Faith leads us to action. (Matt. 9:1–2; Mark 2:1–5; Luke 5: 17–20): The four friends didn't give up; they believed Jesus could help and went to great lengths to bring their friend to Him.

Jesus heals to glorify God, not to impress people. (Mark 2:11–12; Luke 5:25–26): The miracle amazed the crowd, but the deeper purpose was to reveal Jesus' divine authority and lead people to worship.

UNIT 23, SESSION 2 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus invites unlikely people to follow Him. (Mark 2:13–14; Luke 6:12–16): Levi (Matthew) was a tax collector, considered a “sinner,” but Jesus saw him and called him.

Following Jesus is about relationship, not reputation. (Mark 2:15–17): Jesus wasn’t concerned with who others thought was worthy. He called those willing to follow Him and be changed.

Jesus still calls people today. (Mark 2:17): Just like the twelve disciples, Jesus invites us to follow Him, trust Him, and share His message with others.

UNIT 23, SESSION 3 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus has authority over the law. (Matt. 12:6–8; Mark 2:27; Luke 6:5): When the Pharisees questioned Him, Jesus reminded them that He is Lord of the Sabbath—the One who wrote the law and knows its purpose.

God’s commands are meant to give life, not restrict compassion. (Matt. 12:11–13; Mark 3:1–5; Luke 6:6–10): Jesus taught that doing good and showing mercy—even on the Sabbath—is at the heart of God’s law.

Jesus’ mission was to bring healing and reveal God’s heart. (Matt. 12:11–13; Mark 3:1–5; Luke 6:6–10): By healing the man’s hand, Jesus showed that mercy and love reflect God’s character and fulfill the law.

UNIT 23, SESSION 4 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus taught that God’s kingdom is different from the world. (Matt. 5:2–11; Luke 6:20–22): Living for God’s Kingdom runs counter to what the world often encourages and celebrates. Humility, mercy, faithfulness, and righteousness are all a part of God’s Kingdom.

Jesus calls His followers to live in a way that reflects God’s heart. (Matt. 5–6; Luke 6:20–29): God cares about our motives, not just our actions. Jesus calls His people to love others, forgive, and shine for God’s glory.

We can only live this way when our hearts are changed. (Luke 6:46–49): Because of sin, we can’t live this out on our own. But when we trust in Jesus, He transforms our hearts so we can follow Him.

UNIT 24, SESSION 1 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Even mature believers sometimes have doubts. (Matt. 11:2–3; Mark 6: 1–6; Luke 7: 18–20): John the Baptist, who had boldly prepared the way for Jesus, still needed reassurance in a hard moment.

Jesus points us to truth through what He has done. (Matt. 11:4–5; Luke 7:21–22): Jesus reminded John of the miracles and fulfillment of prophecy to show He truly is the promised Messiah.

Following Jesus doesn’t mean life will be easy—but it will be worth it. (Matt. 11:11–16; Luke 7:24–30): John’s faithfulness cost him his life, but Jesus said he was great in God’s eyes—and believers have eternal hope.

UNIT 24, SESSION 2 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus sees our pain and responds with compassion. (Luke 7:11–13): Jesus didn’t wait to be asked—He noticed the widow’s grief and chose to help.

Jesus has power over death. (Luke 7:14–16): With just His words, Jesus raised the dead man to life, proving He is the Messiah sent from God.

Jesus gives spiritual life to all who trust in Him. (Luke 7:11–17): Like He raised the boy physically, Jesus gives eternal life to those who are spiritually dead in sin.

UNIT 24, SESSION 3 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus knows our hearts and offers real forgiveness. (Luke 7:36–48): Even when others judged the woman for her past, Jesus saw her faith and love.

Great forgiveness leads to great love. (Luke 7:41–47): The woman's actions showed deep gratitude for receiving forgiveness. She wasn't trying to earn Jesus' love—she was responding to it.

We all need forgiveness—and Jesus is the only one who can give it. (Luke 7:36–50): Every person is guilty of sinning against God and owes a debt they cannot pay. Only Jesus lived a sinless life, conquered death and the grave, and willingly paid our sin-debt.

UNIT 24, SESSION 4 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Jesus taught us how to pray. (Luke 11:1–4): Jesus gave the Lord's Prayer as a model, showing how to honor God, ask for daily needs, and seek forgiveness.

God hears persistent, humble prayers. (Luke 11:5–13): Jesus used parables to show that God is better than even a good friend or fair judge—He listens and responds to His people.

Prayer is not about showing off but being honest. (Luke 18:9–14): The tax collector's humble prayer was heard and answered. God values sincerity, not self-righteousness.

UNIT 24, SESSION 5 - KIDS SERMON OUTLINE

Greed leads us away from what really matters. (Luke 12:13–21): The parable of the rich fool reminds us that possessions don't last forever, but God's kingdom does.

God values our hearts more than our wealth. (Luke 12:22–31): Jesus told people to store treasure in heaven and not worry about earthly things like food or clothes.

Trusting God brings peace and contentment. (Luke 12:32–34): Jesus encouraged His followers not to be afraid because God is a generous Father who provides for His people.
