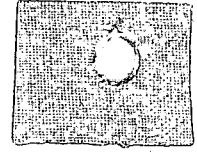
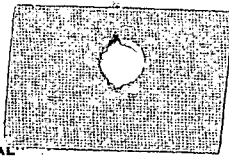

NOVOYE RUSSKOYE SLOVO is a daily Russian language newspaper printed in New York City. It has always voiced the conservative side of the Russian Socialist movement in America, and it opposed Novy Mir for many years. It has consistently fought the American Communists but a change of policy occurred about three months ago. The paper was faced with bankruptcy proceedings about March first and the editor Okunstsev suddenly opened his columns to radical propaganda. He now openly favors the Russian Soviets and does not complain of the American Communists. We are watching the paper to see the definite policy that will be the outcome of this.

KRASSIN FOR MUZZLING OF THE COMMUNIST PRESS

In the last meeting of the soviets, Krassin advised to give serious attention to the official soviet press being circulated abroad and especially of that circulated in the business spheres which propose commercial relations with the soviet government. Krassin was insisting that a thorough going reorganization of the editorial colleges of the principal soviet organs should take place with the object of unrooting of harmful self advertising undermining the confidence of the foreigners in the economical organs of the country which are printing constantly, and side by side such rubbish as the countless wire greetings of various conferences of the Russian Communist Party, and such as those of the famine stricken and the unemployed, addressed to the 12th Congress, as well as of the sham intensity of production in our factories and shops in which, as a matter of fact, production is being curtailed daily. We, said Krassin, are not only seriously harming ourselves, but we also are paralyzing the activity of our diplomatic representatives and are giving every reason to the foreign press to base its reports upon news furnished by our enemies. You do not imagine the extent of the foreign information on the condition of our industry and of our internal confusion. This may be proved by the following fact which I encountered during my sojourn in Italy; I was approached by one of the former large share holders of a metalurgical concern being

at present a part of trust of our "Yogo Stal - The Southern Steel" with the request to inform him of the view taken by the Soviet Government regarding the possibility of returning to his corporation its former enterprises on the basis of concessions. In the course of the conversation he showed to me not only the personal complement of the administration of his former factories, and also the state of the technical inventory and stock of metal, but he furnished me with a copy of a complete report of the trust, submitted to the higher authorities regarding the urgency of a government subsidy for the support of the enterprise until there will be decided the question of creating a mixed company with the participation of foreign capital. I am convinced that every one of our commissars knows much less of what is being done in his department than do the information apparatuses of foreign governments. Therefore, our official periodical press should be discreet and follow an objective in reporting on our internal events, in order not to appear ridiculous to the sober foreign Governmental and industrial spheres of Europe, which are splendidly discounting the situation of the soviet Government.

Thrifty America buries Harding in a manner which is by no means thrifty. It loses time, money, and labor in order to inter the corpse at a cemetery at Marion, Ohio.

Every kind of pomp especially performed over a stinking corpse of a dead man is repulsive to cultured people. Life is given to the living and not to the dead.

In former times, sacrifices were made to the dead in the form of oxen, children, and plants. Today, national industry and time are being sacrificed. Ancient rudeness is being replaced by a new fashion.

At present, as in those days, the living are offering sacrifices to the dead.

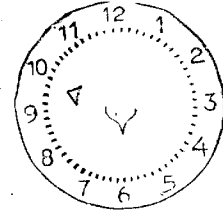

Dear Sir:-

The local Russian so-called conservative newspaper "Novoe Russkoe Slovo" carried on August 10th a very improper article regarding the death and burial of former President Harding. On August 14th this same paper carried an announcement signed by the President and Vice President of the Corporation denying responsibility for the article and placing the entire blame on OKUNTZOFF, stating that the publishers were absent from the office and that OKUNTZOFF had, in their absence, caused the article to be published in the paper.

However, it is noted that the same issue of the paper which carried the statement from the President of the Corporation carries another article by OKUNTZOFF entitled, "Coolidge Under Fire," which article emphasizes that Coolidge is for the capitalists as against the workers. This article closes with a statement advocating the nationalization of the mines and all the national wealth. I am calling this to your attention as I understand that this paper has in the past received considerable advertising of an official nature from the Treasury Department. It has also secured other advertising such as, for instance, a half page add from John Wanamaker, on the strength of being a conservative newspaper.



Receipt of your letter of November 27, 1923, marked W.S.J.EJ.#27154-14 Misc., transmitting correspondence referring to the above publication, is acknowledged.

