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LOCATION AND SETTING:

This wooden covered bridge spans the Old Course of the Saco River in the township of Fryeburg and in the East Fryeburg section thereof. Once oriented in the main town of Fryeburg, the traveler would proceed northeast on U. S. Route 302, (Maine Rt. #5)) for five miles. At this point he would find a side road going in a northwesterly direction. He would follow this side road for three miles where he would find this bridge. The locale is rural. This area is a lowland here bisected by a slow moving shallow stream which still flows in an ancient river bed. Much of what was open field farming land has reverted to a forest cover in this area.

CONSTRUCTION AND MATERIALS:

This wooden structure is 116' long, about 19' wide and 20'high from the floor to the peak of the gable roof. This overhead clearance is 14' and the clearance between the sides is 16'. This bridge is built on granite block abutments which rise from the sides of the River bed for about 15'.

The basic engineering concept employed in the span of this bridge is best described as being Paddleford Truss construction. The main feature is an arch of laminated wooden 2" x 12" planks in ten courses. These are bolted together with iron threaded rods. The ends of the arch rest on the abutments, similar to the Burr Truss or Kingspost Arch System, patented in 1817. The bottom and top chords are bolted and morticed into the Kingposts and for additional strength the bottom chords of each span are bolted with iron rods to the Paddleford Arch. Extra support for the Kingposts is gained by crossed timbers, morticed at the crossing, placed between, morticed again into and near the tops and bottoms of the Kingposts. Resting on the tops of kingposts and running down the length of the bridge are timbers which provide the plate for the roof. The rafters tie into the plate and a roof supporting truss work with ridge pole completes the gable of the roof. On top of the roof rafters, spaced shingle straps run the length of the roof and on these, cedarshingles provide the final cover for the roof. The sides of the bridge have been boarded in. Boards run up and down. Six window spaces on each side of the bridge help provide a natural lighting for the interior. The ends of the gable are boarded in down to the clearance. These are then covered with clapboards and finally trim pieces surround the ends of the With the exception of the trim, the bridge is not painted. The flooring of planks runs down the length of the bridge.

POTENTIAL THREAT: Only natural causes.

The description is of the present condition; Overall the condition of the fabric is good. This structure is maintained by the Town of Fryeburg and the State Highway Commission. What is seen today is close to what was seen when the bridge was erected.

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TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE BACKGROUND

Fryeburg is an old and interesting town in Oxford County, situated between Bridgton, in Cumberland County, and the New Hampshire line. The larger part of Fryeburg was granted by Massachusetts in 1762 to General Joseph Frye, who had been at the sieger of Louisburg, in the same year a grant was made to some persons in Concord, New Hampshire, who came with their cattle and commenced clearings. Of these Nathaniel Smith with his family were the first settlers.

From its humble beginnings as a farming community to a township incorporated in 1777, time and needs made way for the small manufacturing of leather, harnesses, carriages, lumber, tinware, cheese, canned vegetables, etc. By 1880 the population was 1633. Today 1971, the population is 1874. The Fryeburg area of today is a prosperous summer resort. Only vestiges of its agricultural origins remain, fields once clear have resorted to a forestcover, but the village sections retain the charm of the other times. The Hemlock Bridge: Seven wooden covered bridges once enabled the traveler in Fryeburg, Maine to cross the Saco River. Today only one, the Old Hem-

lock Bridge remains. It has been repaired and preserved by the state, but it would never have been constructed in the first place, if Benjamin Wiley and fellow lumbermen and farmers of North Fryeburg had not changed the course of the Saco River 150 years ago.

The Saco River rises in the White Mountains and wanders 121 miles through New Hampshire and Maine. In its first forty miles the river drops rapidly southward, but soon after it crosses into Maine and reaches Fryeburg, it slows to a sluggishstream that flows north before turning south again. A century and a half ago the river described such a meandering loop through the Fryeburg intervale that early settlers spoke of it as "thirty-six miles of river and six miles of country."

Spring floods not only inundated fields but also washed away and scattered logs that lumbermen had piled on the river banks. Tired of being plagued by a river that didn't go where it should go, Wiley and his neighbors petitioned the Massachusetts Legislature in 1815 and secured a charter giving them permission to dig a canal that would alter the river's course.

In 1816 they made their first cut and diverted the river into a series of small ponds. From these it rejoined the south flow of the original loop. The canal was narrow when first dug, but freshets soon widened the channel. Before the canal was dug there were five covered bridges in Fryeburg. After the canal was dug two more bridges were built, and one of these was the Old Hemlock Bridge.





