DESCRIPTION

The *Guglielmo Marconi Memorial* is the focal point of Reservation 309A, located in front of the Mount Pleasant Branch Public Library at the intersection of 16th and Lamont Streets, N.W. The gilded bronze and granite monument employs Academic Abstraction design elements, using Art Moderne stylistic details that were popular during the 1930s.

The monument incorporates a series of pink granite rectilinear masses. The lowest component incorporates two steps leading to a broad platform. A narrow central pedestal bears a gilded bronze portrait bust of Guglielmo Marconi. As rendered, the head invokes a sense of seriousness and determination. Behind this pedestal, stands a tall and broad granite slab flanked by two low knee-walls. The broad slab supports a gilded bronze sculpture comprised of electrical waves disappearing into clouds set beneath an emerging world. Atop the world sits a dynamic nude female with her left arm extending forward and her right arm bent and pointing upward. The figure's arms, the drapery around her legs blowing behind, and her wavy mass of stylized hair extending outward from her head, echo the electrical waves below and emphasize the concepts of speed and dynamism. The bronze sculptures were re-gilded in September 2006.¹

The monument is sited at the northern end of the reservation, angled in such a way that it is quite noticeable from the northbound traffic lanes of 16th Street. The landscape plan for the area is predominantly turf with evergreen hedges around the monument and along the western access road. The rectilinear hedges echo the granite blocks of the memorial.

At the annual Society of Gilders (founded 1987) meeting, the participants partake in a community-based project. In 2006, the society met in Washington, D.C. and the selected the *Marconi Memorial* as their project. More than twenty-five gilders worked on the preparation and gilding of the two sculptures.

SIGNIFICANCE

The *Guglielmo Marconi Memorial* is significant as a rare example of the commemoration of an individual associated with technology in Washington. Congress approved legislation for the memorial on April 13, 1938 (52 Stat. 217). The monument was erected by popular subscription collected by the Marconi Memorial Foundation. It was completed on June 30, 1941. Attilio Piccirilli, the head of the famous New York stonecarving firm, Piccirilli Brothers, designed and carved the monument. The statue is significant under Criterion C in the area of Art.

Guglielmo Marconi (1874-1937) developed wireless telegraphy. This invention laid the foundation for the creation of the radio. Marconi was born near Bologna, Italy to an Italian businessman and an Irish heiress from a wealthy distilling family with important personal connections. As a child, Guglielmo was a neighbor of the distinguished physicist Professor Righi, who piqued his interest in electricity—especially in the work of Heinrich Hertz. In the early 1890s, Hertz produced and detected the first radio waves in his laboratory. Marconi studied the experiments of Hertz in conjunction with the mathematical proofs of James Maxwell, and other contemporary inventors, and produced improved experiments. By the end of 1895, Marconi could send a message more than a mile away. At this time, he tried to convince the Italian Ministry of Posts and Telegraphs of the importance of his invention. He was unsuccessful in this endeavor. In 1896, his cousin Henry Jameson-Davis arranged an introduction to Nyilliam Preece, Engineer-in-Chief of the British Post Office. Marconi, consequently, achieved his goal of turning Hertz's laboratory demonstration into a practical means of communication. Within two years, he had obtained a patent, founded the Wireless Telegraph and Signal Company Limited, and opened a factory for fabricating equipment in Chelmsford, England.

In 1900, Marconi erected a high-powered transmitting station at Poldhu, on the coast in Cornwall. The following year he built a station in Wellfleet, Massachusetts. The Cape Cod site ultimately resulted in a variety of setbacks that led Marconi to erect a station at Glace Bay, Nova Scotia. This Canadian station received the first two-way transatlantic wireless message on December 17, 1902. The following month, Marconi successfully transmitted messages between President Theodore Roosevelt and King Edward VII from Wellfleet.

Marconi's invention quickly became a commercial success. The installation of wireless technology on ocean-going vessels began in the early 1900s. In 1909, Marconi won a share of the Nobel Prize for physics. The application of wireless technology on ocean-going vessels s a means of safety at sea emerged after the R.M.S. *Titanic* disaster in 1912.

Stone carver Attilio Piccirilli (1868-1945) designed and carved the memorial in conjunction with architect Joseph Freedlander. Attilio was born in Massa-Carrara in the Tuscany region of Italy, to the stonecarver Giuseppe Piccirilli. He studied sculpture at the *Academia di San Luca* in Rome for five

years. The family settled in Manhattan in 1888 and the older members began working at Samuel Adler's Monuments and Granite Works on East 57th Street. Shortly thereafter, they opened their own studio on West 39th Street and in 1890 moved their studio to East 142nd Street in the Bronx. Attilio emerged as the most talented of the six brothers trained as stonecarvers. Though they struggled for the first ten years, the Piccirillis eventually became America's first family of carver-sculptors. The Piccirilli brothers carved works by Augustus Saint-Gaudens, John Quincy Adams Ward, and especially Daniel Chester French. Their work includes: the pediment for the New York Stock Exchange; the *Maine Memorial* for the entrance to Central Park at Columbus Circle; the lions that flank the entrance of the New York Public Library; and Abraham Lincoln for the *Lincoln Memorial* in Washington, D.C.

The landscape plan incorporating a frame of evergreen shrubs was also provided for by the Marconi Memorial Association; it was implemented by the National Capital Parks.