This same matter came to the attention of this office some time ago and the following letter was forwarded by me to Washington on August 15, 1923:

ORLANDO, the writer of the article in question can hardly be considered a Bolshevik, in fact, since his return to this country, he has as a contributor to the "Novos Russkoe Slovo", written a series of very effective anti-Bolshevik articles. He is a very able writer and has a large following in the local Russian Colony. He has changed his policies several times during his career, being at times radical and at other times anti-radical. I believe that it would be safe to say that he would write equally effective articles in favor of the Bolsheviks if he was offered more money for doing that than he receives for writing unfavorable articles.

I do not know of any Federal law under which action could be taken against the publication for the articles which they have published. However, in view of the interest taken by the Council of the Society of Colonial Wars, which I believe, includes some prominent people, this might be an opportune moment to call the attention of that organization to the large amount of advertising which this paper has received from various sources on the presumption that it is a conservative newspaper. The Council could, I believe, take this matter up with the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers, 30 E. 23rd Street, The Audit Bureau of Circulation, 152 W. 42nd Street, and the various prominent advertising agencies who have placed advertising in the publication. If, after this article is called to the attention of these advertisers they still wish to continue placing advertising in that publication, I do not see that there is anything that we can do to remedy the situation.

An additional copy of this letter is being forwarded to you, anticipating that you may desire to furnish Mr. Howard N. S. [unclear], the complainant, with a copy. A copy of this letter is also being returned to the Bureau at Washington, D.C.

paper carried an announcement signed by the President
or Vice President of the Corporation denying responsibility
for the article and placing the entire blame on CHUNTZOFF,
stating that the publishers were absent from the office
and that CHUNTZOFF had, in their absence, caused the
article to be published in the paper.

"However, it is noted that the same issue of the paper
which carried the statement from the President of the
Corporation carries another article by CHUNTZOFF entitled,
'Coolidge Under Fire,' which article emphasizes that
Coolidge is for the capitalists as against the workers.
This article closes with a statement advocating the
nationalization of the mines and all the national wealth.
I am calling this to your attention as I understand that
this paper has in the past received considerable advertising
of an official nature from the Treasury Department. It
has also secured other advertising such as, for instance,
a half page ad from John Wansmaker, *100-84493-X9*
being a conservative newspaper."

GRUNTZOFF, the writer of the article in question can hardly be considered a Bolshevik, in fact, since his return to this country, he has as a contributor to the "Hovoe Russkoe Slovo", written a series of very effective anti-Bolshevik articles. He is a very able writer and has a large following in the local Russian Colony. He has changed his policies several times during his career, being at times radical and at other times anti-radical. I believe that it would be safe to say that he would write equally effective articles in favor of the Bolsheviks if he was offered more money for doing that than he receives for writing unfavorable articles.

I do not know of any Federal law under which action could be taken against the publication for the articles which they have published. However, in view of the interest taken by the Council of the Society of Colonial Wars, which I believe, includes some prominent people, this might be an opportune moment to call the attention of that organization to the large amount of advertising which this paper has received from various sources on the presumption that it is a conservative newspaper. The Council could, I believe, take this matter up with the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers, 30 E. 33rd Street, The Audit Bureau of Circulation, 122 W. 42nd Street, and the various prominent advertising agencies who have placed advertising in the publication. If, after this article is called to the attention of these advertisers they still wish to continue placing advertising in that publication, I do not see that there is anything that we can do to remedy the situation.

An additional copy of this letter is being forwarded to you, anticipating that you may desire to furnish Mr. Howard K. Payne, the complainant, with a copy. A copy of this letter is also being forwarded to the Bureau of Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir: Writing Anonymous Communication.

Reference is made to your letter of Jan. 28, 1927, initialed FXOD-KEB, transmitting an anonymous communication signed "K-14" and a clipping from the Russian Newspaper "Novoye Russkoye Slovo," of Jan. 26, 1927.

The clipping in question reads as follows:

" A new Leader of the Slavs has proclaimed himself. This is the half insane one Victor Brons Troupp, adopted by Cherep Spiridovich. American reporters do not always carefully guess the tendency of the public towards sensations and in the given case have missed out. The interest in Cherep Spiridovich himself also was not great and his insane ravings about the establishment of a great union of the Slavs interested no one, remaining in the press as a humorous affair devoid of every public significance. More curious is the leadership of Slavonism by the 'unshaved' Dane, Brons, the nearness of whom to the deceased general can be explained only by the affinity of the unbalanced brains of both. To the American reader all these communications about newly appeared prophets has the character of the sensations of cheap gossip, - for us- the whole epopee, with the world wide organization of Slavonism through the medium of the Dane, is covered by his name. Verily a significant name; Mister Troupp. What a diverting deceased."

