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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Druid Hills Parks and Parkways is the most significant portion of a large residential suburb located between Moreland Avenue and Briarcliff Road which mark the eastern boundary of Fulton County and the City of Decatur in the northeast section of the metropolitan area of Atlanta. This portion of the suburb is an area of open space and curving roadways which structures the environment of the larger residential neighborhood around it. The entrance to the neighborhood from the mixed commercial and residential area to the west is clearly marked both by the change in street pattern and the landscaped park areas. Ponce de Leon Avenue runs in a predominantly west-east direction from Briarcliff Road toward the City of Decatur. Near the eastern edge of the subdivision the avenue passes under the Seaboard Coast Line which runs north and south through the eastern portion of the original Druid Hills subdivision. Beginning at the Ponce de Leon-Briarcliff intersection a narrower roadway, Ponce de Leon South curves south of a series of small parks and extends east to Fairview Road. This curving roadway provides access to the lots which face the parks as well as forming the southern edge of the park spaces. Briarcliff and Moreland Roads form the western boundary of the area. One block south of Ponce de Leon South, Fairview Road runs easterly from More land Avenue for three blocks and curves to the north to intersect Ponce de Leon Avenue. Beyond this intersection a second section of Ponce de Leon South again curves south and east, around a series of parks and along residential lots to the west of Clifton Road where it once again enters Ponce de Leon Several park spaces are included between the Ponce de Leon roadways beginning with Springdale Park between Briarcliff and Springdale Roads, and continuing through a long line of green spaces to Shadyside and Dellwood Parks east of Fairview Road. Along the northern edge of this linear parkland a strip of land bordered by trees clearly indicates the route once used by the electric street railway line which ran between Decatur and Atlanta. Beyond Dellwood Park, at the intersection of Ponce de Leon Avenue and Barton Woods Drive, a section of roadway called Ponce de Leon North, curves away from the main avenue in a northerly and then easterly direction to form the boundary of a wooded ravine, Deepdene Park. This final park space contrasts sharply with the other more open areas in its forest character and depressed topography.

Notable homes which border the Druid Hills Parks and Parkways include former James Venable, Asa G. Candler, Asa Warren Candler and Henry Heinz residences. Venable's three-story Stone Mountain granite, Jacobethan "Stone-henge" has now been adapted to a church through a stylistically sympathetic addition. Asa G. Candler's home, now St. John's Melkite Church, is a monumental, cream brick and marble Italian Renaissance revival mansion, while his son Asa Warren's two-story redbrick home further east on Ponce de Leon is Georgian Revival. This second Candler home is a two-story brick building with a central four columned portico. The Henry Heinz residence, also along the north side of Ponce de Leon Avenue, is a two-story stucco Renaissance Revival building. Along Fairview Road to the south many of the oldest homes of the subdivision in Georgian Revival and Tudor styles still stand.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Druid Hills Parks and Parkways are important as the only example in Atlanta and one of a few in the southeast of the work of the eminent land-scape architect, Frederick Law Olmsted, Sr. Although Olmsted Brothers, sons and successors to the senior Olmsted, drew the final plans for the suburb after Olmsted's death in 1903, the senior Olmsted had provided the preliminary plan on which the suburb's design is based. This area of Druid Hills which sets the tone for the entire surrounding residential neighborhood is a clear expression of Olmsted's design concepts for parks, parkways and residential areas. It is therefore an important Atlanta example of landscape architecture whose potential contribution to the physical environment of this area of the city in which the population density is increasing is highly significant.

Planning for the area which in the early twentieth century became Druid Hills suburb began in the early 1890's as a project of the Kirkwood Land Joel Hurt, by 1890 a prominent Atlanta builder and businessman, was the major figure in the company which was chartered in January, 1890. Hurt had already in the 1880's begun the development of Inman Park, Atlanta's first planned residential suburb, built the city's first electric street railway between Inman Park and the downtown area, and was planning the south s first skyscraper, the Equitable (Trust Company of Georgia Building, demolished 1971) Building which was completed in 1892. Several prominent Atlantans were original stockholders of the Kirkwood Land Company, including banker Robert Lowry, who owned a large acreage in the area to be developed. records show that the large tract of over 1400 acres which would comprise the Druid Hills residential area was assembled between 1890 and 1892. originally intended to develop only 600 acres into building sites, but was gradually persuaded by the Olmsted firm to develop a plan for the entire tract.

