

19. History According to oral tradition the house was built by a member of the Tyler family and immediately sold to Hazael Tucker. Although there is a similarity to Black Acre (JF-298) which was built by Moses Tyler, no documentation has been found to support this oral tradition. Tucker were brothers who lived in Spencer County before coming to Jefferson County about 1840. It is possible that they built the house for a joint family home. Elijah Tucker died in 1848 and named his brother Hazael one of his executors. Possibly Hazael Tucker took over the farm operation and the house, although no transfer of the property has been found. The 1858 Bergmann Map of Jefferson County indicates a structure on the land and Hazael Tucker's name is there.

The Tuckers were successful farmers and large land owners in this area. A railroad stop, Tucker Station, took its name from the family. Hazael Tucker died in 1876. The house was sold out of the family in 1902.