In reading the National Register Newsletter Volume II --- No. 7 we have been alerted to your call for advance nominations of State owned properties. We wish to take advantage of this for the following:

- Montpelier Home of General Henry Knox of Revolutionary War fame.
 Thomaston, Knox County, Maine.
- 2. Eagle Island Home of Admiral Robert E. Peary, discoverer of the North Pole, Harpswell, Cumberland County, Maine.
- 3. Songo Lock Only remaining operable section of the Cumberland-Oxford Canal built in 1832, Naples, Cumberland County, Maine.
- 4. Popham Colony Site of the 1607 attempt at English settlement by George Popham and Raleigh Gilbert, Popham Beach, Sagadahoc County, Maine.

Ten covered bridges - wooden structures

- 5. Babb's Bridge Cane Road, Gorham and River Road, Windham, Cumberland County (005) Maine (18). Built in 1840, it crosses the Presumpscot River.
- 6. Bennett Bridge Lincoln Plantation, Oxford County (017) Maine (18). Built in 1901 it crosses the Magalloway River.
- 7. Hemlock Bridge Fryeburg, Oxford County (017) Maine (18). Built in 1857, it crosses the Saco River.

- 8. Robyville Bridge - Corinth, Penobscot County (019) Maine (18). Built in 1876, it crosses the Kenduskeag Stream.
- Lovejoy Bridge South Andover, Oxford County (017) Maine (18). Built 9. in 1868 it crosses the Ellis River.
- Lowe's Bridge Routes 15 and 16 Sangerville and Guilford, Piscataquis County (021) Maine (18). Built in 1857 it crosses the Piscataquis River.
- 11. Morse Bridge once located on Valley Avenue in Bangor over the Kenduskeag stream was dismantled in 1961. It has since been re-assembled down stream at Coe Park. Bangor, Penobscot County (019) Maine (18). It is the largest covered bridge in Maine (212 feet in length) and was built in 1882.
- 12. Porter-Parsonfield Bridge Porter, York County (031) and Parsonfield, Oxford County (017) Maine (18). Built in 1858 it crosses the Ossipee River.
- 13. Sunday River Bridge Newry, Oxford County (017) Maine (18). Built in 1872 it crosses the Sunday River.
- 14. Watson Settlement Bridge Littleton, Aroostook County (003) Maine (18). Built in 1911 it crosses the Meduxnekeag Stream.

We are most mindful of your need for original maps which should accompany nomination forms. May we please take a liberty at this time in respect to maps for the locations of the above listed properties on these advance nominations. We have prepared the actual U.S.G.S. topographic maps. We wish to retain them in our files until the actual separate nominations for the properties are completed for your review and/or not approval. We are then making Xerox copies of our maps which are enclosed for each property location. The original maps will accompany the actual nomination forms at a later date.

- 6. Bennett Bridge Lincoln Plantation, Oxford County (017) crosses the Magalloway River 1 1/4 miles south of Wilson Mills and 5 1/2 miles north of Wentworth Location, New Hampshire. The bridge is on a country road 1/8 of a mile due west from Route 16.
- 7. Hemlock Bridge Fryeburg, Oxford County (017). This bridge crosses the Saco River 6 miles northeast of Fryeburg proper, at the mid point the third mile of a 6 mile country road which lies between U. S. Route 302 and Maine Route 5.
- 8. Robyville Bridge Corinth, Penobscot County (019) crosses the Kenduskeag River 2 1/2 miles northwest of Kenduskeag Village. It is located on a country road which lies between Maine Route 15 and Maine Route 222. This bridge is 6 miles northwest of Bangor.
- 9. Lovejoy Bridge South Andover, Oxford County (017). This bridge crosses the Ellis River at South Andover which is three miles south of Andover and 6 1/2 miles northwest of Rumford Point. It lies on a short cross road between Maine Route 5 and a country road which connects Andover with Rumford Point.
- 10. Lowe's Bridge Route 15 and 16 Sangerville and Guilford. Piscataquis County (201). This bridge crosses the <u>Piscataquis River 4 1/4 miles west</u> of <u>Dover-Foxcroft</u> proper, and 25 miles due north of Newport, Maine.
- 11. Morse Bridge Bangor, Penobscot County (019) today lies on a new site only a few yards downstream from its original location on the Kenduskeag River within the city limits of Bangor, Maine, a Valley Avenue.
- 12. Porter-Parsonfield Bridge, Porter, York County (031). This bridge crosses the Ossipee River 1/2 mile southwest of Porter Village proper. This point in Maine is located some 35 miles W.N.W. of Portland, Maine.
- 13. Sunday River Newry, Oxford County (017). This bridge crosses the Sunday River on a road which is now closed. A country road leads by this bridge and continues up the Sunday River for 6 miles. This road leaves U.S. Route 2 five miles north of Bethel, Maine.
- 14. Watson Settlement Bridge Littleton, Aroostook County (003). This bridge crosses the Meduxnekeag Stream 1 mile due west of the border between Maine U. S. and New Brunswick, Canada. It is at a point two miles off and east of U. S. Route 1 nine miles due north of Houlton, Maine.

We are enclosing an official Highway map of Maine. On this map we have designated the location of the 14 advance nominations named above.