Between 1890 and 1894 Frederick Law Olmsted, Sr. who had planned parks and residential areas for so many American cities, made several visits to Atlanta for the purpose of consulting with Hurt on the plans for developing what Hurt on occasion referred to as the "ideal residential suburb". Hurt also visited the Olmsted offices in Brookline, Massachusetts during this period. By 1893 a preliminary plan for roads, parks, lakes and building sites had been drawn and submitted to the Kirkwood Land Company. One of the main features of this plan was the gently curving Ponce de Leon Parkway. Hurt had originally proposed to extend Ponce de Leon Avenue into his company s lands in a straight line as he had previously done with Edgewood Avenue into

Inman Park, but Olmsted convinced him that it would be more natural and economical to allow the topography to determine the boulevard's route. A second feature of the original plan, which remains extant today in the structure of the landscape along Ponce de Leon Avenue, was the location of an electric street railway line in a strip of land adjacent to, rather than in the center of, the roadway. The separation of traffic modes, Olmsted advised, would not only decrease travel time to Atlanta and reduce maintenance costs, but contribute to the beauty of the area by hiding wires and poles among the trees. It was Hurt's intention in 1894 to proceed with the grading of roads and building of lakes according to the Olmsted plans, but in the wake of the Panic of 1893, the Kirkwood Land Company experienced financial difficulty. Several loans on the company property in the later 1890's and a letter to a Boston lawyer relative to money owned to the Olmsted firm record some of the problems. In addition, Hurt's numerous business activities, in particular his electric street railway company, commanded his attention.

After a settlement and sale of the street railway in 1901 allowed the repayment of some of the loans, Hurt once again turned his attention to Druid Hills. By this time Frederick Law Olmsted Sr., incapacitated by illness, had retired so that his sons and successors, Olmsted Brothers, took over the work in Druid Hills. The original 1893 plan formed the basis for consultations with Olmsted's stepson, John C. Olmsted in 1902 and 1903, and in 1905 Olmsted Brothers submitted a plan for the southern most portion of the Kirkwood Company land. This is the section bordering Ponce de Leon Avenue and includes the string of parks and open spaces between the Avenue and Ponce de Leon, North and South, which had been proposed by the senior Olmsted in the 1890's, as well as the building sites along Ponce de Leon Avenue and Fairview Road. By 1908 when Hurt sold the entire holdings of the Kirkwood Land Company for a record half-million dollars, roads had been graded, surface drainage systems completed, and parks and some building sites landscaped. A syndicate headed by Coca-Cola magnate Asa G. Candler, which organized the Druid Hills Corporation in 1909, was the purchaser This company continued the development of the entire tract between 1910 and 1935, retaining most of the features of the Olmsted Brothers plan in the original ninety-acre section which had been begun, but making changes and modifications in the other areas of the tract. For example, neither of the lakes were built, and the size of the building lots became smaller as the development progressed. Deed restrictions that were considerably shorter than those advised by John C. Olmsted, lapsed in the late 1940's allowing land use changes in the area after that time.

Ponce de Leon Avenue, however, and the linear parkland along its picturesque route from Briarcliff Road on the west to the Seaboard Coast Line railroad tracks on the east, were developed from the Olmsted plans. The gently curved roadway carries out the senior Olmsted's belief that a natural, informal course provides a welcome contrast to the more rigid rectilinear gridiron pattern of adjacent building shapes and areas. The open spaces, from Springdale Park with its swings, slides and recreational purposes, through Shady Side and others

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


where open meadows are bordered by clumps of trees and foliage in a typical Olmsted pattern, to Deepdene Park which is a seemingly impenetrable forest, represent basic Olmsted landscape concepts. The landscaped environment and roadway pattern clearly distinguishes the Druid Hills area from the section of the city to the west. Departure from exclusively residential land use which was possible after deed restrictions lapsed in the late 1940's, has converted some of the large homes along Ponce de Leon into churches, clubs and apartment houses. Presently, now apartment and condominium developments on the large lots are increasing the population density of the area. The parks and parkways are of increased importance therefore, to maintainance of the environment in the face of such changes, as well as to the preservation of the integrity of the larger residential neighborhood to the north which was developed in the old Kirkwood Company lands. Many older residential neighborhoods in Atlanta suggest the influence of Frederick Law Olmsted in their curving streets, occasional park spaces and landscaped lots. It is essential that the site and form of his work in the Druid Hills section of the city, which exerted influence on some of these areas, be preserved.