The article, as I understand it, contains absolutely no threat whatsoever. The writer of the editorial has merely taken advantage of Troupp's name to make a pun. The word "Troupp" happens to be the Russian word for corpse, and the humor of the article is derived from the man's name, and is not an implied threat against his life.

Translator's note: Many of the newspaper reviews which I have made have contained reports on the activity of the I.R.O. or I.W.O. (International Workers Order), but this review is the initial case where membership to the organization has been contested in Court.

An unusually important hearing was conducted in Hartford, Connecticut. This is the first time that the following question has been placed before the United States Courts; Is it possible for the members of the I.R.O. (International Workers Order) to become citizens of the U.S.A.? In addition another question was taken up concerning the legality of the Communist Party. This latter question was debated in "Hartford Times", March 29, emphasizing the importance of the Hartford Case will have on future decisions involving I.R.O. members and United States Courts. This particular case was the result of questioning the right of Nicodimus Umanetz to become a citizen.

On Friday, March 28, The "Hartford Times" reported that Judge Carl Hinks called for a more intensive investigation of Umanetz's application for citizenship. Umanetz is forty seven (47) years old, a member of the I.R.O. and on evidence presented by Ernest Hoover, affiliated with the Communist Party. At this point, examiner Hoover contested the rights of Umanetz to become a citizen.

In Court, during the trial, there was no evidence of guilt concerning the above mentioned organizations. Thus the Court refused to pronounce a decision on the case of Umanetz and postponed it for further investigation.

Hoover told the Court that Umanetz lives in Hartford, 2 Hamilton Street, is employed at the Underwood Elliot Fisher Company, is president of the local branch of the I.R.O. - (I.W.O.). In an affidavit obtained by Hoover from Umanetz, Umanetz denies having relations with the Communist Party.

Hoover declared that he will prepare a report for the court which will contain cases where citizenship has been refused to members of the Communist Party.

In as much as the decision concerning the case of Umanetz may have greater consequences on similar cases, Hoover proposed that he will turn over all facts of this case to the investigating authorities in Washington.

Sometime ago our newspaper informed us that a colonist living in Mass. was refused his second (citizen) papers on the grounds that he was a member of the I.W.O., an organization affiliated with the Communist Party. In addition, I know of many individuals who did not get their second papers because either they or their relatives belong to the I.W.O. Besides this, I have been able to learn from the newspapers that the I.W.O. is controlled by Communistic leaders and that many leaders would like to resign their membership but they are afraid of losing their premiums. If it were possible to get even half of their premiums many of them would resign from the I.W.O., but they are held by an unfair transaction and forced to up hold it by the main office which is controlled by the unscrupulous Secretary Kazuschuk who has no consideration for working people. Besides him the I.W.O. has other parasites who are vigorously holding the power in their hands over us (Poor Sheep).

I know of cases where several lawyers were able to get from the insurance agents as much as two thirds of the payments on the basis of unemployment and not being able to meet the payments.

Take it upon yourself to write about this matter and enlighten us. Thank you for your interest.

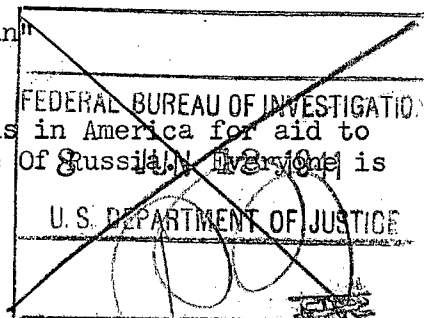

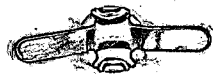

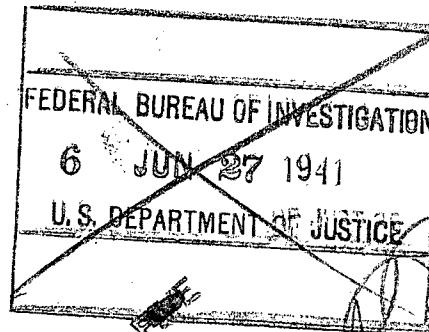
