

It was the time of Jewish independence between the Babylonian Captivity (freed by Persians) and the Roman conquest of Palestine during the 1st century BC. They are not considered inspired books equal to scripture.

- Matthew Jewish audience, has a lineage that traces Jesus back to Abraham, written by Matthew the disciple, traditionally the earliest gospel, but now believed to be #2 (80's AD)
- Mark earliest gospel, believe to be Peter's account, shortest, most simple and straight forward, Matthew and Luke draw heavily from it and take stories and quotes directly from it. (perhaps 65-70 AD)
- Luke doctor of Paul, is a Gentile, written to a Gentile audience, deals with the poor and women more than others, has a lineage that traces Jesus back to Adam (inclusive), Paul's mission was to the Gentiles, has sections from Mark and Matthew (80's AD)
- John written by John the disciple, believed to be latest gospel (90's AD), John believed to be only disciple to live to old age and natural death, very different from other gospels others don't appear to be source for this one
- Acts A sequel to the Gospel of Luke, tells story of early church and the spread of Christianity through starting new churches, story of Paul, spread of Christianity through known world in matter of years. (60's AD)

Who: Unknown

What: Letter to Hebrew Christians

Where: Unknown

When: A.D. 64

Why: To remind the Jewish Christians, who are thinking of returning to the old laws, that Christ is superior to these traditions and laws in every way.

Key verse: "Remember your leaders who taught you the Word of God.

Think of all the good that has come from their lives, and follow the example of their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever."

- Hebrews 13:7-8

BOOK OF JAMES

Who: James (The Brother of Jesus) What: Letter to Jewish believers

Where: Jerusalem When: A.D. 45

Why: James presents Jesus Christ as Lord, the one who deserves the undivided commitment of those who are called by His name. Actions are a result of true faith.

Key verse: "So humble yourselves before God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Come close to God, and God will come close to you. Wash your hands, you sinners; purify your hearts, for your loyalty is divided between God and the world." – James 4:7–8

BOOK OF REVELATION

Who: John (The Beloved Disciple)

What: Letter to the Seven Churches

Where: Island of Patmos When: A.D. 95

Why: John writes to seven prominent churches to share his visions,

give them hope, and call them to repentance.

Key verse: "Then I heard again what sounded like the shout of a vast crowd, or the roar of mighty ocean waves, or the crash of loud thunder: Praise the Lord For the Lord our God, the Almighty, reigns."

- Revelation 19:6

How the Bible Got to Be the Way It Is Today

3 Important Events:

- Why was it important to settle on what books were in the Bible?
- How was it determined which books would be included?
 - Old Testament
 - New Testament
- o Council of Nicea in 325 AD (Jesus is fully God and fully human)
- o 3rd Council of Carthage 397 AD (agreed upon the biblical cannon)

- Begins with fall of the Roman Empire in 4th 6th centuries AD
- o Very low literacy rate
- o Bible only in Latin
- o Only priest and highly educated had access
- The Bible was not in the hands of people
- Eventually led to abuses because most did not know the truth
- o 8th Century split between Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Church

- o Johannes Gutenberg invents the printing press in 1450
- o Martin Luther's "95 Theses" on door of Wittenberg church
- o Protestant Reformation begins
- 1611 King James Bible first English translation

During the Reformation the Bible began to be translated from the original Greek and Hebrew into vernacular languages that ordinary people could understand for the first time. King James Bible – was written not to be the final translation…but so that ordinary people could have the Bible in a language they could read and understand. Connected with the invention of the printing press at the same time, the use of the Bible spread as never before