It should also be noted that significant examples of the work of Neel Reid, an early 20th century Atlanta architect, is found in the Druid Hills area. Noted on the sketch map is the architects own house built in a Neo-Georgian style (1914); the Oscar Strauss tudor-style house (1917); the Walter Rich House (1913) and the Jasper Draper House (1915). Neel Reid studied at Columbia University and the Ecole de Beaux Art and with Hal Heinz and Rudolph Adler and formed one of the most noted early 20th century Renaissance Revival oriented residential architecture firms in Atlanta.

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

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
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

Dear Mr. Tamas:

Thank you for your recent letter concerning the nomination of Ponce De Leon Avenue as part of the Druid Hill Historic District, Atlanta, Georgia, to the National Register of Historic Places. This nomination has not yet been forwarded to us by the State. However, we feel that the following information may be of interest to you.

Nominations to the National Register are made by the States after research by the State Preservation staff and approval by a State Review Board made up of professional historians, architectural historians, and archeologists. Upon receipt of a nomination, the National Register staff must impartially apply the criteria for listing a property on the National Register to the nominated property. These criteria are listed in the enclosed leaflet entitled "The National Register of Historic Places."

Listing in the National Register is a governmental recognition that a property possesses historic values. Such listing does not place restrictions upon a private owner or upon a State or local government acting without Federal involvement. It does, however, insure that any federal agency contemplating an undertaking or licensing action which would have an effect on the property will allow the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation opportunity to review and comment on the action. Also, such listing makes the property eligible for financial assistance under Title I of the 1966 Hational Historic Preservation Act (80 Stat. 915), as smended.

We hope this information will be useful to you, and we shall be happy to answer any further questions.

Doctor Smith is concerned about a pending application (H-34-PR) for the preservation of a historic area. 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Druid Hills May Get Historic OK

A residential section of Druid Hills soon will be nominated to the National Register of Historic Places, a move that is almost sure to be accepted by federal preservation officials.

"Very, very few (nominations) are rejected," one state historic official said. "It's almost 100 per cent that it will be accepted."

The area to be suggested as a national historic site is located roughly between Emory University and Ponce de Leon Avenue.

The Druid Hills section of northeast Atlanta is noted for its large, early 20th-century homes and its landscape plan, designed by Frederick Olmstead, the designer of New York's Central Park.

If it is included in the national historic register as expected, the Druid Hills historic section will connect with a series of parks along Ponce de Leon Avenue that have already been added to the historic register.

in Technically, what we're doing is enlarging that historic district," said Lyn Waskiewicz of the Historic Preservation Section of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The section suggested for inclusion in the historic

register runs north from Moreland Avenue and Fairview Road along Briarcliff Road to the Emory Road area. At that intersection, the boundary runs east toward Emory University, then heads south adjacent to Clifton Road.

The border line zig-zags south until it nears the East Lake community, then extends west several blocks south of Ponce de Leon Avenue.


DNR officials believe the area is significant because of the following:

- As one of the first planned communities in Atlanta, it had an effect on suburban residential growth patterns in the city.
- Olmstead, a well-known architect in the 19th century, did the early planning for the area.
- The quality and diversity of the architectural styles is also important.

Many influential Atlanta citizens have lived in the area.

Other than the status of being included in a historic area, the only benefits residents will receive is protection from federal projects that might disrupt the area, Miss Waskiewicz said.

DNR officials will be accepting public comment on the proposed nomination to the historic register until Wednesday.

History Dies In 'Paradiso' Blaze

Marion Kuntz never lived in "Paradiso," one of the grandest of the old hilltop mansions overlooking the historic Ponce de Leon Corridor.

She never even set foot inside the place until 1958, after the death of its last owner-occupant, when she and her husband Paul, both of them professors at area universities, purchased the old John Hurt House next door.

But Marion Kuntz loved the place, and the exquisitely proportioned porticoes, and piazzas that made it stand out among its neighbors,

with the sort of ardor usually reserved for one's ancestral home. She had looked on affectionately during the past 20 years, in which it lay mostly vacant, chasing away vandals, reporting suspicious noises to the police, hauling away dead tree limbs and other debris. She had fought attempts by city officials to have the place condemned, and had wept inwardly when a notice declaring the place "unfit for human habitation" was nailed to its boarded-up front door a couple of years ago.

And she told her Greek language students at Georgia State University Monday morning,

after waking to survey the charred ruins that the old house was "one of the most beautiful and gracious houses I've ever seen, anywhere in the world."

"I've lost something, we've all lost something, very precious."

Paradiso, one of several stately mansions listed, as part of the Ponce de Leon Corridor in Druid Hills, on the National Register of Historic Places, was demolished by a blaze of suspicious origin in the hours before sunrise Monday, while the Kuntzes slept, unaware that anything was amiss next door.

"The Professors Kuntz," as they called themselves in a 1976 letter to their neighbors, appealing for organized opposition to a condemnation proposal, had an excellent vantage point, in their house next door, from which to watch the gradual decay.

"The grass goes uncut. The garden is full of weeds. The sidewalks collect trash. The iron gates have long ago been stripped from the grand entrance, and the doors have been stolen. Perhaps you have poticed the vagrants who take un have noticed the vagrants who take up residence . . . the trucks of the vandals who come to carry away the Italian marble fireplaces, the doors, the panel-ing, the bathtubs, the radiators, even the sash weights. The lesson is plain," the Kuntzes had warned:

"An empty building is now indefensible.

It was a lesson not lost on the restor-ers of the Callanwolde mansion, where, Atlanta Historical Society director Franklin Garrett recalls, "vagrants once set fires on the hardwood floors;" a lesson applicable to more than a few onceglorious Atlanta mansions, now vacant and subject to "the vagaries of weather and vandalism," he said.

But the lesson was lost, says Dr. Kuntz, on the current owners — heirs of the last owner-occupant, Cordelia Loeb, who died more than 20 years ago. Listed in city records as her daughters, Miriam Brooks and Dorothy Barish, they moved

to California many years ago.

What Dr. Kuntz, a member of the board of the DeKalb Historical Society, and her husband feared most, she said. was demolition, paving the way for the construction of apartments or condominiums.

As long as the building, which was structurally sound and protected by its place on the National Register of His-toric Places, remained standing, they could continue to hope that it might yet be restored, if not as a private home, then as the headquarters for a foreign consulate, or a philanthropic foundation, or even a small school of some sort.

In 1924, when the then-new residence was featured in an issue of the Atlanta Journal Sunday Magazine, it boasted a sunken garden, greenhouse, teahouse, and carriage house for servants, in addition to 10 spacious rooms, a drawing room that ran the full depth of the house, and a fountain that "sparkled" with goldfish, water lilies and lotus blossoms.

After Stone's death in the late 1920s, Paradiso was occupied by his widow and daughter who, as Garrett recalled, "cut quite a swath in Atlanta society for a while," then by the family of Cordelia Loeb, who purchased it in the 1940s, died about 10 years later, and left it to her daughters, who had married and left Atlanta. From 1958 until the present, it has been rented intermittently - for one promising period during the early 1970s by tenants who began the restoration process, but had to give it up as prohibi-tively expensive, recalled Gordon Midgette, director of the DeKalb Historical

It earned a place on the historic regis-ter because of its "architectural significance," in its "unusually strict adherence to the Italian Renaissance Revival Style," according to Randolph Marks, who surveyed it two years ago for the

state preservation office.
"This house, on the top of the hill, marks the mid-point between the regu-larly spaced houses to the east and west," the Kuntzes had written in their letter to their neighbors. "To demolish it," they complained, "would be like cut-ting off the tallest and fullest roses in

your garden."

But for the past 20 years, the house lay mostly vacant, tempting vagrants and vandals who carted away what treasures remained, and sometimes camped there. Two years ago, a young woman who accepted a ride from strangers was taken there and raped. "It's the saddest thing in the world. We, the neighbors, seem to be the only ones who care what has happened to the place," Dr. Kuntz said.
